THE OLD LAND STEAL.

The assigns of the O. C. M. W. R. Land Co. seem determined to leave no stone unturned to consummate the land steal originally planned by the company. Their last champion in Congress was Grover, of this State, but the opposition was so strong and the evidence so conclusive that the whole thing was a deliberate steal that; that gentleman, perhaps, considered it prudent to drop it. Now the company have secured another Democrat, Rosecrans, who comes forward with unblinking and frigid of frontery and asks that they be indemnified for the loss of lands that they never earned nor ever had a shadow of title to. The Rosecrans bill is better, just a little better, than the bill advocated by Grover, but it is bad enough. The latter proposed to give the company lieu lands in Oregon, confining them to the selection of any unappropriated lands in this state with which to satiate their greed. The Rosecrans bill gives the privilege of selecting government lands in any State or Territory to make up the alleged deficiency and it is time their rapacity was choked off. We again protest as we have always done against any further grant of land to this company. It has not earned any land within the boundaries of the reserve nor east of the reserve and is no more entitled to any land than an alien, who has not yet reached the United States. The history of this impudent steal is very fresh. The company was not organized for the purpose of building a road but for the purpose of making a show on paper and securing the grant and H. C. Owen, one of the original incorporators, admitted to us, only a few years ago, that it was thought cheaper to buy the Governor's certificate than to build the road—and it was bought. Had road building, for the public benefit, been the purpose of the company; the objective point, the Idaho boundary, would have been reached by the most direct, instead of the most tortuous, route but, as land was the object, the chain was twisted and turned and dragged through every valley known to the projectors and, in Goose lake valley, a safe and passable route was abandoned for one practically impassable, because the latter commanded the most valuable land. It is a simple matter of fact, that after passing the Klamath marsh, no work, whatever, was done on this road—through the reservation the company have no color of title, and have therefore, no right to lieu lands. Had this company built a road and earned the grant we would not oppose it but would defend their claim as a matter of justice. They are now holding lands by virtue of a "paper road," refusing to sell to settlers and leasing for their own benefit that which would soon be taken by bona-fide settlers. It is a little singular that a Democratic Congressman is the only champion who can be found to advocate this particular job. The land claimed is in Oregon and, if there were nothing crooked about the bill or representative, Mr. George, would have been the proper person to lay the matter before Congress and, when he does not appear as the advocate of this iniquitous bill the circumstance is in itself suspicious. We hope he will, if possible, prevent its passage, at least until the justice or injustice of the claim is established.

Correction.

The "Salem Statesman" took the wrong view of a recent decision of the Supreme court, sustaining the finding of the court below, in the case wherein, Ex-Gov. Grover, Ex-Sec. Chadwick and Ex-State Treasurer, Fleischner were defendants. The decision of the inferior court was in favor of the afore-named persons, who had been charged with criminal misappropriation of public funds. We copied the "Statesman's" article without examination and now make the correction. Ex-Governor Grover has been guilty of enough political sin, without charging him with sins he is not proved to have committed.

Number of school children 3,130. Josephine county has 47,587 acres of land. Valuation of property \$472,771. Number of inhabitants 2,485. Amount of State tax \$1,770.14. Wealth per capita \$190.25. Number of school children 724.

THE BLOW AT MORMONISM.

Congress seems to be in earnest in its determination to deal with Mormonism in a practical way and the Edmunds bill passed by the Senate, without a dissenting vote, will undoubtedly pass the House also. The bill is intended to disfranchise polygamists and is drawn as carefully as possible, but when its provisions are practically applied it may be found that only a fraction of the people of Utah are polygamists and it will not, by any means, reach the voting masses of the ignorant and deluded people who have been sustaining their lecherous masters. We apprehend that only a small number of the people of Utah are able to support two wives, or support a regular harem and; if "bigamy" or "polygamy" is the only disqualification for voters, jurors or members of the Legislative Assembly, there may be a sufficient number of the fanatical adherents of the "so called" Church, not reached by the statute and who, practically, will still continue to control the domestic affairs of Utah. Legislators are mistaken in treating Mormonism as a form of "religion." It is an organization founded on moral, social and political damnation—in this world and the world to come. It is a church whose pillars are murder, theft and oppression. Its accessories are debauchery, forced consubiation, slavery, body and soul of woman, blasphemy against God and defiance of a too lenient Government. When the dark secrets of the "Endowment House" are revealed, when the dreadful deeds of the "Blood Atoneement Chamber" are known, when the victims of the "Danites," part of the murdering Mormon priesthood are counted, Congressmen and Senators will be ashamed to acknowledge that they ever deemed this devilish abomination a "form of religion." Desperate diseases require heroic treatment and, if we had our way, any man or any woman who had ever supported the Mormon hierarchy by affiliation, by vote or by title, should be effectually and completely excluded from any voice in their own government—as unworthy and incapable. What is needed in Utah is an iron, military rule until the people have the scales torn from their eyes but; we only hope we may be mistaken in the present remedy and regard it as an evidence of popular loathing against that besotted people.

