ARTHUR AND THE CUSTOM HOUSE.

The Democratic press and Democrat ie politicians are harping upon the facthat the Republican nominee for Vic-President was removed from office by President Haves, and the impression is sought to be conveyed that the removal was on account of the corrupt administration of his office. 
