THE RAGING ELEMENTS.

As the summer advances the dread- ed cyclones and tornadoes set in to de- vastate fair portions of the land east of the Rockies. The first cyclone this year was the one reported in Texas, the early part of May, which uprooted trees and destroyed farm houses, crops, &c. On the night of June 9th a storm struck Lyon county, Kansas, which did great damage to crops, buildings, etc. The town of Americus, near Emporia, was nearly totally destroyed, every building being more or less injured. Immense quantities of hail fell during the storm. This same storm extended into Southwest Missouri where it ex- panded itself. The wind was not so severe, but hail fell over a large area of country and did great damage to crops and window glass. A water spout burst in a little valley in Barry county, and before the people could reach the surrounding hills a torrent of water rushed down, taking with it houses, tents, household goods and animals. Three women, seven small children and one man were swept away by the flood, but were rescued some hours after.

But by far the most severe storm was on Sunday, the 13th of June. The towns of King City, Rosedale and Ber- lin in northwestern Missouri were de- stroyed by three cyclones on that day, one following quick upon the other. The destruction of life is appalling, and property destroyed immense. The same cyclone which visited north-west- ern Missouri on Sunday destroyed an immense amount of property in Sumner and Sedgewick counties, Kansas, and central Iowa, southeastern Minnesota, and every where cyclones swept. Many lives were lost in Iowa, the wind being accompanied by a water spout. Near Mulvane, Kansas, a two story frame house was picked up from the ground, turned over twice and broken to pieces; occupants all killed. The wind was so hot that vegetation was all withered near Des Moines, Iowa. Hail stones fell as large as goose eggs, killing people and stock, poultry and game. Altogether the storm was the most severe ever experi- enced, even in that country of torna- does.

During the fearful cyclone near To- peka, Kansas, on Sunday the 13th instant, a horse weighing about 900 pounds was lifted out of the stable and carried over a high hill, and dashed upon the ground in a cornfield a mile away. Cattle were lifted from the ground and carried into the air and dashed to pieces. The same afternoon the destroying wave struck the neigh- borhood of Savannah, Andrew county, Mo., leveling everything in its wake. Within a radius of twelve miles, 62 persons were injured and lost their lives, and hundreds of heads of horse, cattle and sheep were killed. One man near King City had 80 head of cattle killed. The same day Western and Central Iowa was similarly visited. At the latter place the cyclone was accompanied by a shower of ice, the like was never seen in Iowa. The hailstones were of the shape of a door- knob, weighing each one pound.

"FUN" RIPPED IN THE BED.

The indictment by the Ashland Jus- tice Court against Profs. L. L. Rog- ers and La Dru Royal for cruelty to animals was, after a full hearing by the Grand Jury, thrown out at its session on Tuesday. We refrained from commenting upon this case at the time it first became public for reasons which all will perceive. But the whole county has felt that not only these gentlemen, eminent as teachers and ministers, have been wronged by this prosecution, but that the tax-payers have been made to pay for an attempt at spite on the part of some and "see- ing the fun" on the part of others. It is a notorious fact that the team driv- en by these men was much jaded by three or four trips to Jacksonville the same week; and that the men should be anxious to reach a funeral in Jack- sonville and a Sunday appointment in going back the next day—the roads being bad—that, under such circum- stances, the horses should be heated is not wonderful, surely no cause for criminal action. But the good sense of the Grand Jury in throwing this case out of Court spoils the "fun" of those infatuated Ashland persecutors and nips in the bud a law suit that would have involved the county in great expense. If the par- ties who are so anxious to prosecute these men want "a little fun out of the preachers," they should at least have it at their own expense and not make the county pay for their folly. We are in favor of punishing all law-breakers and shall shield none—be they layman or preacher—but we are opposed to going to law just "for the fun of the thing," simply to gratify a few spiteful mal- contents. The charge against the ac- cused was uncalculated, and the Grand Jury did right in kicking it out of court.

The Crescent City Wagon Road.

The following note from Mr. H. Gasquet will explain itself. It will be seen that Mr. Gasquet has in good faith and earnestness taken hold of the construction of the wagon road from his place to Waldo. Having cut loose from the encumbrance of the Crescent City members of the commit- tee, whose do-nothing policy only pre- vented him from taking active measures, he will without further delay proceed with the work. The Burlington "Hawkeye" regrets the quarrel in the Republican party, but to show that all the wrong doing is not on one side, supposes a case like this: Suppose the President without consulting Senator Allison, would re- move Jacob Rich of this State from the Pension Agency, and appoint in his place H. C. Van Loven, a bitter per- sonal enemy of Senator Allison, who never loses a chance to abuse and vilify the senator, and who, in addition to this, votes the Republican ticket just when it suits him. If such a thing should happen we imagine that some of the "mustangs" in this State that have their heads down, and their hind quarters in the air, aimed at Conkling, would reverse position, and aim their kicks at the President. It makes a great difference with the average American citizen whose bovine is be- ing gored.

The difference between Republican statesmen and Democratic demagog- uism in public finance is illustrated by the conversion of the remaining 5s and 6s into 3 1/2 per cents. The Demo- cratic Congress worked at a bill for refunding these bonds, which they wanted to carry out by a forced loan from the national banks. The agita- tion and menace disturbed the money market until a panic was made and the rate of interest rose to 1 1/2 per cent. a day. The President vetoed their bill. Then Secretary Windom, without any forced loan, any commis- sion, any syndicate, any double interest, any disturbance of the money market, converted these bonds by simply offer- ing the holders the option of payment of 3 1/2 per cent. interest, to continue during the government's pleasure.

William Healy, one of the oldest miners of upper Applegate, spent a few days in town this week. Bill says "there are millions in it," if only the proper appliances could be brought to bear on it.

Judge W. R. Willis of Roseburg came in on the 11th inst. accompanied by his wife and four children. They went over on Tuesday to the Grand Applegate mines to remain a few days, during the progress of the clean-up now taking place.

Geo. Schumpf, the mail carrier, on Wednesday brought in a beautiful nugget of washed gold, weighing over four ounces. It was found a few days ago at the Collins & Thurman claim on Elliott creek at a point washed out by last winter's freshet. The nugget was valued at \$81.12 1/2.

Richard Cook, one of our mining ex- perts, left this week for Siskiyou county to take a look at the quartz ledge of Messrs. Miller & Kime. Mr. Cook has been employed to make a thorough ex- amination of the property and pass his opinion upon its value preparatory to opening the mine with machinery, etc.

Horace Seybert, of Wagner creek canyon, has lately been prospecting a quartz ledge which he discovered on the mountain dividing the waters of Little Applegate from the waters of Wagner creek. The quartz prospects \$30 (fine gold) to the ton of rock. Mr. Seybert thinks he struck a good thing.

Considerable excitement is being created here over the appearance of quartz recently found in the Warner range hills. Somebody expects to strike a bonanza at no distant day within a stone's throw of town. Evidently there is an abundance of the precious metal in the hills hereabout, and all that is needed is enterprise with a little capital to develop some of the ledges already located.—[Lakeview Herald.]

The report of Commissioners Alford and Cook on the proposed Rogue river bridge was received and contract for building the same let to A. McNeil and H. Deskins for \$350.

Up to this writing (June 17th) the Senatorial dead-lock in New York con- tinues, the Democrats voting solid for their men and the Republicans divid- ing between Conkling, Cornell, De- Pew and others. The complications seem rather to be on the decrease, and there is no telling what the end will be.
