The exercises of the reunion will consist of the old soldiers, their organization, reception by the city authorities, general muster, picnic on the hill tops, visit to the zoological garden, visit to the Cincinnati exposition, grand parade, camp chats and songs, a good time and banquet on the night of the 16th.

The latch string will hang out, and in the name of all men, women and children of this city and county, the committee on invitation invite you to come to chat and fight your battles over again.
