SERIOUS LOSS.—Last week J. T. Layton's immense reservoir in Farris Gulch gave way, owing to the giving way of the bed rock at one end, causing about \$1,000 damage to him. The dam was about seventy yards wide, thirty-six on the base, twelve feet on top and twenty-seven feet high. About twenty yards of the dam was swept out to a depth of seventeen feet carrying logs and debris quite a distance down the gulch but doing no serious damage to the claim. Mr. Layton and a Chinaman were working on the reservoir when it gave way and narrowly escaped with their lives and just in time to escape from the immense rush of water.

F. M. Nickerson of Willderville, candidate for Clerk of Josephine county is well qualified for the position and is the choice of the Republican and Greenback Labor parties. As it appears that Frank has not done anything bad, his chances of election are at least fair. He is running, however, against a competitor of experience and the oldest man can't say how the race will end.

The latest report from the Crescent City road surveying party is that a line has been run to the summit with a grade of one foot to sixteen and a half, the ground being excellent. Beyond the summit, the ground is even more favorable and the grade will be much lighter, which is desirable as the heaviest freights will come this way. Mr. Howard is in high spirits over the favorable appearance of the selected route.

Last week a singular accident happened to a fine horse of Mr. Boli's on Applegate that may be a caution to those constructing fences. The animal had been playing in a field and started to jump a fence, but struck on a juniper stake which penetrated the chest to the depth of eighteen inches, fortunately glancing and avoiding any fatal part. The injury was so severe that the poor animal faintled while the stake was being extricated.

Snodgrass of Union, W. G. Representatives. Silas J. Day was appointed D. D. G. M. for this district.

The many friends of Henry Welser will be gratified to learn that he has safely accomplished his trip to the States, and is now with his relatives in Kansas City, after an absence on this coast of two years. Henry reports a great business boom in Kansas City with a dozen railroads centering at that point. The Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe railroad which is now rapidly building its line to Guaymas on the Gulf of California, is a Boston-Kansas City enterprise. The distance from Kansas City to Guaymas is 1,365 miles 975 of which are already built.

We find the following in the "Standard" of the 19th:

"A distressing accident occurred at Goshen, Lane county, on last Sunday evening, which will probably terminate fatally to one young lady, and the severe injury of three others. Mr. and Miss Rutledge, Miss Morgan and a gentleman whose name could not be ascertained by our correspondent, were enjoying an evening ride in a two-seated carriage drawn by a span of horses. While descending a sharp declivity opposite the residence of Mr. T. J. Cheshire, a trace become unfastened, and the pole dropped down, frightening the horses to such a degree that they became unmanageable and causing them to run away. After running a short distance the train and carriage collided with a fence, throwing the occupants out, and severely injuring all of them, and one of the young ladies, Miss Morgan, so badly that she is not expected to recover. The carriage was demolished."

This is from the "Yreka Journal": "The Sacramento 'Be' says work is to be commenced again on the California and Oregon railroad, and pushed forward until communication is opened with Portland. The road, we learn from good authority, has been accepted as far as Cottonwood, Shasta county, the 20 miles between that place and Reading being the distance to comply with franchise for this year, so that they must commence next year, if they do not this year, or forfeit franchise and land grant, unless Congress allows an extension of time, which is not likely. The company would probably never have stopped at Reading, had it not been for their desire to hurry through the Southern Pacific into Arizona, towards heading off Tom Scott in building an opposition road from this coast, to connect with the Texas Pacific. We believe the road will come through this county, close to Yreka, and probably enter into Oregon, via the Bogus creek route up the Klamath river, unless new surveys should make tunneling or grading on the Siskiyou more favorable for road building."

THE PEOPLE'S CONVENTION.

