THE ELECTIONS.

Progress and Result
of the great
Battle.

Victory Perches Upon
the Republican Banner.

Below we furnish the telegrams as
received at this office on the night
of the Election:

MAINE.

Portland, Me. Nov. 2, at 7 P. M.—
In Portland, Bath and other towns in
Maine the Republicans gain largely
over September vote. Fifty towns
give Garfield 23,979, Hancock 17,651,
Republican net gain 1388 over Septem-
ber.

Blaine telegraphs Garfield that
Maine has a Republican majority over
all.

Later dispatches from Maine shows
the State to have gone Republican by
from 4000 to 5000 majority.

All towns in Maine give Garfield
35,138, Hancock 18,172.

NEW YORK.

New York, Nov. 2, at 8 P. M.—
Scattering towns in New York State
show Republican gains.

400 precincts in New York City
give Hancock 70,054, Garfield 46,122.
Later; Democratic majority in New
York City reported at 32,500.

Vote for Mayor of New York very
close. Grace, Democrat, only 1,000
majority, but he is probably elected.

New York City 291 districts give
Grace, Dem. for Mayor 42,521, Dowd,
Independent, 41,161.

Brooklyn N. Y., at 8 P. M.—Brook-
lyn forty-eight districts, Hancock 13-
689, Garfield 11,290.

Auburn, N. Y., complete, gives Gar-
field 1,053 majority.

Democratic majority in Brooklyn
will not exceed 10,000. Sixteen out
of 25 wards complete gives Garfield
31,217, Hancock 33,540.

New York Legislature heavily Re-
publican.

So far Republicans gain 19 Congress-
men in the country.

MASSACHUSETTS.

Boston, Nov. 2, 9 P. M.—Eighty-two
cities and towns in Mass. give Garfield
36,976, Hancock 19,762.

Boston gives Garfield 25,524, Han-
cock 27,659.

Morse, Dem., elected in 4th Mass.
district, rest delegation Republican, a
Republican gain of one congressman.

Later dispatches indicate that Massa-
chusetts will probably send a solid Re-
publican delegation to Congress. Demo-
cratic loss in the city of Boston 25
per cent. Republicans carry the State
by 30,000 to 40,000.

CALIFORNIA.

Sacramento, Nov. 2, at 10 P. M.—
Antioch gives Garfield 118, Hancock
136; Page Congressman 115, Glasscock
138.

Ukiah Garfield 117, Hancock 250.

Marysville, complete Garfield, 516,
Hancock 404. This will probably
give Yuba county to the Democrats.

Forty towns in State, including
Marysville, Antioch, Benicia, Red-
wood and Watsonville give Garfield
3,289, Hancock 2,774.

San Mateo precinct gives Garfield
111, Hancock 75; Redwood city, Gar-
field 175, Hancock 146; Anaheim,
Garfield 102, Hancock 173.

San Bernardino County is close,
both parties claiming it by about 100
majority.

Watsonville gives Garfield 125,
Hancock 153; Benicia, Garfield 220,
Hancock 187.

San Francisco, Nov. 2, at 9:30.—
Total vote of the City of San Francis-
co 41,298; no count received yet.

Seventy-one towns and precincts in
California give Garfield 5,061, Han-
cock 5,894.

Later: Eight precincts in Contra
Costa County gives Garfield 619, Han-
cock 417.

Five precincts in Lake county, gives
Garfield 212, Hancock 302.

Nine precincts in Los Angeles Co.,
outside city, give Garfield 496, Han-
cock 505; Weaver 91.

Thirteen precincts in Placer county
excluding Auburn, give Garfield 797,
Hancock 614.

Five precincts in San Mateo, Gar-
field 510, Hancock 433.

Five precincts in Santa Cruz, give
Garfield 292, Hancock 383. Six pre-

Republicans.

Santa Clara, first and second pre-
cincts, Garfield 432 Hancock 293.

Visalia gives Garfield 208; Hancock
280; Oakdale Garfield 130, Hancock,
120; Hollister Garfield, 254, Hancock,
200;

San Jose 3,876 votes polled, 600
counted Garfield 130 ahead. Santa
Anna, Los Angeles county, Garfield
190, Hancock 178, Weaver 13.

