MOPHARVEST AND THE L.D. .. A.

in The hop-picking season is a great event in Puyallup valley, equal in importance to the vintage harvest in the wine-producing districts in Europe, and looked forward to with great interest by the Indian population all over the Sound country. When the beps are ready to be picked, the Indians from far and wide gather in. They come in families, singly and in groups, on horseback, afoot, in wagons, onregy, and encamp in the vicinity of their fields of labor. These annual gatherings are in the nature of reunand friends who have, perhaps, not seen or communicated with each other since they last met in the hop fields the year previous, and are made the occasion of horse-racing, gambling, feasting and other amusements among old and young. Most of the hop growers prefer to have their work done by Indians when they can be procured; but as the hops require to be taken from the vine at a certain time, in order to preserve the full flavor, Chinamen are not infrequently employed to assist in the work. The preference is given to the Indian for the very good reason that the money he earns goes back into the communnity, while that paid to the Mongolian is in large part shipped off to China. Last year about \$50,000 was paid to hop-pickers in Puyallup valley, and this year, owing to greater acronge, the sum will, it is thought, be fully \$10,-000 more.

Let it be remembered that more than three fifths of the solids and liquids taken into the stomach should pars of through the pores of the skin-7,000 000 in number -and that this escape is the most rapid during the night while warm in bed. At least one-half of the waste and putrid matter (from twenty to thirty ounces in the night.) must become more or less tangled in the bedding-of course soiling it-and a part of this may become re absorbed by the skin if it is allowed to come in contact with it the next night, as it must if the bedding is not exposed for a few hours in the air and light. We may well imitate the Dutch example of placing such bedding on two chairs near the window, in the sunlight; or in the window, that the best purifier known-the light of the sun-may dissipate their impurities, or neutralize them. At least three hours on the average is as short exposure as is compatible with neatness."




