

Law of Newspapers.

Subscribers who do not give express notice to the contrary, are considered as wishing to continue their subscriptions.

1. If any subscriber orders the discontinuance of a newspaper, the publisher may continue to send them until all arrears are paid.
2. If subscribers neglect or refuse to take their newspapers from the office to which they are directed, the law holds them responsible until they are notified of the discontinuance.
3. If subscribers remove to other places without informing the publisher, and the newspapers are sent to the former direction, they are held responsible.
4. The Courts have decided that refusing to take newspapers from this office, or removing and leaving them uncollected for, is prima facie evidence of intentional fraud.
5. The postmaster who neglects to give legal notice of the neglect of a person to take from the office a newspaper addressed to him, is liable to the publisher for the subscription price.

Disappearance of the Bison.

It is estimated that 100,000 buffalo hides have been sent out of the Yellowstone country alone this season. Last year the output only reached 35,000, the usual average. Many of the present yield of skins were doubtless taken from the carcasses of the dead animals frozen in the last terrible winter; but the slaughter of the herds has increased every year with the irruption of settlers into the valleys. They were shot down like sheep out of pure wantonness, in most instances left to rot untouched where they fall, the dollar or two which the hide would bring not being worth the trouble or time of removing it. In the meantime every dead buffalo is so much food taken from the half starved Indian. The buffalo is as much his source of life as the wheat field is that of his white brother. Yet suppose the Utes this year should take to burning the standing grain, what should we say? If there is any better specimen of the pure cussedness of a certain phase of the American mind than this buffalo slaughter we don't know it. Can't Congress do something to stop this slaughter.

A recent article in the New York Tribune says that the oleander is such a deadly poison that a horse which had eaten a bunch of leaves died in a short time. Persons picking and eating the blossoms have also died from the effects. The branches divested of dark and used as skewers have poisoned the meat roasted on them, and killed seven out of the twelve who partook of it.

The long continuance of the sweltering heat east of the Rockies is protrating many of our friends in that section of the country. Sunstrokes continue to be very numerous and suffering humanity is pining for a fresh breeze and cooling shower. What makes the heat so oppressive is that there is no let-up day or night. How vastly different and how much more agreeable are the summers in Oregon than in the Eastern States!

The State University, at Eugene City, is \$7,000 in debt, and has lately been in great trouble to raise funds. The Association has threatened to move the institution to some other town. On the 2d Henry Villard telegraphed to Judge M. P. Deady as follows: "I will be glad to donate \$7,000 to liquidate the University indebtedness, and you may draw on me for that amount." The kind offer was immediately accepted.

Lieut. Schwatka of Arctic exploration fame, lectured in Salem on the 8th instant to a highly appreciative audience. His description of his sledge journey of 3251 miles in a period of eleven months and twenty days through the heart of an Arctic winter, with the thermometer 103 degrees below freezing, excited a lively interest.
