DEMOCRATIC NOMINEES.

We give the following sketches of the Democratic candidates, taken from the Chronicle: GENERAL HANCOCK. Winfield Scott Hancock was born in Montgomery county, Pa., February 14, 1824, and at the age of 16 entered West Point. He served as Lieut. in the Mexican war, and was breveted for gallantry at the battles of Contreras and Churubusco.

JAMES E. ENGLISH. James E. English was born in New Haven Conn., in 1812, and after a common school education, engaged in the lumber trade. He afterwards added banking and manufacture to his business pursuits. 1855 he was elected to the State House of Representatives, and in 1856 to the State Senate.

TO HOMESTEAD SETTLERS. The following act, approved May 14, 1880, will be of general interest to homestead and pre-emption settlers: Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That when a pre-emption, homestead, or timber-culture claimant shall file a written relinquishment of his claim in the local land office, the land covered by such claim shall be held as open to settlement and entry without further action on the part of the Commissioner of the General Land Office.

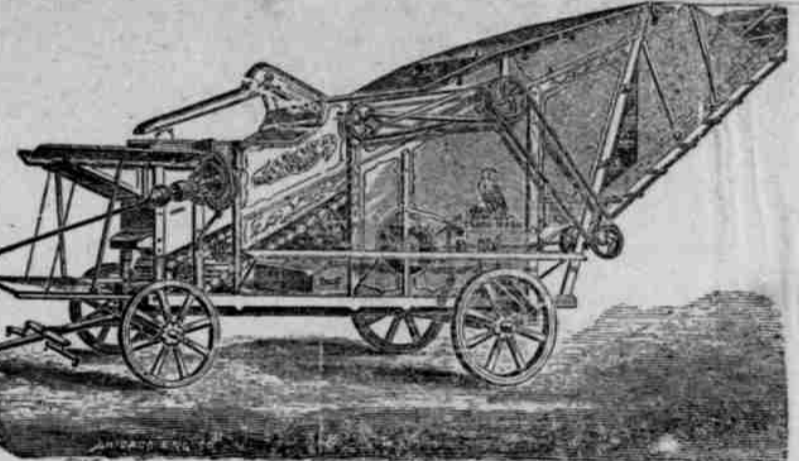
