RAILROAD NEWS.—John Hulbert has found the desirable line on the south side of the Siskiyou, and in a short time will move over and begin work on the north side. Volk's party have located the line through the Cow creek canyon and have commenced setting the grade stakes south from Ridgeberger. Dobson's party is still at work in the Grave creek hills trying to find the easiest and most practicable route.

There is considerable sickness here at present, mostly severe colds. The case of Dollarhide vs Mayfield was tried before Justice De Peatt this week resulting in a verdict for the former. MAIL LETTINGS.—A letter received here, from Washington, states that Jerry Culverhouse has been awarded the route from Ashland to Lakeview his bid, \$14,200, being the lowest. It is said that the route will be again advertised and re-let, as the former advertisement is not in conformity with the service now required, service having been cut down on the eastern half of the route, from Linkville to Lakhiew, from six to three times a week. This is stated authoritatively and indicates that the Department does not intend increasing the service again between Linkville and Lakeview.

The route from Linkville to Fort Klamath 37 miles, six times a week, is awarded to John Hailey at \$1,970. Pat McMahon has been awarded the route from Jacksonville to Crescent City twice weekly at \$2,800 per year.

The House Commerce Committee have reported favorably, Berry's bill to erect a light-house and fog signal at Point St. George, Cal. It is to be located northwest of Seal Rock. Fifty thousand dollars is the amount appropriated.

Last Wednesday was the beginning of Lent or Ash Wednesday. Lent, the period of fasting and penance observed by the Catholic and Protestant Episcopal Churches, will last until the 9th of April, on which date Easter Sunday will fall this year.

Snow in Sprague river valley, on the 15th inst., was eighteen inches deep and all stock required feeding. There was plenty of hay on hand and no apprehension of loss of cattle was felt. The weather in that section has been exceptionally cold for several weeks.

David Hopkins this week received what was at first supposed to be a stroke of paralysis by suddenly finding himself unable to walk. Although confined to his room he has recovered the use of his limbs and will be able to be around again in a few days.

Leading members of the House Banking Committee say that after consideration of the subject they are confident that the House will pass the bill making the trade dollar a legal tender, and that the interests which opposed it before will now allow it to pass.

Our Representative, Mr. George, has introduced a bill allowing pre-emption and homestead claimants to make the necessary affidavits before a Notary Public when inconvenient to do so before a Land Office. The law will save settlers considerable time and expense.

The case of L. C. Coleman vs. Jesse Dollarhide was finally decided in the Circuit Court this week by the jury returning a verdict in favor of plaintiff for the sum of \$107.06 and costs. This makes the fourth time the case has been tried and the litigants ought to be satisfied.

Chauncy W. Nye, of upper Rogue river was in town yesterday. He reports about two feet of snow at Flouner Rock but says stock are doing splendidly and but little hay was fed, cattle seeming to prefer browse, of which there is plenty. The snow is disappearing gradually.

WASHINGTON, February 20.—It is said that the majority report of the Contingent Fund Investigating Committee will entirely exonerate Secretary Sherman and Major Power, chief clerk of the Treasury and ensure Custodian Pitney and his friends, whom Secretary Folger removed.

The Dalles "Mountaineer" seems unnecessarily afraid that Mr. George will ignore the appropriation for work at the Cascade locks entirely. Mr. George is heartily in favor of that work and it is safe to predict that he will obtain a larger appropriation for it than has ever been given by Congress.

Mr. Thos. G. Reames returned from Linkville last evening. He says there was a foot of solid snow all over the country near Linkville and that mixed snow and rain was falling Thursday morning. There was seven feet of snow on the mountain beyond Parker's. The murderer H. C. Law, had not yet been captured.

Hank Vaughn, the ruffian who recovered from the effects of a shooting affair at Prineville has bounced the editor of the Walla Walla "Statesman," because he was not written up as a saint miraculously saved from martyrdom. The gentleman should go to Seattle if he wants to go into the martyr business.

We acknowledge receipt of copies of the Burlington, Kansas, "Republican" through the favor of Isaac B. Dobell, Esq., formerly of this county, who is now a large land owner in that State. The "Republican" is intensely in favor of prohibition and claims that crime has decreased 50 per cent in Kansas since the sale of liquor was prohibited.

The church treasury was enriched to the amount of \$32.25 and none went away feeling poorer.

The Bradley, Sullivan Troupe that played the "Dance of Death," for J. N. Brown at a private theater, in Portland, are expected to return to that city in a day or two by special request. Miss Adams has been designated as one of the principal performers by the Chief of Police and it is hoped the whole troupe will soon appear at a public "neck tie" party to be given in their honor by the sheriff.