San Bernardino, Garfield 121, Han-
cock 144. Weaver 6; Riverside, Gar-
field 179, Hancock 60, Weaver 15.

Downey city, Garfield 56, Hancock,
151; Lompoc, Garfield 92, Hancock 78;
Weaver, 8.

Dispatch from Martinez 250 Repub-
lican majority.

157 towns and precincts in State
give Garfield 10,854, Hancock 10,632.

San Francisco, Nov. 2, at 9 P. M.—
The count in San Francisco so far as
made, gives Garfield 2,709, Hancock
2,590, Weaver 58; Davis for Congress
2,781, Rosecrans 2,490, Naybell 66.

Lake county Hancock's majority as
far as heard from is 172.

Sutter county very close. Later:
204 towns in Cal. give Garfield 14,954,
Hancock 14,227.

Nevada City complete Garfield 670,
Hancock 423. Calistoga, Garfield 104,
Hancock 77, Weaver; Redwood city
Garfield has about 80 majority in
county San Mateo.

Watsonville complete Garfield 241,
Hancock 290.

Chico as far as counted gives Gar-
field 168, Hancock 177.

Lutter creek Garfield 219, Hancock
183; Downville Garfield 150, Han-
cock 92; Forest City Garfield 143,
Hancock 50; San Buena Ventura
Garfield has one hundred; Colusa Gar-
field 155, Hancock 331; Plymouth
Garfield 188, Hancock 132; Suisun
Garfield 225, Hancock 229; San Rafael

Washoe county, Nev. as far as
heard from gives 82 majority for Han-
cock.

Virginia City returns indicate elec-
tion Democratic tickets, and working
majority in Legislature probabilities
are strong that the Democrats have
carried the State and elected Cassidy
to Congress.

Elko, Nev. Garfield 170, Hancock
137; White Pine county, has gone
Democratic by a considerable majority;
Lincoln county 75 majority for the
Democrats; Carson Garfield 563, Han-
cock 481.

WISCONSIN.

Republicans gain one Congressman
in Wisconsin.

35 towns in Wisconsin show 872
Republican gain.

OHIO.

In 29 precincts, Hamilton county
Ohio, Cincinnati 3,759 Republican
gain.

Heavy Republican gains are report-
ed in Ohio. Murat Halsted says Gar-
field has Ohio by 40,000 majority.

ILLINOIS.

Chicago, Nov. 2, at 10 P. M.—
Sweeping Republican victory in Chic-
ago. Republican city, county, State
and national tickets elected by over
6,000 majority.

Chicago gives 3,514 Republican ma-
jority, city doubtful but claimed by
both parties. 35 townships Illinois
outside of Chicago show Republican
net gain 238.

INDIANA.

Indianapolis, Nov. 2, at 9 P. M.—
The Indianapolis election passed with-
out any disturbance this city indica-
tions point to a smaller vote polled
than in October comparisons to-night
will be made on vote for Governor
which gave Republican majority.

MISCELLANEOUS

Pennsylvania goes Republican by
from 30,000 to 40,000 majority, Leg-
islature Republican, securing a Re-
publican U. S. Senator.

Republicans carry Colorado by in-
creased majorities, over Governors

Twenty-six towns in Michigan give
Garfield 884 majority.

Kansas goes Republican heavily.

Scattering returns from Iowa show
net Republican gains in 34 out of 130
precincts.

Florida probably Democratic; Blux-
om, Democrat, elected in first dis-
trict; second district close.

Fourteen towns in Rhode Island
gave Garfield 4408 majority.

Ten towns in New Hampshire
show Republican loss.

In Wilmington, Delaware, in com-
plete returns show 550 Republican
gain.

Lessinghale Republican beats Frost,
Democrat for Congress in St. Louis, a
gain of one Republican Congressman
in Missouri.

Jacksonville, Nov. 3 at 3:30 P. M.—
The returns from the interior of New
York place Garfields majority at 45-
000. The Democrats concede the
State to Garfield by 25,000 majority.

Later news from New York city
puts the Democratic majority at 42-
000. New York legislature is strong-
ly Republican. Grace, Democrat is
elected mayor of New York city.

