BARNUM'S COMMITTEE IS TROUBLE.

The New York Democrats are in hot water over the forged Morey Garfield letter. The perpetrators of the forgery are being tried in the courts. A number of Barnum's "trumped up" witnesses have gone back on him, confessed that they were bought with money to prove the identity of H. L. Morey and the existence of the Employers' Union. The perjured witnesses have been sent to jail. Barnum's National Dem. Committee issue an address to the American people pleading the baby act, and declaring that they were imposed on by the proprietors of the "Truth" newspaper. They disavow any connection whatever with the villainous forgery scheme. The address is a virtual admission on the part of the committee that the proof of the forgery is full and conclusive. But what a pitiable fiasco has the National Democratic Committee made in the campaign just closed! A satanic system of mud-slinging, vituperation and forgery, unparalleled in the history of this or any other country, characterized Barnum's campaign. In all our political experience—and we have taken an active part in eight Presidential elections—we have not seen and heard so much reckless vilification of the character of a candidate for the Presidency as in the campaign just passed. The leaders of a party who will resort to such base means in running a campaign need never expect to be supported by the intelligent thinking people of this country.

Demoralized Democrats.

Our cotemporary in speaking of the Indiana election informs its readers that "thousands of demoralized Democrats stayed away from the polls, and yet the Republican majority is not heavy." Where does our cotemp. get his information? Garfield's official plurality in Indiana is 6,520, or only about 400 less than Porter received in October, and all this in a total vote of nearly 450,000! The truth is very few Democrats or Republicans either stayed away from the polls; both parties in the Hoosier State put in their best legs, in November as well as in October, and the twaddle about repeating, importing of negroes and "the thousands of demoralized Democrats" absenting themselves from the polls, is a bit of nonsense that no rational man will believe. The Democracy were fairly snowed under by Republican ballots both in Indiana and New York, and the American people will see to it that the popular will be clearly expressed will not be tampered with by a set of disappointed politicians.

The United States Senate.

There are many speculations about the U. S. Senate after the 4th of March next. A telegram from Washington of November 11th says: Grover, of Oregon, it is feared will not be able to resume his seat for sometime. His absence would, in the event of Mahone voting with the Republicans, merely make the casting vote of the Vice President unnecessary, but in the discussion of Mahone's power it is not generally known that the Democrats have also the power to prevent the organization of the United States Senate. Thirty-eight votes is the highest number, with Mahone's help, that the Republicans can cast, which is one less than a quorum. Besides Grover, Lamar, Mississippi is reported as overtaken during the campaign. He is regarded as an invalid. A later dispatch conveys this information about Oregon's sick Senator: Information was received from Senator Grover to-day, to the effect that he is steadily improving in health at a Wilmington, Del., water cure establishment, and that he will be in his seat upon the reassembling of Congress.

Henry Ward Beecher.

The following letter from the Rev. Henry Ward Beecher, in reference to his presiding over a Republican meeting at Brooklyn the last Saturday night before the election, at which Col. Ingersoll made the address, is made known:

BROOKLYN, October 29.
If it would promote the cause, I would preside at twenty meetings with twenty Robert Ingersolls to speak. This is no time to ask questions about a man's religious belief. If he believes in his country, in manhood, in liberty, he has the right to march in the ranks with me, or any other man. Do what you think best about it, and I will be obedient.

Universal Suffrage.

Lupeta Motz, one of the earliest of American champions of woman's suffrage, died Nov. 11, 1880, at her residence near Philadelphia in the 88th year of her age. She was one of the most earnest as well as the most gifted of American women. Upward of fifty years ago she predicted that the time would come when the free ballot would be given to the intelligent men of this country. She died without seeing her prophecy fulfilled, but her spirit is moving on in the direction of the enfranchisement of the mothers, wives, daughters and sisters of the "Model Republic."

A Good Thing for Miners and Lawyers.

A seventh edition of that much praised book, COPP'S HAND BOOK OF MINING LAW, will soon be out: to contain the State and Territorial mining laws, and instructions how to examine title, in addition to the lists of Government patents, digest of decisions, and other good things in previous editions.

Its editor Henry N. Copp, of Washington, D. C., has an extensive work on the same subject in press. It will give in full the Land Office and Court decisions now in force, and be the authority on the United States mining law without a doubt.

The New York "Sun," whose reputation for political morality has never been very exalted, is evidently getting pious. In one of its recent issues since the election it says: "The Republicans have done many things to carry the country which will not help them on the road to heaven, while there have been practices on the Democratic side not at all saintly."

Unhappy Ireland.

The Irish discontent is assuming gigantic proportions. In anticipation of an outbreak the British Government has stationed troops in different portions of the island. At last accounts parties of armed rioters had taken possession of several interior points threatening resistance to the onward march of the troops. The Government of Great Britain has a big job on hand to settle these Irish difficulties.

The dispatches have referred at different times to the "insurrection" on the back of the Republican tickets voted in the late election in New York. This insurrection was merely to designate whether the ballot was for president, judicial, city or county officers, and was not in any way in contravention of the election laws of that state or of the United States, as will be seen by references to files of the late New York papers, both Democratic and Republican.—"Oregonian."
