

Law of Newspapers.

Subscribers who do not give express notice to a contrary, are considered as wishing to continue their subscriptions.

1. If any subscriber orders the discontinuance of his newspaper, the publisher may continue to send them until all arrearages are paid.

2. If subscribers neglect or refuse to take their newspapers from the office to which they are directed, the law holds them responsible until they have notified the publisher, and ordered their discontinuance.

3. If subscribers remove to other places without informing the publisher, and the newspapers are sent to the former direction, they are held responsible.

4. The Courts have decided that refusing to take newspapers from this office, or removing and leaving them uncollected for, is prima facie evidence of intentional fraud.

5. The postmaster who neglects to give legal notice of the neglect of a person to take from the office a newspaper addressed to him, is liable to the publisher for the subscription price.

Nearly four thousand people visited the famous Yellowstone Park last year, although they were compelled to ride long distances by stage. It is evident that the desire to behold the wonders of the Yellowstone is very strong, and were the park easily accessible it would be a great resort for tourists. Fortunately, there is a project which promises to make it easily accessible. The construction of a railway from Bozeman, Montana, as a branch of the Northern Pacific Railway, is contemplated by a syndicate of wealthy gentlemen, and as the line would be but eighty miles in length and cost but \$20,000 per mile, the execution of the scheme seems probable. Its projectors are said to have exclusive hotel privileges in the park and when the railway is completed they will have a hotel to accommodate 600 guests at some point near Geyser Lake or the Falls of the Yellowstone. An enterprise which promises to open the Yellowstone National Park to the "early increasing throng of tourists who cross the continent is one which most people will be glad to have succeeded."