Yesterday, May 25th, 1880, the people's convention assembled at 10 A. M. pursuant to call, and organized by the election of Col. John E. Ross as chairman and Max Muller and W. H. Atkinson as secretaries. On motion the Chair appointed N. Langell, J. M. McCall and E. K. Anderson a committee to draft an order of business. The committee submitted the following order:

1st, nominations; 2d, adjournment for dinner; 3d, balloting for candidates. The report being adopted the following nominations were made:

For Representatives, W. H. Atkinson, Jacob Ish and J. W. Simpson; for County Commissioners, C. Magruder, E. K. Anderson, Joseph Satterfield and L. F. Allen; for County Judge, N. Langell; for Sheriff Wm. Bybee and R. M. Garrett; for Clerk, R. A. Owen and T. T. McKenzie; for Treas., P. Donegan; J. A. Wilson; School Sup't, Levi Willis; for Assessor, W. J. Stanley, B. C. Goddard, Wm. R. Kincaid; for Coroner, Dr. C. C. and M. Caton; for Surveyor, C. J. Howard and M. L. McCall. The following rule was adopted: That the candidate receiving the majority of all the votes cast for each office shall be declared nominated; if no choice, then all but the two highest shall be dropped and another ballot be taken. The convention then adjourned until one P. M.

On re-assembling the Chair appointed C. W. Savage and L. F. Allen as tellers, and the convention proceeded to ballot for the various candidates, each voter making up his ticket as a whole. One hundred and seventy votes were cast and the following persons having received a majority were declared the nominees of the convention:

On motion the Chairman was instructed to appoint a County Central Committee, and the convention adjourned sine die. J. E. ROSS, Chmn.

DEMOCRATIC NOMINATIONS.—On Saturday last the Democratic county convention met and "ratified" by a bare majority the four important nominations published in the SENTINEL two weeks ago, and fitted up the remainder of the ticket without any trouble. The ticket now stands: Representatives, Thos. Smith and Dr. Stanley; County Judge, S. J. Day; Sheriff, Evan Reames; Clerk, Henry Klippel; Treasurer, Henry Pape, Sr.; Assessor, Thos. Nichols; School Superintendent, J. D. Fountain; Commissioners, A. Alford and R. A. Cook; Coroner, Veit Schutz. On Friday night there was a determined effort made by outside delegates, to wipe some of the names off the slate, but it was unavailing, and when the convention met the opposition was silent and subdued. A noteworthy circumstance is that the "first" person named for any office was the one selected and that his vote was just the bare majority; showing that the selection of boys in stead of gray-headed men as delegates was a good stroke of policy on part of the ring—Let the band play!

THE PEOPLE'S TICKET.

It was particularly noticeable yesterday that the people's convention was a representative gathering. It was composed of the representative men of this county, substantial taxpayers and men of years, not boys, and those who are made the convenient tools of ring politicians. The ticket is an index of the convention. The candidates for representatives, Messrs. Ish and Atkinson are men of character and ability. The candidate for sheriff, Wm. Bybee, identified with the interests of the county has served the people faithfully, yet generously in a capacity where the official has the power to grind the people if he sees fit. The county Commissioners, Anderson and Magruder, both heavy tax-payers themselves, have already made a record for careful and economical administration of county affairs which their re-nomination shows is fully appreciated. N. Langell, for County Judge, an old and respected citizen, has a character for strict integrity and clear business sense that needs no mention, and there is no man in this county more deserving the honor than he. The candidate for Clerk Mr. McKenzie is known as a big hearted, generous man well qualified for the position; he asks and he will make a strong race. The People's candidate for Treasurer is Mr. Pat Donegan who ran two years ago against Mr. Fisher and although defeated, by a few votes, his re-nomination is a mark of renewed confidence in him. He is one of the working men of this county, earning his bread by the sweat of his brow, and his upright character entitles him to a handsome majority. The School Superintendent Levi Willis is a most fitting candidate. He is regarded, next to Prof. Merritt, as the best teacher in this county and bears a high character as a quiet unobtrusive gentleman. The candidate for Assessor, Mr. Goddard, the present incumbent, has served the people faithfully and acceptably for two terms, and his nomination by a large majority against respectable competitors is a handsome endorsement. It is not worth while to speak of the qualifications of Charley Howard for Surveyor; as they are well known. The ticket is now before the people of this county, nominated by the fairest method known, by men of all parties. The candidates have been selected with reference to their fitness by the best and largest representative body that has ever assembled in this county; and the whole ticket is confidently submitted to the people at large for their approval. There is every indication that the action of the convention will be ratified by a larger majority than given to the people's ticket two years ago.

