WHAT SHALL THE HARVEST BE?

It is the experience of Chiefs of Police, in large cities, that ninety per cent of the recruits; who keep the ranks of abandoned women filled up, are not from the cities themselves; but from the smaller towns and from the country. It is a startling fact but the reason is obvious. Parents in the city are vigilant and watchful, knowing that their children are surrounded by vice; while in the country they are lax in their discipline and unsuspicious of evil because they do not see it. The result is; that children of tender age are unrestrained in their associations, permitted to keep evil company and unseasonable hours. Indulgence grows into license, falsehood and deceit cover up that which the mother must not know and her own affection blinds her to the evil which is being sown in their minds. Mothers must learn that blind confidence in the purity of their own children is stupid folly and that any lack of proper restraint and watchfulness is criminal negligence. It is unfair to say that all children are bad, or that a lily may not grow up in a field of noxious weeds; but such growth is exceptional and; as we are all largely the creatures of education, parents and themselves are mainly responsible for the character of their children and the harvest is just about what they make it. Ask yourselves mothers of Jacksonville, if your discipline is what it ought to be and if you are doing your duty to your children—if you are not; blame no one but yourselves if the harvest is not what you would wish it.

Observance of the Sunday Law.

A majority of the merchants of Jacksonville have signed the following resolution, to wit: This date, Dec. 28, we have signed and agree to keep the Sunday law as a business house. We, Jas. S. Howard, J. Ryan, Jas. Drum, T. J. Kubli, F. Luy, E. Jacobs, J. Bilger & Maegly, Kahler & E. C. Brooks, H. Judge. Those signing to sign it were N. Fisher, M. Benson, C. Coleman, S. Cohn, L. Solomon, J. Solomon, Little & Chase and Salmon keepers with the exception of Daniel & Co who signed it; upon the agreement of a similar business. Mr. Daniel expressed himself decidedly opposing on Sunday, if others were to observe, and thought a day's loss of business. The questions now to be solved are whether the law is superior to the individual or the individual above the law; and whether persons shall be allowed to decide for themselves just what statutes they will obey and what they will disobey. The only safe ground is obedience to each and every law till it is repealed, and if obedience is not voluntary among those who claim its protection, it is the duty of officers to enforce it. The Sunday law is published to-day, so all may read it, and the attention of District Attorney Kent is particularly directed to it. The law works hardship on none and we should think that people, in business, would be glad of an excuse for a day's rest. There is just so much money expended any way and it can all be gathered in in six days very easily.

WHAT'S IN A DINNER.

The dispatches of the S. F. Chronicle of Dec. 20th say: Ex-Senator Mitchell of Oregon gave a dinner party to-night in honor of Representative George of his State. There were present ex-Attorney-General Williams, Congressmen Page, Pacheco, Dunnell of Minnesota, Calkins and Orth of Indiana, Hazelton and Pound of Wisconsin, Hubbell of Michigan, Delegate Brents of Washington Territory, and George C. Gorham. The entertainment was in every sense a perfect success.

The uninitiated understands little of the ways and means by which political objects are accomplished and would place little significance in the above announcement. There is much in it though. It means that as Oregon's representative, Mr. George is to have the friendship and assistance of ex-Senator Mitchell, the advantage of all his valuable experience and the friendship of Mr. Page, chairman of the committee of commerce, and that of his fellow guests. Some philosopher has remarked that the opportune moment to reach the human heart is; when the stomach is full and the Senatorial and Congressional stomachs are much like those of ordinary mortals; in close sympathy with the good, or ill, nature of their possessors. The friendships cemented at the dinner table are no-mean factors in the accomplishment of the objects of representatives and to the generous liberality and open hospitality of the ex-Senator, himself, is due much of his own success. Mr. George can not be expected to invest largely in dinners and we are only to add that Mr. Mitchell's proffered honor to the representative from Oregon, in order to introduce him to influential members of Congress, was a handsome and delicate compliment and, we believe, it will not be without good effect.

THE SUNDAY LAW.

For the information of those who refuse to close their places of business on Sunday we publish the following from the Code page 436 chapter 8 section 668:

If any person shall keep open any store, shop, grocery, ball alley, billiard room or tipping-house, for purpose of labor or traffic, or any place of amusement, on the first day of the week, commonly called Sunday or the Lord's day, such person, upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by a fine not less than five, nor more than fifty dollars; provided, That the above provision shall not apply to the keepers of drug stores, bakeries, butchers, butchers and bakers; and all circumstances of necessity and mercy may be pleaded in defense, which shall be treated as questions of fact for the jury to determine, when the offence is tried by jury.

Ex-Senator Sargent is still confidently spoken of as the coming Secretary of the Interior. New York, December 24.—The bonded warehouse Nos. 71 to 74 South street, stored with silks, tobacco and spirits, was burned this evening. Loss, \$500,000. Well insured. Several explosions occurred.

New York, December 25.—2:30 A.M.—The fire on South street is now believed to be under control. Six buildings have been destroyed, and the loss is estimated at nearly \$2,000,000. Three men of No. 10 truck had a narrow escape from a falling roof.
