RAILROAD MATTERS.

Remore of railroad connection are growing thicker, and it seems very possible that the great railroad combination of the Northwest may reach out for our trade. The "Oregonian" says there is no doubt but that the powerful O. R. & N. Co., have control of the North Pacific and that for some time Portland will be the terminus, and that paper is generally right on such matters. This gives reason for the belief that there is truth in the scheme published on the outside to-day and that when the O. & C. now ending at Roseburg is absorbed by the Willard combination, work will continue south of its present terminus.

The following from the Yreka "Journal" shows that the California Company is willing to build to the line and it gives good color to the flying reports:

"A gentleman of this place wrote to a prominent railroad official of the C. P. R. Co., in reference to the propositions of the Oregon combination of railroad and steamship companies, and other matters, and received the following reply on the railroad question:

"The papers say the Oregon R. & N. Co. is soon to take the O. & C. R., and then will commence the extension to the State line. If so, it will be met by the Oregon Division of the C. P. R., our people not feeling warranted in going above Redding unless the connection can safely be anticipated."

For fear our people may again be misled, they should not lose sight of the C. C. Wagon Road. Build that, and if the railroad company should come along, we will be that much better off. Remember the wagon road is for the people; while railroads are built for railroad companies.

The War in Africa.

The British are meeting with terrible reverses in the Transvaal, a large reinforcement from the Orange Republic having joined the Boers. Dispatches received in London dated the 27th of February state that General Colley has been killed and the British troops driven back with fearful slaughter only seven men of one whole regiment escaping.

A dispatch from Durban states that two companies of Highlanders remained on the summit of Spitzkop after the retreat, throwing stones on the advancing Boers, and subsequently received them at the point of the bayonet. These people are fighting for their independence and have the sympathy of all Europe. Now would be an opportune moment for the Irish to strike if they were only able.

The Albany Register.

It is with regret that the burning of nearly the whole outfit of the Albany Register is noted, the fire occurring on the 23d ult. Mr. Vanderve and family barely escaping with their lives. Very little of the material of the office was saved but Mart Brown of the Democrat, with characteristic generosity, placed his office at Van's disposal and enabled him to issue a half sheet. We hope to soon see the Register on a sound footing again.

NO CHINESE CITIZENSHIP.

The following dispatch, dated Chicago February 28, may allay the fears of those who distress themselves about the danger of Chinese naturalization: "The application of Moy Sam, a Chinaman, for naturalization papers, was denied by Judge Morrison of the Criminal Court, on the ground that the applicant was not a white man within the meaning of the law. The Judge quoted largely from the decision of Judge Sawyer of California.

Query.

The Corvallis Gazette asks the editor of the Oregonian, who makes open confession that he stuck to Senator Mitchell too long, how long he stuck to him after he found out how bad a man he was! The answer is, just as long as Scott was allowed to suck the milk out of the Custom House cocoon.

Senator Booth has introduced in the U. S. Senate an amendment to the River and Harbor bill, proposing an appropriation of 15,000 for the repair of the salmon fisheries on McCloud river, swept away by the recent floods. The amendment was referred to the Commerce Committee.

The Senate of Arkansas have resolved by a vote of 65 to 17 to propose a constitutional amendment prohibiting the sale of liquor in the State. The Senate also decided that the pronunciation of this State is "Arkansaw."

John J. Mitchell of Tioga county is the newly elected U. S. Senator from Pennsylvania.

THE "OREGONIAN" AS A SCHOOLMASTER.

Having instructed the Chicago Times and New York Tribune in political economy, and imparted other lessons in the printer's statecraft to these "village sheets," the Oregonian now, in the most awe inspiring way, calls up the "small fry" papers of Oregon for instruction. The lesson is what the Oregonian knows about "cocoanuts and the milk therein," and the class is dismissed with a solemn warning against "toadyism," "Hippicism" and the foolish practice of loyalty and gratitude. This is, indeed, a wise and worthy pedagogy, much experienced in "cocoanuts" and never suspected of sucking one if the milk were sour. After charging the Mountaineer with the heinous offence of being inspired and edited by the land office at The Dalles, which is probably as true as any of the other falsehoods inspired by an insane hatred of Senator Mitchell and his friends, the Oregonian accuses the SENTINEL with "loyalty to the source of the profits it has enjoyed through surveying contracts and jobs of various kinds." This is as near the truth as the editor of the Oregonian—Mitchell—can arrive, as the SENTINEL never received any jobs, whatever, from Senator Mitchell. It is true its editor did receive a surveying contract last year and, on application the Surveyor General can tell why, wherefore, and by whom it was given and that it was entirely outside of any political influences. But, if it were true; is it a crime to be loyal to those from whose hands proper favors have been received? The editor of the Oregonian would make it so and can not appreciate the meaning of loyalty. If it implies human gratitude—gross and greedy natures never can—as an egotist is, proverbially, an ingrate from the force of his own self worship. The next lesson will be "toadyism" and its relation to "cocoanuts" and the editor of the "ouly paper" is accorded the highest scholarly eminence in this branch of political ethics. It is not past the memory of man, when there was, at Albany, a Republican Convention. The present editor of the SENTINEL was there, as the single representative of the Republican party of Oregon was pending and its fates supposed uncertain. Just then the present editor of the Oregonian appeared "in hot haste" and we well remember his abject, servile, pitiful pleadings for votes in favor of the Mitchell resolution. The worst that could have been said a bout Mr. Mitchell had been said. The utmost that could be proved against him was known to every one, but he who now turns against him with pretended nausea was then the most grovelling, legerally and obsequious of his followers. Why? Simply because he was then collector of customs at Portland, growing fat on the creamy and unctuous milk of the Custom House "cocoanut" and the object of his parasitical fawning, a newly elected Senator with the power to remove him. Therefore, and by virtue of other abject and sycophantic cringing to the Senator, yet untold, in this man entitled to the "Baccalaureate" in all that is mean, and duplicitous and contemptible in the meanest and most despicable of political arts—"toadyism"—and when he undertakes to probe the motives of others he must expect to have his own political leprosy exposed. The pretension of the Oregonian, under its present management, to lead the Republicans of Oregon is merely impudent. Its free trade theories do not comport well with the protective demands of the party platform; nor indeed, with the tenacity with which it clings to a monopoly of dispatches, and its manifest virulence to the man, who of all others, has best used his position in the party for the material advancement of the commonwealth, disposes of its pretensions very effectually. The relative position of the gentleman, that dictates to the Oregon Republican press, to the party, and that of Mr. Mitchell are widely dissimilar. Mr. Mitchell is always ready to abide by its will, the Oregonian assumes the right to dictate its will, while disguising its spiteful littleness under the veil of public welfare and if it expects the press of Oregon to revolve around it as satellites round a central sun and applaud its poor efforts to besime the best representative the State ever had, it will be grievously mistaken. For the present, to use the Oregonian's own language, "one who keeps his eyes and ears open knows" that the bitter malevolence of the editor of the "ouly paper" towards Mr. Mitchell, his quondam friend, is only because the "cocoanut" was untimely snatched from his over greedy lips before it was sucked dry.
