

Law of Newspapers.

Subscribers who do not give express notice to the contrary, are considered as wishing to continue their subscriptions.

1. If any subscriber under the discontinuance of his subscription, the publisher may continue to send him until all arrears are paid.

2. If subscribers neglect or refuse to take their newspapers from the office to which they are directed, the publisher shall be held responsible until they have settled the bill, and ordered their discontinuance.

3. If subscribers remove to other places without advising the publisher, and the newspapers are sent to the former direction, they are held responsible.

4. The Courts have decided that refusing to take newspapers from this office, or removing and leaving them uncollected, is prima facie evidence of intentional fraud.

5. The postmaster who neglects to give legal notice of the neglect of a person to take from the office a newspaper addressed to him, is liable to the publisher for the subscription price.

PRIMITIVE JUSTICE.

An incident was brought to mind the other day that took place in one of the Courts of Justice in Crescent City in the "early days," which we publish to give our readers an idea of how justice was meted out to those who did not conform strictly to the codes, or rather to the law as interpreted by the diciples of Blackstone at that time.

In the year 1857 a certain gunsmith by the name of Perry, who was, perhaps, better acquainted with the rules of repairing an old musket than those of law, was duly elected and qualified as a Justice of the Peace for this Township, and who entered upon the discharge of his duties as such with all the dignity of a "Roman Senator."

Now at that time Jasper Houck, who has for a number of years been engaged in the hotel business at Ashland, Oregon, was the proprietor of the Oriental at Crescent City, which was "the" hotel of the town, and having been annoyed by Wm. Townsend, more familiarly known in the community as "Old Bill," from the fact of having forced his company upon the landlord and his patrons, he was told that if he persisted in his annoyances, and came into the hotel again, he would cut him with a penknife which he had at the time in his hand, measuring off about an eighth of an inch of the blade, which he said he intended to use.

Old Bill made a rush for Mr. H., who, true to his word, made a slash at him, inflicting quite a scratch in the neck of his assailant. Of rushed the wounded man to the halls of justice, a warrant was issued and soon our friend found himself face to face with the newly fledged but dignified magistrate. J. P. Haynes, now Superior Judge of Humboldt county, being at that time District Attorney of this county, appeared for the prosecution, and H. I. Preston, quite a noted lawyer, was employed as attorney for the defense.

After a great many witnesses were examined on both sides, and argument was made by the respective counsels, the case was submitted to the Court and the defendant found "guilty."

"Now, Mr. Houck," said his Honor, "you stand up!" The defendant arose and the Justice continued. "I shall fine you \$10 and half the cost of this suit. And as for you, Bill Townsend, (turning to that person) you are a disgrace to the community! I shall fine you \$10 and the other half of the cost."

"But," suggested Mr. Preston, "Mr. Townsend is not on trial; he is not charged with having committed any crime. He is only here as a witness."

"Mr. Preston" said his Honor, "this Court tried this case, and when it wants any of your advice it will call on you. Sit down!" And he sat. Court was immediately adjourned, and after the pomposity of the new Justice had somewhat subsided, and it was deemed safe to approach him, Mr. Haynes pointed out where he had committed a grave error. Accordingly, the Court was called on the following morning, and the parties all summoned to appear, when the case was dismissed and the disgraced Justice resigned.—[Del Norte Record.]

Coolness Met With Coolness.

There is a story being freely circulated at the clubs and in society that a mysterious man was traced into Windsor castle, where he was last seen with a flat candlestick in his arm and it can not be proved that he ever came out.