"PACKED" CONVENTION.—The "Times" is to announce on Friday that the People's convention was "packed." We will say in advance that it was, packed and crowded by the representative men of every precinct, men who have the interests of the county at heart, pioneers and gray-headed taxpayers predominating. We will say also that its proceedings were marked with an earnest decorum and fairness that bespoke determination and honesty of purpose, and the vote for Sheriff proves that it was packed only in the sense we mention. Every one of the hundred and seventy citizens who voted, with the exception of about four who were "rung in," most contemptibly, for bad purposes, by the ring, will go home and be a solid worker for the whole ticket. When the votes are counted on the 7th of June, we expect to hear that the ballot boxes have been as fairly packed with people's votes; that is if the enthusiasm manifested in the convention means anything.

GRAND RALLY.—On Saturday evening the "ring" Democracy gathered their forces in front of Pape's, and by the aid of stirring speeches from Messrs. Autenrieth and Merry tried to "enthuse" the band had been engaged and the music was excellent, as it always is, a logfire had been kindled but the affair was a signal failure, the nominations, so plainly the work of the ring, falling like a wet blanket and in the language of one of the manipulators a "complete fiasco." The day for handling free voters like cattle is over and they can't be made to hurrah for what they don't like.

CHEAP HONORS.—It was amusing to observe the economical way in which the minority votes in the "no called" Democratic convention were distributed. The Chief did not have any particular use for them so they were scattered round where they would tickle the most. Hang on boys WE will make you all judges and clerks and sheriffs next time; don't get mad but hang on.

The "Sunday Mercury" (Portland) has this notice of Judge Watson:

"This gentleman who is one of the nominees for the Supreme Bench has been in the city during the past week. Mr. Watson is a gentleman of commanding appearance and courteous deportment. In point of fact he looks every inch a judge, and from the present outlook he will carry Southern Oregon, his house, by an overwhelming vote."

IS HE CAPABLE.

We make no apology for applying this question to the candidate for County Judge on the "ring" ticket. It is our right to ask it and if we can to answer it to the people. A man's public record is public property and an official's acts are the very best index to his capability. We showed last week that this county was loser a large sum of money by this individual's lack of ability, and we now intend to point to the same absence of judgment in other matters. Three years ago a bridge was to be built across Bear creek at McKenzie's mill. Instead of letting the contract as usual, for the whole work, it was thought advisable to farm it out, so that the patronage would go round among as many individuals as possible, and the result was that the tax-payers were out fully one thousand dollars. We so assert because that bridge cost over two thousand dollars, and there are two bridge builders in this county who will take the contract at half that sum. A bridge was to be built across Elk creek. Assuming to know everything Judge Day measured the span himself, let the contract, and when completed the contractor found it necessary to build thirty feet more to cross the stream. A bridge in the Justus lane has been impassable for a year and yet while repeatedly warned that it was in that condition his Honor has neglected to pay the slightest attention to it, although on an important thoroughfare. His course in regard to the change of road at Rock Point needs no comment as will be fully appreciated by the people of that precinct. His neglect of the unfortunate objects of county charity is now a matter of public notoriety, requiring no more mention. It was expected that the ring would not again place this person on the ticket as there were plenty of others more fit for the place, but as he was part of the ring himself the expectation was foolish. With this man's private character, we have nothing to do, we only canvass his official capacity and ask the people to fairly scan his career and ask themselves candidly if there is not a necessity for a change.

"CUT AND DRIED."

Two weeks ago, the SENTINEL announced the names of the candidates for the four important county offices that would be nominated at the Democratic convention. We were right in every instance and while the voters may wonder how we obtained the information, they will never know. It is enough for the public to know that the few men who compose the ring that rules the Democracy of Jackson county "fixed up" this ticket without consultation with the party, nominated it with the usual formality and it is only expected that the voters "go it blind."

Our assertions regarding the existence of a ring will hardly be gainsayed as it now looks as if the little squad who have repeatedly disorganized a party with three hundred majority were determined to farm out the offices for their own personal benefit. It looks also as if the better portion of the Democracy intended teaching the ring another and a final lesson that they can not accomplish otherwise. "It is easy to lead a horse to water but you can't make him drink."
