OUR KLANATH VISITORS.—Hundreds of Indians from the Klamath Reservation were in the valley all of this and last week trading and laying in supplies. On Wednesday the streets of Ashland were literally crowded with them, and the roads between Ashland and Jacksonville were lined with Klamath horsemen.

LINE REPAIRERS.—John D. Enright and a party of men passed through town last Sunday on their way South. They are engaged in placing the telegraph wires between Roseburg and Yreka in good condition for the coming winter. A large number of new poles have been set and the line is once more in good condition.

THE FOOT RACE.—Fred Wickwire, of California, has accepted Henry Menso's challenge to run a hundred yard foot race with him, the running to take place in Jacksonville Saturday afternoon, Oct. 30th. The arrangements have all been made and the money, a hundred dollars a side, has been put up. Thus will our betting men have another chance of staking their money.

The team becoming unmanageable Mr. Shinn fell with his head against the ground knocking him senseless, but came to in a short time. Fortunately Mr. S. did not sustain any serious injuries.

WAGON ROAD TO THE LAKES.—Sanford C. Carter, who resides on French Gulch, three miles above its junction with the county road on Big Applegate, says that work will soon commence extending the wagon road to his ranch, with the prospect of extending the same to the Squaw Lakes. It needs but the completion of this wagon road to make these "gems of the West" a favorite resort of tourist hunters and fishermen. Let the work of construction go on.

CRESCENT CITY WAGON ROAD.—The Del Norte "Record," of Oct. 23d, says: J. K. Johnson, who has just returned from San Francisco, informs us that work on the wagon road will be commenced immediately. Next week the company will advertise for bids to construct the road from the 6-mile post, or Oregon line, to the 35-mile post. Mr. Johnson says the project has received much encouragement and material aid in San Francisco, but, as stated by Mr. Gasquet, the business men of San Francisco will have more faith in the enterprise when they see a beginning made in the actual construction of the road. A meeting of the company will be held within the next two or three days—probably today—when some plan will be discussed for calling in subscriptions.

JACKSONVILLE DEMOCRATS ABROAD.—Says the Yreka "Journal": A few Democrats from the Jacksonville glee club, in town last week, attempted to sing old Union war tunes to copperhead songs, but the effort was powerless, in view of the news from Indiana. FROM JOSEPHINE COUNTY.

From W. L. Record, just returned from Josephine county where he has been erecting some marble work, we learn that W. J. Wimer of Waldo has lately been on the sick list, but is now up again.

Quite a number of improvements have been projected, both in Waldo and Kerbyville, in anticipation of the new wagon road speedily to be built to Crescent City.

The jail and clerk's office were being repaired. The fixing up of the county jail is a significant omen. The officials must expect an occupant or two, a thing Josephine county has not had for a long time.

A new saw mill is being built on the site of the old at Waldo, by Mr. Bennett proprietor, which will add greatly to the business of the town.

Col. Curry's speech was largely attended by men of both parties. The Colonel also spoke at other points in Josephine.

The coyote wolves are doing a good deal of damage to sheep and young stock in Josephine county.

The Kerbyville people are taking quite an interest in improving their cemetery. The grounds have been lately cleared of all obnoxious underbrush, and a new fence has been built, giving the resting place of the dead a cheerful appearance.

ABOUT DIPHTHERIA.—Three deaths have been reported to us within the past ten days as having occurred in Jackson county from diphtheria, the two children in the family of Mr. Robinson on Wagner creek, and the little girl of Widow Stewart on Bear creek. Parents cannot be too much on their guard against this insidious foe of their little ones, and as any information concerning the treatment of the disease is now eagerly sought for, we republish an item which appeared in the SENTINEL last Winter. "An item is going the rounds of the papers recommending oiling in cases of diphtheria and conveying the inference that it is something new in the treatment of that fearful disease. Upon inquiry of one of our local physicians who has had extensive practice, and good success in treating the malady we received substantially the following statement: I have used counter irritation in diphtheria for the last three years, and in extreme cases where there appeared to be difficult breathing, blistered the upper part of the chest. This I did before I knew the pathology of the disease, treating it as active inflammation only. If turpentine is present I use turpentine stupes. I commonly use a more active preparation, solution of the Iodo Bromide of Calcium, which will produce a more active irritant but not blister. The time to blister is when the inflammation seems to extend down the larynx."
