It is reported that all the Cabinet except Mac Veagh will act until the meeting of December.

The oath of office was administered to Chester A. Arthur, as President of the United States, by Hon. John R. Brady, Justice of the Supreme Court of the State of New York, last Tuesday.

It is asserted that President Arthur is trying to harmonize the conflicting elements among New York Republicans. There will be a majority against Stalwarts in the State Convention, which meets on Wednesday.

A new and delicate way of announcing that a sermon was but poorly attended has been invented by the New York Star, which mentions that "a Star reporter constituted about twenty per cent of the congregation."

The Cincinnati Gazette notes it as a singular fact that none of the Presidents who have died in office were Democrats. And the Virginia Enterprise improves the occasion to remark that of late years the Democrats haven't had the opportunity. They have been dying to get in office.

The Governor of Michigan has issued a proclamation to the people of the United States, urging upon their attention the needs of 15,000 homeless and destitute sufferers by the recent fires, and detailing the vast amount of territory burned over. The case really seems to be desperate and to call for united and desperate efforts from every section of the country.

Railroad men are already up at Sisson's and along the Sacramento river, securing the right of way, and surveyors will be up in a few days to commence the surveys above and below Sisson's. There is no doubt about the road extending to the Oregon line by way of the Sacramento river road, else the C. P. R. R. Co. would not send men out to locate and survey the route for building.—"Journal"

The Garfield Monumental Committee report a total of \$33,770. Letters are being received by every mail from all parts of the country, containing contributions in large and small sums. The Monument Committee wishes to correct the impression by its first circular that contributions are limited to \$1. Any will be received, larger or smaller. Every contributor's name will be recorded in the book, which will be deposited in the monument.

On the morning of the 20th Warden Crocker visited the jail. Guiteau asked him concerning the President's condition, expressing fear that the President was nearing the end. Crocker then told him the President was dead. Guiteau instantly sank back much excited. He then rose and paced the floor and appeared to be praying. When told the particulars, he said he was glad the President's sufferings were over, and would not have committed the deed had he known he was to suffer so. He has a deadly fear of mobs, and urges the United States to protect him.

Dispatches of Oct. 3d say that Judge David Davis, besides being a general choice for President of the Senate, is on the cabinet slate and it is alleged he will be offered the attorney generalship. His resignation from the senate would give the Republicans another senator, and control of the senate. Garfield tried by every means to get him into the cabinet, but vainly, though Blaine, an intimate friend of Davis, spent hours talking over the matter with him. Davis could have had any office in the gift of the administration, either a supreme court, foreign mission, or cabinet place. He refused all offers on the principle that he should not desert his post, and he still refuses.

Henry Villard the railroad King of the North, is a native of France, and started from the bed rock. He came to this country in 1851, a poor boy of 16, without friends or influence, and entirely ignorant of the language. Having mastered the English language, he became a journalist, and during this portion of his career his letters to the New York Tribune and the Cincinnati Commercial were leading features of those journals. At the close of the war, Mr. Villard returned to his native land, where he resided for some years. He subsequently returned to this country, as financial agent of the German bondholders interested in American railroads. His skillful management gave satisfaction to his principals and increased his own wealth. His connection with this coast began with the purchase of several coast and portage lines of steamers in Oregon. These he consolidated as the Oregon Railway and Navigation Company.

PRESIDENT ARTHUR.

Chester A. Arthur is now the President of the United States. He occupies an office to which, as is well known, he could not have been elected. But he has the office rightfully, and he is entitled to the full and hearty support of the whole American people. His advent to the office was the signal for much speculation, as to the possible removal of Cabinet officers, which was suddenly cut short by the immediate resignation of the entire Cabinet. It should be remembered, however, that he has not the power to remove any member of the Cabinet without the consent of Congress. Of course, members are at liberty to resign, and this is what they have done. The President has requested them to continue for the present, and just what he will eventually do about accepting the resignations, it is impossible to predict; but even if he should make some changes, it should not be accepted as a departure from the policy of his predecessor, except in the improbable event of his calling to the Cabinet such men as are known to be hostile to that policy. It is equally useless and unfair to indulge in unfavorable criticism, or to draw comparisons between what President Arthur may do, and what other Vice-Presidents did, who succeeded to the office as he has done. Because Tyler, Fillmore and Johnson were all untrue to the principles and policies of the administrations which they succeeded, it does not therefore follow, that President Arthur will be. It should also be remembered, that the President occupies a position of peculiar delicacy. The eyes of a whole world are upon him, and will measure every official act, by a standard much too high for most of men. We should be satisfied if he but carries out, to the best of his abilities, the main features of the Garfield administration, and we should not be too ready to quibble about unimportant details.

