he contrary, are considered as wishing to continue heir subscriptions.

1. Haay subscribers order the discontinuance of hid newspapers, the publisher may continue to send them until all arrearages are paid.

2. If subscribers neglect or refuse to take their newspapers from the offices to which they are discoted, the law holds them responsible until they have settled the bills, and ordered them discontinued.

4. If subscribers remove to other places without aforming the publisher, and the newspapers are sent to the former direction, they are held responsible.

5. The Courts have decided that refusing to take newspapers from this office, or removing and leaving them uncalled for, is prima facie evidence of instantional france.

6. The postmaster who neglects to give legal ne-

6. The postmaster who neglects to give legal no-tee of the neglect of a person to take from the office, i.e newspaper addressed to him, is liable to the pub-sher for the subscription price.

CONKLING PHOTOGRAPHED.

Senator Ingalls of Kansas, in a recent interview with a reporter of the Leavenworth Times, photographed Senator Conkling more correctly than we have ever before seen. We copy a portion of the interview:

How do the Republican Senators feel regarding the resignation of Mr. Conkling? They generally regard the resignation as an indefensible, inexcusable and illogical act for which no sensible reason can be given and no good argument offered; a sensational, childish, theatrical, mock heroic display of ill humor, wounded vanity and offended arrogance and conceit. Without consultation with either political friend or foe, so far as is known, he deliberately threw the organization of the Senate into the hands of the Democrats, It was the general belief at the time that the New York Legislature had been polled in advance, and that both Conkling and Platt were certain of an immediate return; but even this judgment in the light of subsequent events, appears to have been premature. It looks as though the re-election of these gentlemen was decidely dubious and uncertain.

My opinion of Mr. Conkling is, said the Senator, that he is a great man in many respects. He has been a conspicuous and a commanding factor in American politics for many years, and possesses many extraordinary intellectual qualities but, his character is deformed and his reputation marred by petty frivolous affectations and mannerism which have largely detracted from his usefulness as a party leader. He quarreled with Gen. Grant during the early years of his first administration until his terms were acceded to; his relations to President Haves were on terms of personal hostility with many of his associates in the Senate while his difficulties with Gordon, Lamar, Burnside and many others, both Republicans and Democrats, are a part of the public history of the United States Senate for the past five years.
