Co., in recognizing, is bringing about him men whom he knows, in the various departments, and Mr. Maxwell is to be congratulated upon the fact that he is to be associated with so able a man. RENO AND OREGON R. R.—The Atlanta "Independent" says: From a gentleman who was here this week, we learn that work is to be commenced in a few days on the railroad from Reno to Oregon. The grade stakes have been set for a number of miles from Reno north, and a set of levels will begin at Reno, and grade north, and another force will commence at Belfast, in Honey Lake valley, and grade toward Reno. After leaving Belfast, the road will pass through Pete's valley, Horse Lake, Meadows plains, and over the divide to the South Fork, following nearly the present travelled wagon road. From this place northward it will go on the east side of Goose Lake to the Oregon line, and then following the route that was surveyed last summer. The entire route is to be traversed by the road, is a succession to the rich and fertile valleys, susceptible of cultivation, and capable of producing all kinds of vegetation adapted to this climate, and the day is not far distant when, what is now a wild and unsettled country, will be made a thrifty farming country.

Sargent Dunlap is a philosopher. He has observed that in every precinct not visited by the Hancock Glee Club the Democratic majority has been sustained, but where the fervent and eloquent speakers and the sweet singers have indicated themselves on the people the Democratic majority has decreased.

THE RESULT IN JACKSON COUNTY.

Unscrupulous Democratic partisans used every means in their power to secure the casting of ballots at least doubtful, and the honest votes of citizens of this State were neutralized by the spurious and dishonest ballots of tramps of a sister State; yet with all most strenuous efforts and a large expenditure of money the vote of Jackson county is not increased materially for the Democracy. It must be humiliating for the fervent orators, the persistent liars, the backers of forgery and misrepresentation and the procurers of illegal votes, to know that their harvest has been light and that the fearless Republicans of old Jackson stood to their arms and kept the opposition down to its legitimate and accorded majority. They should be ashamed, if shame could touch them, that their efforts to excite prejudice and hatred only resulted in uncovering their meanness and littleness, and we believe that if their folly and braggadocio had been continued a month longer it would have reduced their majority fifty per cent. The Republicans of Jackson county have worked faithfully and earnestly, but the Democratic leaders by their disgusting folly and their readiness to adopt disreputable means to win, have driven from their party many voters who would not prostitute their manhood to party success. This is why Jackson county does not give the four hundred majority promised by the innocent and ever sanguine leaders of its dominant party.

ACTS PASSED BY THE GOVERNOR.

The following is a complete list of acts passed at the late session and signed up to yesterday noon. This list also includes memorials and resolutions filed up to that time:

H. B. 3.—An act to incorporate Dallas and repeal all former acts relating to the same.

S. B. 4.—An act to incorporate the town of Anity in Yamhill county.

S. B. 20.—An act supplemental to an act to incorporate the town of Marshfield in Coos county.

S. B. 108.—An act to amend an act to incorporate the town of Oakland, in Douglas county.

S. B. 113.—An act to incorporate the town of Prineville, Wasco county.

S. B. 70.—An act to incorporate the town of Monmouth in Polk county.

H. B. 2.—An act to incorporate the town of Dayton, in Yamhill county.

H. B. 9.—An act to amend an act to incorporate the town of McMinnville, Yamhill county.

S. B. 109.—An act to amend an act incorporating the city of Roseburg, Oregon.

S. B. 104.—An act to amend an act to incorporate the city of Astoria, Oregon.

S. B. 107.—An act to amend an act to incorporate the city of Eugene, Oregon.

S. B. 43.—An act to establish and protect the rights of married women.

Section 1 repeals all laws which impose or recognize civil disabilities upon a wife not imposed by existing statutes upon the husband, and gives the wife a right to sue in the courts alone for redress of her personal wrongs. Section 2 provides that the responsibilities of the parents in the absence of misconduct shall be equal, and the mother shall be as fully entitled to the custody and control of the children and their earnings as their father, and in case of the husband's death the wife shall come into the full and complete control of the estate and the children as the father now does in case of the mother's death. This act is now in force.

S. B. 118.—An act to define the duties and fix the compensation of the clerk of the board of school land commissioners. This act more particularly prescribes the manner in which the record of transactions by the board shall be kept, and fixes the salary of the clerk at \$1500 per annum.

S. B. 41.—An act to dispose of the unfinished branch mint building, the material and the block of ground on which the same is situated at The Dalles. This act takes effect whenever all legal claims against the property are settled, and vests the property in the Wasco Independent Academy Association, to be used for educational purposes only.

S. B. 11.—Repeals sections 23 and 24, title 1, chapter 45, miscellaneous laws of the State of Oregon, as compiled by Matthew P. Deady, and Lafayette Lane.

S. J. R. 1.—Directs the Secretary of State to purchase 160 copies of volume 1 of the Oregon Supreme Court reports, and directs the disposition of the same.

H. J. R. 14.—Concurs in the proposed amendment to the constitution providing that regular sessions of the legislative assembly shall last sixty days, and special sessions thirty days, and that members shall receive \$4 for each day actually in session.

S. J. M. 5.—Asks Congress to appropriate \$500,000 to make surveys and inaugurate works on a canal and locks around the Dalles of the Columbia.

H. J. R. 3.—Legalizes warrant No. 248 drawn in favor of G. E. Clark and paid before any appropriation was made therefor.

H. J. R. 5.—Authorizes the superintendent of the penitentiary to let convict labor at 30 cents per day for each convict.

S. J. R. 2.—Proposes an amendment to the constitution as follows: The elective franchise in this State shall not hereafter be prohibited to any citizen on account of sex.

H. J. R. 4.—Directs the Secretary of State to have 5000 copies of the school laws and 2500 copies of the road laws printed for the use of school officers and road supervisors.

OBITUARY.

Another Pioneer Goes Home.

Robert C. Armstrong, the subject of this sketch, was born in Ohio, March 21, 1827. When but a boy he with his parents moved to Illinois, where he grew up to manhood and married. In 1852 he with his family crossed the plains and settled in the then territory of Oregon and has resided in this State ever since. The night before his death he was in apparent good health, but early in the morning on the 30th of October he began to complain of pain in the region of the heart and of numbness of the hands and feet. Restoratives were immediately applied but without avail. He sank rapidly, and said he was dying. In less than an hour after the alarm was given and scarcely without a moment's warning, the spirit of R. C. Armstrong had taken its flight. Thus has passed from among us, an upright and a good man—one who was universally esteemed as a true Christian citizen. Mr. Armstrong was the father of eleven children, two of whom preceded him to the spirit world. About eleven years ago he became a professing member of the Methodist Episcopal Church, in whose pale he died. His funeral took place from the M. E. Church, Jacksonville, and was attended by a very large concourse of mourners and sympathizing friends. Rev. D. A. Crowell conducting the funeral obsequies.
