THE OLD WAGON ROAD.—A good deal of teaming over the mountains is being carried on at the present time. The old wagon road between here and Waldo has been considerably improved, but we are informed that it is yet in a rough condition, and teams are unable to draw large loads over it. If the merchants of Jacksonville and Jacksonville County have their freight shipped via Crescent City, over this rough road, in preference to having it go from Roseburg, it is not difficult to understand why they are anxious to have a new wagon road to Crescent City. LARGE FOREST FIRES.—The Shasta "Courier," of the 28th of last month says: "The great fire which has been raging between here and Clear Creek for several weeks past still continues its ravages, filling the atmosphere with a dense smoke. Parties who are cutting wood this side of Clear Creek state that the fire is set out and kept going by parties who in their cannot get sight of it. While these wood cutters were at dinner last Saturday a fresh fire was started by some unseen person near their wood, and they had hard work to keep their camp and outfit from being consumed. A close watch and bullets from a heavy gun may reveal who it is that spreads the fire."

A LIVING TARGET.—Clara Peters, the mail rider from Sawyers to Trinidad, on his last trip down had two shots fired at him from an ambush on the trail about four miles from Tully's ranch on the Klamath river. The first shot came near his head which caused him to jump and came near throwing him, but fortunately his spur caught in the cinch, and he had with difficulty regained his seat in the saddle when another shot was fired, the bullet passing through the lapels of his vest. His horse at the time was on a dead run. He thinks the shots were from a Winchester rifle and that it was a white man who engineered them. The ground was very hazy and he saw no one. ASHLAND WOOLEN GOODS.—The trade of the Ashland Woollen Manufacturing Company is not hedged in upon narrow limits by the competition of the large manufacturing establishments of the older States, but is reaching out into territory in which competition is most active and aggressive. But a few days ago the Company received a large order for blankets and socks from Kansas City, where every large manufacturing firm in the Eastern States has its agents offering every possible inducement to purchasers. In our own State the reputation and popularity of the Ashland goods are constantly extending and increasing. An order for 210 pairs of blankets has just been received from Goldsmith & Co., of Portland, who have dealt in the goods for some time. [Tribune.]

OREGON NARROW GAUGE.—Very favorable progress is reported on the construction of the narrow gauge railway in the Willamette valley. Grading from Ray's Landing to Silverton, a distance of over twenty-three miles, has been completed, and the lands are now grading on the Silverton and Brownsville line. 1200 hands including Chinamen, are at work, and grading is being crowded in order that the line may be finished in season to carry away the present harvest of wheat. Over five miles of track have been laid from Ray's Landing, and more is being put down at the rate of half a mile per day. The only drawback at present is the bridges and trestle work which cannot be completed as fast as the remainder of the road, owing to the scarcity of timber. Six saw mills are kept busy, but they are unable to supply the demand. Grading has been finished to a point fifteen miles South of Silverton and five miles North of Brownsville, and if the weather permits, the two grading parties will meet about the middle of October.

THE SHOOTING.—In our last we chronicled a case of accidental shooting as having occurred August 30th, on Jenny creek in which Joseph Scott and Miller of Eden precinct were principals. The facts in the case as furnished the "Tribune" are these: Messrs. Jos. Scott and Miller, who were camping out for hunting and recreation in the mountains about thirty miles East from Ashland, had their pleasure spoiled by an unlucky occurrence. On Monday evening Scott started from camp to go to a house not far distant after some coffee, and Miller started out with his rifle after game. Not far from camp the latter came upon a buck, and wounded it. The buck sprang into the brush and while searching for it Miller saw something move in the bushes forty yards away, which he supposed, of course was the wounded buck. He fired at it quickly, and was horrified to hear a man cry that he was shot. He hurried to the spot, and found that he had shot his partner, who was returning to camp. The ball had struck Scott's right shoulder in front, and curving over the joint and tearing the cartilage, passed out the back without injuring the bone. After seeing his friend to camp, Miller started for Ashland after a physician, and on Tuesday morning Dr. Inlow went out with him. The Doctor reports that the wound is painful, but not very dangerous, although it may possibly have the freedom of the shoulder joint a little impaired.

THE ROSE CURE.—Louis Ross, lately returned from Lake county where he had been engaged teaching school and son of Senator John E. Ross of Jackson county, has for the past three weeks been prostrated by an attack of typhoid fever. He had been doing as well as could be expected under the treatment of Dr. Danforth, when on Thursday morning last a dose of carbolic acid was administered to him by mistake, alarmingly aggravating the case. The mouth, throat and stomach of the patient were so badly affected as to make his case extremely critical, and the Dr. called to his assistance Dr. Collemier, and everything that medical skill could devise was done to neutralize the effects of the poison. The latest information we have from him is that he is out of danger and resting easy, and it is confidently hoped that he will conquer the untoward mishap. It appears that a vial of carbolic acid which was kept in the room for disinfecting purposes, had been misplaced and the nurse in administering the medicine prescribed by the doctor got hold of the wrong vial.

PIONEERS.—The 30th day of August, 1880, was the 27th anniversary of the arrival in Rogue River valley of a very large train of emigrants. The train, composed of 43 wagons, 300 souls, 1000 cattle and 200 horses, was in charge of Major Lupton (afterward killed by the Indians). The families of Giles Wells, John S. Heron, Beagles, Robinsons, and many others whose representatives are scattered, were in this train. Won't some one at the Pioneer Re-Union next week give a full account of Major Lupton's train and the present whereabouts of the missing members of that train? We mention the circumstance that among the 200 head of horses in his train were some of the celebrated Kildonan horses of Kentucky, owned by John S. Wells. From these sprang some of the finest stock of racers now on this coast.

DEATH OF A PIONEER.—Mr. John T. Scott, father of W. H. Scott, Mrs. A. S. Dunaway, Mrs. C. A. Coburn, Mrs. M. F. Cook, Mrs. McConard, Mrs. J. M. Kelly, Miss E. Scott and W. B. Brown, breathed his last September 24, 1880, in Washington county, aged 71 years. He came to Oregon in 1852 and has since resided in the State. Deceased was an honest old gentleman and greatly respected by his many friends.
