

1. Subscribers who do not give explicit notice to the contrary, are considered as wishing to continue their subscription.

2. If any subscriber orders the discontinuance of their subscription, the publisher will continue to send them until all arrears are paid.

3. If subscribers neglect or refuse to take their newspapers from the office to which they are directed, the law holds them responsible until they have notified the publisher, and the publisher is not responsible for the failure to deliver.

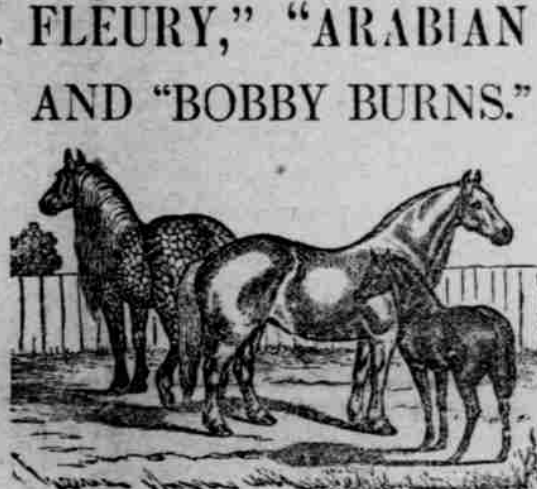
