Railroad companies are not always very reliable. They usually run their lines where their best interests are subserved. We have known railroad routes to be surveyed, located, graded, culverts built, and everything ready for putting down the ties and rails, and then afterward seen them abandoned. The initial and terminal points of projected lines of railway have a great deal to do with their construction.

MRS. COURTNEY'S DEATH.—Mrs. Mary Jane, wife of D. C. Courtney, departed this life in Jacksonville, after a protracted and painful illness, July 18, 1881. She was born in Tennessee in 1832, and at an early day moved with her parents to Alabama and from there to Missouri in which latter state she grew up to womanhood and was married to her first husband. Deceased came to this coast in 1860, where many adverse circumstances awaited her, and affliction and suffering seemed to be her destiny. Ever since the birth of her first child she has more or less complained of pain in her right breast, which culminated in what was afterward known as a cancer of a very painful and annoying character. During her last illness she bore her sufferings with a fortitude and patience that were truly remarkable. At no time during her affliction did her trust in God forsake her, and as the hour of dissolution drew near all was in readiness for the great event. She died in great peace and in the hope of a blissful immortality beyond this vale of tears. Mrs. Courtney leaves a beloved husband, with whom she has lived only five years, and a grown son and daughter, the children of two former husbands. On the day of her death she had attained the age of 48 years, 10 months and 18 days. Rev. M. A. Williams conducted the funeral obsequies. [Albany papers please copy.]
