
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



Mr. James Croll, the author of "Climate and Time," gives in "Nature" his views as to the influence of squeous vapor on the melting point of snow. He mys:

cason why show at a great The elevation does not melt but remains nent, is owing to the fact that the heat received from the sun is thrown off into stellar space so rapidly by evaporation and reflection that the sun fails to raise the temperature of the snow to the melting point; the snow evaporates, but it does not melt. The summits of the Himalayas, for example, must receive more than ten times the amount of heat necessary to melt all the snow that falls on them, not withstanding which the snow is not melted. And in spite of the strength of the sun and the dryness of the air at those altitudes, exaporation is insufficient to remove the snow. At low elevations, where the snow-fall is propably greater and the amount of heat even less than at the summits, the snow melts and disappears. This, I believe, we must attribute to the influence of aqueous vapor. At high elevations the air is dry and allows the heat radiated from the snow to pass into space, but at low elevations a very able amount of the heat thus absorbed by the vapor is radiated back on the snow, but the heat thus radiated being of the same quality as that which the anow itself radiates, is on this acount absorbed by the snow. Little or none of it is reflected like that recaived from the sun. The consequence is that the heat thus absorbed accumu lates in the snow till melting takes place. Were the amount of aqueous apor possessed by the atmo afficiently diminished, perpetual snow would cover our gloke down to the sea ore. It is true that the sir is warm the lower level than at the higher level, and by contact with the anow must tend to melt it more at the for mer than at the latter position. But remember that the air is narmer mainly in consequence of the nce of squeous vapor, and that are the quality of the vapor reduced to the amount in question the difference of temperature at the two positions would not be great. 