INDemnITY LAND BILL.

Following is the full text of the bill introduced by Rosecrans, of Cal., Jan. 30th, 1882; to grant indemnity lands to the Oregon Central Military Wagon-Road Co:

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That upon the execution and delivery to the Commissioner of the General Land Office of a deed conveying to the United States all the right, title, and interest of the Oregon Central Military Wagon-Road Company, or its assigns, to the lands within the Klamath Indian Reservation falling within the geographical limits of the grant to the State of Oregon by the act of Congress approved July second, eighteen hundred and sixty-four entitled "An act granting lands to the State of Oregon to aid in the construction of a military road from Eugene City to the eastern boundary of said State," and the acts amendatory thereof, the Commissioner of the General Land Office, under the direction of the Secretary of the Interior, be, and is hereby, authorized to issue scrip to the California and Oregon Land Company, or its assigns, authorizing them to select and locate, of the unappropriated public lands of the United States, not mineral, in tracts not less than the subdivisions provided for in the United States land laws, and if unsurveyed when taken, then to conform when surveyed to the system of United States surveys, a quantity of land equal in amount to the quantity of land conveyed by said deed: Provided, that the quantity of said lands shall be ascertained by the Commissioner of the General Land Office; and he shall issue patents for the lands so selected by the California and Oregon Land Company, or their assigns. Said scrip shall be transferable by assignment, and be located and patented to and in the name of the assignee of the same.

Rogue River Farmers Must Furnish Supplies.

Vice President R. Koehler requests us to put the farmers of the Rogue River valley on guard as to a very important fact that relates to their interest. This season, and next, railroad work will be prosecuted along the line. The people of that region will be called on to furnish horses for team-work and supplies of all kinds needed for the comfort of man and beast. The chances are that they will find a good home market for all they can raise, and the company will not bring supplies from the north if they can buy in Jackson and Josephine counties. Times in Southern Oregon should be as good for two years to come as they ever were when gold mines paid the best.—William Farmer

Death of Mrs. Magruder.

This week we have to record the death of another of the worthy and honored pioneer ladies of this valley, Mrs. Catherine Magruder, relict of the late E. B. Magruder, in the 73d year of her age. The deceased was living alone in a quiet and comfortable home but was visited daily by her grandson, J. G. Birdsey, and on Tuesday afternoon was in her usual good health, having been on the street for the purpose of mailing a letter. On Wednesday evening Mr. Birdsey called but finding the doors locked, he called Mr. Nunan and Justice Huffer and forced an entrance. Sitting in her sewing chair, with her head leaned slightly backward, the old lady was found quite dead. In her lap was some crocheted work and she had evidently been winding the thread on the spool, just as her own feeble thread had snapped asunder. There had not been the least struggle; as she sat as if in a natural, peaceful sleep and a wish, often expressed, that she might die alone, had been granted the aged matron and she was summoned in a whisper, so gentle, that it left no trace of pain or sorrow behind. The lamp by which the busy fingers had been weaving some little keepsake, stood on the table beside her extinguished for want of oil, flickering out as her own had, in the quiet solitude of the night, and showing that the event must have occurred on Tuesday evening before her usual time for retiring. Mrs. Magruder was born in Wellsburg, Va., Sept. 2, 1809 and was an early resident of Oregon, coming across the plains, in 1852, with her first husband, James Fleming, and locating in Portland, where he engaged in the hotel business. Being widowed, Mrs. Fleming removed to this valley in 1855, and in 1856 was married to E. B. Magruder, who died in 1875, and has resided continuously in this county ever since. She leaves a son, and two daughters, one of the latter the wife of Nat H. Lane of East Portland, the other the wife of Mr. D. N. Birdsey of this county, eight grand children, three great grand children, and two stepsons, Constantine and H. H. Magruder, both of this county. The deceased was a quiet, unassuming lady, held in high esteem by all her large circle of acquaintances and idolized by her relatives and step sons. She was a devoted and faithful believer in the Catholic faith, having been baptized here, in 1876, and the funeral took place yesterday from the Catholic Church, Rev. F. X. Blanchet officiating, the remains being laid beside those of her late husband in the Masonic ground, and followed by an unusually large number of our citizens. Full of honor and usefulness this pioneer lady has passed her three score and tenth year, and, if to such as she was, there is not eternal peace then there is no justice on high.

Hon. John M. Thompson, of Lane county died at Prineville on the 10th inst., where he had gone in hopes of recuperating his rapidly failing health. Mr. Thompson was a gentleman of more than average ability and served his country faithfully for four years as county Judge. In 1878 he was elected to the Legislature, became Speaker, and was one of the most determined opponents of corruption in the Democratic party, of which he was a member, and took an active part in the investigation inaugurated by that legislature. He was a prominent member of the bar and regarded as a pure and upright man.
