YERKA Nov. 9.—The very latest
returns from California give that State
to Hancock by a plurality of about
290. Judge Terry, one of the Demo-
cratic electors, is defeated, however,
being over 500 votes behind his ticket
in the State which insures one vote for
Garfield in the electoral college of Cali-
fornia. The Republicans have elected
41 Assemblymen giving them 12 ma-
jority on joint ballot, which insures the
return of a Republican U. S. Senator
to succeed Booth.

WHEN TO CELEBRATE.—At a meet-
ing of the Executive Committee of the
Garfield and Arthur Club of Jackso-
ville, held Nov. 6th, it was resolved to
celebrate the great Republican victory
on Friday night the 19th instant.
Messrs. Jas. A. Carlisle, Dave Cron-
miller and Aaron H. Magley were ap-
pointed a general committee of ar-
rangement, with power to appoint all
the sub-committees necessary. The pro-
gramme of the jubilation will appear

DEATH OF MARY SIFERS.—Mary
Sifers only daughter of Senator John
B. Sifers, died at the residence of
Henry Kippel, Jacksonville, on Satur-
day night, Nov. 6, 1890. She took a
violent cold by exposure, and was
sick only a few days and died on the
night of the fourth day. Her sudden
death casts a gloom over the entire
community, where she was well known
as a bright and amiable school girl.
Her funeral was one of the largest
ever held in Jacksonville. Her re-
mains were accompanied by the teachers
and school children to the Church,
where Rev. D. A. Crowell held a short
and impressive address, and from there
to the grave. The death of Mary's
mother occurred when she was quite
small which broke up the Sifers fam-
ily and ever after that she with her
two brothers made their home at their
grandmother's, Mrs. Daniel Fisher's.
Mary Sifers was just 16 years of age,
having died on her birth day.

THE SCHUMPF LEGGE.—This quartz
mine, the property of George Schumpf,
which is situated in the Willow Springs
district, has recently been visited by
a number of gentlemen, among them two
California mining experts, who pro-
nounce it among the best, if not the
best mining property in Southern Ore-
gon. There are about 300 tons of rich
quartz rock already on the dumps
awaiting the crushing process. The
machinery for crushing is now being
placed in position near the mouth of
the tunnel. The tunnel itself is being
dug into the side of the mountain for
a distance of two hundred or more feet
and is intended to drain the main shaft
from which the quartz is taken. Two
sets of men, a night shift and a day
shift, are constantly working in the
tunnel, and Mr. Schumpf expects to
reach the bottom of the main, or 70
feet shaft, by Christmas. We have no
doubt that the energetic proprietor has
a bonanza of the first magnitude, and
that his strenuous labors will soon be
rewarded.

A home illustration of what would
be the effect of a Democratic "tariff
for revenue only" is given by the Troy
"Times." "At Hart's Falls the pro-
prietors of the Cable Flax mills pay
the female spinners from \$1 to \$1.10
per day. The same service in Great
Britain brings forty cents per day.
The smallest boy or girl in the Cable
mills gets the pay of a full grown man
or woman in an English mill. The pay
roll of the mill at Hart's Falls amounts
annually to \$100,000. With a tariff
for revenue only, it would be \$40,000,
supposing the volume of business should
remain the same as it is now. The
officers of that company, as well as the
operatives, are thankful for a protective
tariff and the news from Indiana."

BOSS KELLY, BADLY BATTERED.—
The N. Y. "Herald" of Nov. 6th says:
Kelly's claim of fraudulent voting in
New York is preposterous. No vote
could have been cast in this city which
was not registered, and the registry
lists were open to inspection and chal-
lenge. Kelly's foolish colonization fic-
tion is too supremely ridiculous to de-
ceive anybody who does not wish to be
deceived. As if colonization could ac-
count for the pitiful vote by which
Grace barely escaped defeat in a city
where the normal Democratic majority
is between 60,000 and 70,000. The
unrestrained wrath with which the in-
dignant city Democracy assail Kelly is
a plain consequence of his defying pub-
lic opinion by nominating a candidate
for Mayor for the selfish purpose of se-
curing his own reappointment to the
Controlship. He wantonly sacrificed
the Hancock ticket to his unscrupu-
lous greed of local power. The Demo-
cracy here and elsewhere perfectly
understand his perfidy, and they
only await an opportunity for a reek-
oning. They intend to punish him
and make an example of him as a
warning to bolting renegades and traitors.
He understands this perfectly
well, and hence his desperate attempt
to dodge the coming blow.

RAILROAD RUMORS.—Southern Ore-
gon is just now attracting some atten-
tion in railroad circles. Representa-
tive Stanford, who has just returned
from below, says a desire prevails
among railroad men to have the Rogue
river country connected by rail with
the commercial metropolis of the State.
Joseph Gaston, who has lately figured
extensively in narrow gauge railroad
circles, told Mr. Stanley that his com-
pany had the means for building a
narrow gauge line into Jackson and
contemplated doing so in the near fu-
ture. All that they lacked was cer-
tain franchises which they had taken
steps to procure, after which the con-
struction of the road would be com-
menced at once. A corps of practical
engineers and surveyors would soon
take a look at the most feasible route.
The proposed line into the Rogue river
valley, was to be connected with the
road building from Winesburg in
this direction. It is to be hoped that
there may be something more than
mere talk in all this, and that the time
for our deliverance from isolation may
not be far distant.

BARNUM'S RIDICULOUS PLOT.—A
Philadelphia dispatch to the Chicago
"Tribune" dated Nov. 7th says: There
is no doubt of the truth of the reported
scheme of the Democrats to cast out
the State of New York. It is positively
known that Barnum and Kelly only
await the result in California and Ne-
vada to decide. If the States are
counted for Hancock proceedings will
commence at once to carry out the
plot. Without these Pacific coast
States New York would be of no avail,
but with their aid Kelly and Barnum
will attempt one of the most desperate
plays ever enacted to count in Han-
cock in New York and inaugurate him
on the 4th of March next. Barnum
and Kelly have not conceded Garfield's
election or New York State, and Barn-
um by a series of villainous dispatches,
sent prepaid broadcast throughout the
country, is endeavoring to prepare the
minds of the people for the surprise.

THAT PETITION AND MADAM HOLT.—
The "Times" publishes the text of a
petition to the Town Board of Jack-
sonville, numerously signed by the
voters, praying that the City Hall now
in course of construction be raised one
story higher. The petition, in advocat-
ing the necessity of a large audi-
ence room in the second story of said
City Hall building, alleges that Madam
Holt intends shortly to convert her
grand Hall into bed chambers and
thus destroy the only place fit for pub-
lic gatherings in the town. To this
Madam Holt indignantly objects and
says that she has authorized no one to
make such a statement, and says the
parties who make such an assertion
are unworthy to be taken into consid-
eration. There is not a bridge in
Jackson county that is needed as much
as this.
