By presence of mind and good engineering, he succeeded in landing about fifty yards below the ford with only the loss of his horse and overcoat.

CROP PROSPECT.—The indications from every quarter of the valley are that the grain crop will be short. The exceptionally hard winter damaged the fall sown grain seriously and the spring sown was so late, and so much kept back by cold, unfavorable weather that it promises poorly. Even at this date a warm rain would give it a start; but there are no indications of a rainfall and it does not come within a week it will be too late to be of any benefit. In nearly every locality, fruit is looking well especially plums, peaches and apples but the grape crop will be light; owing to the damage done to vines by the hard winter. There is an abundance of flour in the valley and while it may be expected to advance slightly in price there will be some to spare.
