additional postage thereon. The rulings
of the department provide forwarding
all classes of properly prepaid matter
at the request of the person to whom it
is addressed.

A telegram from Pittsburg, Pa., to
the Philadelphia Press, says: "The
Democrats made a great boast of 'flop-

Saturday night. To-day many of the

THE EFFECT IN JACKSONVILLE.—The
news of the great Republican victories
in Indiana and Ohio had a marked ef-
fect on the citizens of Jacksonville.
The Democrats, who had all along pre-
dicted a different result, doubted the
earlier telegrams, and were willing to
wait for more authentic news before
conceding Indiana to the Republicans,
but as the successive dispatches came
in confirming the victory, their coun-
tenances assumed a pleasant appearance
and they had but little to say and
quietness reigned supreme in our
streets.

The intended Democratic demon-
stration, to consist of bonfires,
torchlight procession, shooting of the
cannon, etc., did not take place.
The Republicans, on the other hand,
not being so demonstrative as their Demo-
cratic brethren, felt very good over the
news, but their enthusiasm did not
partake of a hilarious noisy character.
Whilst they could be seen discussing
the news on the street corners and
elsewhere in a quiet, calm manner,
their faces beamed with satisfaction
and good will. Wednesday, Thursday,
Friday and Saturday for the first time
in this campaign, could we hear more
horrors in Jacksonville for Garfield
than for Hancock. The changed sur-
face of things in Jacksonville was as
gratifying as it was unexpected.

In fact, the news was a stunner to the
hopes of the Democracy. One Han-
cock man was heard to say that if the
Democrats can not carry Indiana this
time, there is very little hope of carry-
ing it in November, and Hancock's
election is more doubtful than ever.
He is very correct in this opinion.
Republicans have every reason to take
courage and now hopefully look to the
election of Garfield and Arthur.

The first annual fair of the Mount
Shasta District Agricultural Society
opened at Yreka last Wednesday and
continuing four days. Jackson county
was not allowed to exhibit her products
for the prizes offered at the fair, as has
formerly been the custom, but in the
racing programme we were given the
same privileges as heretofore. The
following is the result of the four days'
races:

FIRST DAY.
The first race was for purse of \$150,
trotting, mile heats, 3 in 5, with fol-
lowing entries: Geo. Stephenson, b. s.
Sir Walter, driven by Geo. Sutherland;
D. H. Hyde, b. g. Bales, driven by
himself; Jay Beach, b. f. Maggie Ar-
nold, driven by Wm. Clark. Geo.
Stephenson's horse Sir Walter won
the race in three straight heats. Time,
2:40, 2:41, 2:40.

SECOND DAY.
The second race was for purse of
\$50, single dash of one mile, running.
The following were the entries: Jas.
Muss, g. c. Hancock; St. McKee, b. c.
Henry; E. Elmer; b. c. Snuff Box.

THIRD DAY.
First race, running, free for all, 3
in 5, for purse of \$125, with fol-
lowing entries: John Hann, b. m.
Mayflower; E. Elmer; Ned Smith, Jas.
Muss, g. c. Hancock. Won by Ned
Smith.

Second race, trotting, 2 in 3, free for
all 4 year olds, purse \$75. Entries,
W. Glendinning, b. g. Black Frank, 4
yrs. old; J. Harmon, b. g. Abdallah
Boy, 4 yrs. old; A. D. Richards, b. g.
Ab, 3 yrs. old. Only one heat was
run, Black Frank shutting the others
out the first time round. Time, 5:12.

FOURTH DAY.
Trotting race, free for all, two mile
heats, 2 in 3, purse \$150, entries,
\$25. The entries for \$5 added.
Geo. Stephenson's Sir Walter, Jay
Beach's Maggie Arnold and Hyde's
Bones in 5:29, and the first and third
heats and race were taken by Sir Wal-
ter. Time, 5:55, 5:37.

OFF FOR THE ASYLUM.—A man
named Wm. Kittel was brought before
Judge Day on the 15th instant on a
charge of insanity. He was examined
by a board of physicians, adjudged in-
sane and ordered to be sent to the
Asylum at East Portland. Sheriff
Bybee accompanied the patient to his
destination.

THE FOOT RACE.—This proved to
be the feature of the entire fair and
more money was staked on the result
than on any of the other races during
its continuance. The race was sixty
yards, 2 heat in 3, for a purse of \$80
and the entrance fee of \$5 added.
The entries were Fred Wickwire,
Henry Messor, James Minor and
John Roberts. On the first heat all
started but Minor, running through in
a bunch, Messor coming out a little in
the lead with Wickwire and Roberts
close at his side. The race was so
close that the judges at the outcome
could not agree, when the starting
judge decided that Messor had got the
start and the heat was given to Wick-
wire. Time, .061. After a twenty
minutes rest Messor, Wickwire and
Roberts again started on the second
heat Wickwire coming out ahead,
Messor six inches behind him and
Roberts last. The judges then decided
that it was Wickwire's heat and race
by six inches. Time, .061. It is
stated that there was over \$1,000 in
the pool box on this race alone, be-
sides a large amount bet on the out-
side. All of the boys bet on their fa-
vorite—Messor—and came home
broke, losing everything they had in
possession at that time. Our boys,
however, take consolation in the fact
that Wickwire, having proved to be a
professional, and could then only beat
Messor as he did, shows that the latter
is some foot-racer himself, and they
will back him quite lively for his race
—100 yards—if the race is run in
Jacksonville.

COL. CURRY'S SPEECH.—Col. Geo.
