HAD POLICY FOR OREGON.

Some of our contemporaries in Oregon are anxious to know "whether Oregon is to be recognized by a place on the committee of commerce in the lower House of Congress." The enquiry is both pertinent and important; as a place on that particular committee would put our representative in a most advantageous position to procure congressional aid for the State. All legislation is framed in the various committees. Every thing is given shape in the committee rooms; in fact all work is really performed in committee and no bill can pass the House unless favorably reported by the committee to which it has been referred. Under ex-

isting circumstances it is not likely, however, that Oregon will obtain a place on the committee of commerce or, indeed, on any other, so long as the policy of sending new representatives to each succeeding congress is adhered to. It is the rule to make up congressional committees, not with reference to locality; but according to seniority of members and, therefore, it must be evident that if we continue to send new representatives, our member, no matter what his ability may be, must be contented to take a back seat and labor at a disadvantage. Is it not time that we changed our policy and initiated that of other states? Elsewhere, men are returned to Congress continuously, for nearly a life time, until experience with fellow members and familiarity with public affairs make them strong in behalf of their constituencies and entitle them, by the "seniority" rule, to the places that command all legislative power. Not once, since the admission of Oregon as a state, have we re-elected a Senator or representative and the niggardly and parsimonious appropriations for our rivers and harbors, begged of Congress—not demanded as a right, are the fruit of our false policy. We never had a better opportunity to change our policy than at present. We are represented by a young man of irreproachable character; of good ability; of energy and industry; eager to devote his whole time in the service of the state, full of that rare magnetism that attracts and secures the friendly assistance of others; which is so essential to an isolated member of so large a body as Congress. We believe it is in the power of the Republican party of Ogn. to re-elect Mr. George and, we believe, it will be false to the best interests of the state if it fails to re-nominate him; and if he fails in a re-election, which is highly improbable, the party will suffer no discredit. It is not that there are not other good men in Mr. George's party; but because he is in Congress and that his endorsement would give him position and strength, that he should be returned. We ask Republicans to weigh this matter carefully and ask themselves; if it is not time we changed a manifestly bad policy, and adopted the wiser one of other states?

Railroad News.

Items regarding operations on the railroad lines, now being surveyed are scarce. John Hulbert has run five or six new lines from the summit of the Siskiyou pass southward to the base of the mountain. He has moved his camp, to a point near Rufus Coles, and will continue the projection of the lines until the best one is established. The surveying parties south of Roseburg are still in the field setting slope stakes and projecting new lines. The tunnel through the Cow creek hill will be about 750 feet in length. Chas J. Howard has been engaged as assistant with Mr. Dolson's party which will commence establishing the line between Cow creek and Rock Point at once. It seems to be generally conceded that the road will be built up Cow creek and that the canyon will be avoided.

THE DEDICATION.

On last Sunday morning, according to notice, the dedication services took place at the new Presbyterian Church. Long before 11 o'clock, the hour appointed, the church was crowded with an expectant throng and if they anticipated an intellectual treat they were not disappointed. The vocal music was well selected and the choir, composed of Miss Tilly Miller, Miss Kate Hoffman, Misses Cora and Maggie Linn, Mrs. Shipley (organist), Mr. Boyer, S. Wise and Mr. Hoffman, and led by Mr. Brooks, did splendidly, and the Voluntary, gracefully performed on the organ by Miss Carrie Beckman, was exquisite. Before introducing Rev Mr. Hill, the venerable pastor Mr. Williams, gave a history of his missionary work here during the past twenty four years and must have felt no little pride in the beautiful edifice reared after so many years of patient waiting; and

lians then paid a graceful and fitting tribute to the generous men and faithful women, whose liberal donations and willing toil had contributed so much to the work, and without whose aid it could never have been consummated. The discourse of Mr. Hill was most appropriate, and couched in beautiful and classic language; it recounted the building of the Temple of Solomon without sound of hammer or chisel, rising almost mysteriously, course upon course, till its builders themselves were astonished with its beauty and symmetry; but the grandest temple of all was that reared by individual builders in their own hearts. Thus closing his remarks, the speaker, in behalf of the Presbyterian synod of Oregon, and in behalf of the worthy men and women whose joint efforts had raised the beautiful temple, dedicated it to the worship of the Most High. A beautiful and impressive anthem was sung by the choir and the audience retired pleased and edified with the services that hallowed the walls and made them sacred. The church, is without doubt, the handsomest edifice of the kind in any town south of Portland. It is elegantly yet plainly finished and will cost a trifle less than \$4,500, over half of that amount being the generous gift of C. C. Beckman of this place. It will seat, comfortably, over two hundred persons, and its acoustic properties are admirable, every word from the pulpit being distinctly heard in any part of the auditorium. The architect, Mr. Linn, deserves much credit for his faithful and exact execution of the original plan, improved in some minor details by his taste. The beautiful stained windows, throughout the whole upper portion of the building have a charming effect and the large window, facing the street is particularly beautiful. The basement, yet unfinished, will, in good time, be used for a Sabbath school and for the other general business of the church. We believe there is but little debt hanging over the church and it is the intention of the ladies to organize a home missionary society to provide for the small current expenses and for the dissemination of charity. The day must have been most gratifying to Mr. Wm. Hoffman, himself a liberal contributor, and who has been indefatigable and tireless in his efforts to found this church, and who now sees the realization of a life time dream. May it long endure, a monument to its worthy founders, and may its influence for good be far beyond their most sanguine hopes.

MINING NOTES.

Newman and Bybee are busy piping in their rich claim near Waldo with a full head of water and have splendid prospects.

Work on the Sterling was resumed early the present week, with about a half head of water, but it is not likely to continue long on account of the cold freezing nights.

The large ditch of Newell Delemater, from Days' gulch to Cow flat, has been finished for some time and men are now engaged in putting the hydraulic pipe together. This ditch is to work the claim purchased from Malachi Baughman, just below the mouth of Josephine creek, and it will also command a large amount of valuable ground between the mouth of Days gulch and the Baughman ground.

The extensive hydraulic claim of Simmons and Wimer at Waldo is being worked with a full force night and day. A few nights since the company were unlucky enough to lose their locomotive head light, used in the claim. It was burning too high when a hand tried to turn it down but the flames got a new start and completely destroyed the lamp. It will cost \$75 and some time to replace it.

Rock from the Schumpf ledge, at Willow Springs, at a depth of one hundred feet, looks very well and is said to prospect about \$25 per ton. It is a close blackish grey quartz much resembling the rock from the "Black Bear" mine. There is plenty of it and if it will work \$20 per ton it will yield a good profit. We hope that it will pay to work, as there have been but few successes in quartz in this section, and Mr. Schumpf has shown a good deal of pluck in running his tunnel over 300 feet entirely on his own capital.