THE LATEST.

Yreka, Nov. 3, at 10 A. M.—Califor-
nia advices at present indicate that the
Democrats will have a working major-
ity in the Legislature, though figures
are liable to be changed. Returns in
the second district thus far foot up
Page 8739, Glasscock 7,850; third dis-
trict, Knight 7,887, Berry 8,305; Pa-
checo 7498, Leach, 7,395, Godfrey
1,590.

Later news from New York city
puts the Democratic majority at 42-
000. New York legislature is strongly
Republican. Grace, Democrat is elect-
ed Mayor of New York city.

Latest returns from San Francisco:
Republican 14,093, Democratic 14,794.
For Congress, Davis, Republican 14-
307, Rosecrans Democrat 14,578.

Very latest return from San Fran-
cisco: Republican 17,845, Democratic 19,863,
Greenback, 601. For Congress, Da-
vis Republican 18,293, Rosecrans
Democratic 19,469, Nayell, Green-
backer, 623. This result undoubtedly
gives the State to the Democrats.

OREGON.

Portland dispatches up to 9 A. M.,
Nov. 4, report Oregon very close, and
will perhaps require the official vote to
decide. Republicans still confident
of a small majority. Returns are in-
complete in nearly all counties from
which definite statements are received.
Lane and Multnomah show slight
Democratic gains.

Jackson County.—Jackson county
goes Democratic by 314 majority, a
falling since June of 12. The fol-
lowing precincts give Democratic ma-
jorities: Jacksonville 102; Peasant
Creek 30; Applegate 43; Little Butte
36; Chinney Rock 5; Leland 7; Man-
zanita 11; Rock Point 27; Table Rock
63; Willow Springs 54; Flourence Rock
7; and Foots creek 6.—Total 390.

Republican majorities: Ashland 26,
Eden 2; Big Butte 6, Grant's Pass 14,
Evans creek 4, Sterling 12, Union-
town 13.—Total 77. Total Democratic
majority in county 314.

Douglas county, Oregon, gives 130
Republican majority.

GRAND RESULT.

The six New England States, with
their 40 electoral votes, have gone
solid for Garfield. New York, Penn-
sylvania, Ohio and Indiana, with their
99 votes, have gone for Garfield. And
Illinois, Michigan, Minnesota, Wiscon-
sin, Iowa, Kansas and Nebraska, with
their 76 electoral votes have also gone
for the Republican nominees—leaving
New Jersey and Oregon, with their 12
votes, in doubt. Hancock carries the
"solid South," 138, and California and
Nevada with their nine votes. If it
shall appear that the Democrats have
carried the doubtful States, Hancock
will have 159 and Garfield 215 votes.

THE VERY LATEST.

LATEST FROM CALIFORNIA.—San
Fran., Nov. 4.—The State is still in
doubt on the electoral ticket. Total
vote of San Francisco Garfield 19,122,
Hancock 21,725, Weaver 573; Rose-
crans, Democrat, is elected over
Davis, Republican, for Congress; Pa-
checo, Republican, is elected in 4th
district; Berry, Democratic, in 3d; and
Page, Republican, in 2d district; Leg-
islature still in doubt, both parties claim-
ing a majority on joint ballot.

Latest news from New York gives
that State to Garfield by a majority of
from 33,000 to 40,000.

Garfield has 215 electoral votes with-
out California and Oregon.

Oregon safe for Garfield by 500 to
700 majority.

THE STRUGGLE.

The battle is over, and as the smoke
clears away it is found that the victory
is as grand and conclusive as the most
ardent lover of American liberty anti-
cipated. The gage of battle was thrown
down by the "Solid South," accepted

people sealously devote themselves to
developing the great natural resources
of our country. Let the building of
wagon roads and railroads be agitated;
let home industries be encouraged and
the establishment of factories advocat-
ed; let the matter of the Harbor of
Refuge on this coast be brought to the
attention of Congress, and let that
body be petitioned for assistance to
improve the military wagon roads be-
tween the coast and the forts; and to
improve our rivers and harbors. We
can't all think alike in politics, but we
can all agree to favor and labor for im-
proving the section of country where
our lot is cast.
