

Law of Newspapers.

Subscribers who do not give express notice to the contrary, are considered as wishing to continue their subscriptions.

1. If any subscriber under the dispensation of the law, the publisher must continue to send them until all arrears are paid.

2. If subscribers neglect or refuse to take their newspapers from the office to which they are directed, the law holds them responsible until they present the bills, and order them discontinued.

3. If subscribers remove to other places without informing the publisher, and the newspapers are sent to the former address, they are held responsible.

4. The Courts have decided that refusing to take newspapers from this office, or removing and leaving them uncollected, is prima facie evidence of intentional fraud.

5. The publisher who neglects to give legal notice of the suspension of a person to take from the office, or newspaper addressed to him, is liable to the publisher for the subscription price.

From "Dickens' Letters."

ADOLPH HOTEL, LIVERPOOL, Thursday, Oct. 15, 1888.—My DEAR HARRY: I have your letter this morning. I enclose you another check for £25, and I write to London by this post ordering three dozen sherry, two dozen port, and three dozen light claret to be sent down to you.

Now observe attentively. We must have no shadow of debt. Square up everything whatsoever that it has been necessary to buy. Let not a farthing be outstanding on my account when we begin together with your allowance. Be particular in the minutest detail.

I wish to have no secrets from you in the relations we are about to establish together, and I therefore send you Joe Chitney's letter today. Reading it, you will know exactly what I know, and will understand that I treat you with perfect confidence. It appears to me that an allowance of £250 a year will be handsome for all your wants, if I send you your wines. I mean this to include your tailor's bills as well as every other expense, and I strongly recommend you to buy nothing in Cambridge, and to take credit for nothing but the clothes with which your tailor provides you. 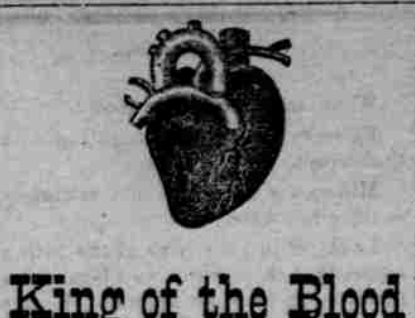