An effort is being made to procure the establishment of some sort of Government in the Territory of Alaska. This Territory has been in our possession for 14 years, and yet nothing has ever been done to provide for the protection of life or property, or for the punishment of offenders. Indeed there is literally no law in Alaska, and no one authorized to enforce it, if there was. Alaska is a long way off, and most of it is locked up in perpetual ice and snow, yet for all that, it has proved a profitable possession, and the United States should see that some simple form of government is immediately organized there. Any country that is entitled to hoist the stars and stripes, has the right to demand that the spirit and meaning of that flag shall be maintained.

The Sun's Milwaukee correspondent has interviewed Scoville, Guiteau's brother-in-law, the lawyer selected by Guiteau to conduct his defense. He has said that he could not decide what course he would pursue till he had conferred with his wife, Guiteau's sister. His sister will do all that she can for him, and he will do so himself, as he is fairly convinced that the man is demented. There will not be any great effort made to defend him. Scoville says: "If I appear, I will simply put before the jury matters relating to his mental condition, whether the indictment is faulty or not."

A First Lieutenant of Infantry in the Regular Army named Hay has been tried by Court martial in Colorado for winning \$102 on one hand in a game of poker. The Lieutenant's offense consisted in dealing himself a sequence flush, when four kings, four queens or four jacks were kindly and dexterously paroled out to his opponents. It was charged that the "pot" was not honestly won, and an attempt was made to show that the lucky Lieutenant had "rung in a cold deck" on his comrades. The charge was not sustained, and the poker-player was acquitted.

The coming election in New York will be an important one. All the State officers, except Governor and Lieutenant-Governor, are to be chosen, including the Legislature, the Senators holding for two years. There are four Congressional vacancies to be filled. The Legislature to be elected this Fall will have to re-district the State for election of Members of Congress for the next ten years.

The Insane Asylum.

The north ward of the Insane Asylum says the Salem Talk, is up and all ready for the tin to be placed on the roof. The walls of the adjoining ward south are all up ready for the roof, and the walls of the main or central part of the building, which will be four stories high when completed—one story higher than the remainder of the building—will be finished in a few days time, as also the kitchen and chapel. Work has been commenced on the walls of the south wards but it is not likely that they will be completed this Fall. Work on the building is being pushed forward as fast as possible. We learn that quite a number of carpenters are wanted. The Asylum when completed will be an immense building, and will be quite substantial looking.

The Republican senator caucus is called for to day at 10 o'clock. A plan for organizing the Democrats meet at the same time. Some compromise is being made of the Democratic caucus, a compromise and hold that under the law and custom the organization of Senate ought to be within Democratic control. Some Democrats, however, prefer if possible to agree quietly in advance. It is stated that Pendleton and Garland are among the latter class, but say they expect to abide by the caucus decision. Both sides desire to avoid a partisan contest, but it is not improbable that one may occur. The President of the Senate will be so close to the Presidency of the United States, only one life intervening, that both parties are anxious to possess the office and think it is worth a struggle.

It is reported that Corkhill, the official attorney for the District of Columbia, favors the Star route thieves to such an extent, that it is necessary to conceal from him the details of the government's case against those notorious swindlers. If this is true, Mr. Corkhill should be promptly cracked up, and kicked out upon the cold charities of the world. The people are in no humor to tolerate any attempt at whitewashing in this matter, as the administration will learn to its sorrow, if all the guilty parties connected with that infamous business who can be reached by law, are not speedily and severely punished.