Louis Horne, one of the old-time residents of Jacksonville, and for a long period the proprietor of the old U. S. Hotel, died at Prescott, Arizona Territory, on the 12th inst. in the 77th year of his age. He had been ill for some time past, but at last accounts he was reported convalescent, and the immediate cause of his death is supposed to have been heart disease. He leaves a wife and family in Arizona and a large circle of friends in this place to mourn his loss.

Some of the valley papers that went off on a tangent about the Yaquina bay appropriation are now ashamed of having abused our Congressman. If Mr. George obtains as much as John Whiteaker did \$10,000, Democratic papers have no right to grumble, but if he gets \$20,000, that which he asks for, they will curse him—simply because he is a Republican, although he may be vastly more efficient than a Democrat in advancing the State's interest.

The State Temperance alliance, recently convened at Salem, have passed a resolution denouncing Senator Logan's bill to apply all the revenue, derived from the tax on liquors to educational purposes. The "Alliance" probably take the ground that the worthy application of the tax would be made another excuse for drinking and excuses are so numerous that no more are necessary. It can make no difference whence the educational fund is derived so it is created.

The Ashland Tidings relates the following: A little child of David Spenser's, about sixteen months old, put a good-sized shoe button in its nose last Monday, and all efforts of its parents to extract it were unavailing. As it caused much distress, the child was brought to town, and Dr. Parsons took the button out, after the child had been terrified by Dr. Taylor. It was a curious accident. The button had been pushed up and lodged behind the first turbinated bone, entirely out of sight.

Mr. George's bill, allotting lands in severity to the Indians of the Umatilla reservation, is very carefully drawn and will probably pass both houses of Congress. It provides for selections of 160 acres to each head of the family, 80 acres for each single person over 18 years of age and 80 acres for each orphan child under 18. It is thought that the Indians can be provided with half the arable land now embraced within the boundaries of the reservation. The bill has the approval and support of the Secretary of the Interior.

The freezing weather, during the past six weeks has severely retarded farming operations but the breaking of winter will now give farmers a new start. There will yet be an immense acreage of grain sown and it is still quite early in the season. Some of the ground previously sown will have to be reseeded but the damage done by the freeze is not extensive and, with a half favorable season, next year's harvest will be immense. It will be all needed during railroad construction and there cannot be too much on hand for the next two or three years.

The Mathews—Nichols shooting case still occupies the attention of the Circuit Court a large number of witnesses having been summoned to testify. District Attorney Kent and A. C. Jones are conducting the prosecution while Judge Prim and B. F. Dowell are on the defense. It is expected that the case will go to the jury sometime today. The jury empaneled to try the case are: D. Walker, M. S. Wakeman, T. J. Bell, W. J. Gregory, H. Judge, C. D. Reed, John Coleman, J. A. Wilson, C. B. Matney, Jesse Dodge, John G. Norton, Merritt Bellinger.

People that advocate free trade stuff themselves when they oppose Chinese immigration. The product of Chinese labor, coming, free of duty, from that country would be more damaging to American industry than if manufactured here, because the cost of living is cheaper. It would make little difference—none in our favor—whether Chinese workshops were in the United States, or in China, if their wares were to be thrown, free of tax, on our markets and free trade papers, howling for the exclusion of the Chinese, profess this it is "for the protection of American industry" and thus knock the bottom out of their free trade arguments.

The funeral of the late Mary A. Chambers was largely attended last Sunday, the Presbyterian Church being filled to its utmost capacity and notwithstanding the bad state of the roads there was a large attendance from the country, the deceased being held in high esteem by all her neighbors. The funeral sermon was preached by Rev. B. J. Sharp of the M. E. Church, who very kindly officiated, in the absence of Mr. Williams, and the remains of a true and noble woman as ever lived were laid down to rest by the side of the child she fought so bravely for (Mrs. John S. Love) on the day her husband and first born were murdered by the Indians. Although she died in the fullness of age her loss is one that will be long felt in this community.

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Death of Wm. K. Ish.

Horace L. Ish, who went to Alaska about six weeks ago to see his brother Wm. K. Ish, on business, returned to the Victoria, on the 18th, on his way home, by the steamer Eureka. The following dispatch from Victoria must have reference to Wm. K. Ish as Horace had no other brother in Alaska. The dispatch says: "At Tongas Narrows the Eureka ran in and took on board H. L. Ish and party. On February 5th, Mr. James Ish, who lived at the narrows, died very suddenly, and two men who were with him at the time reported that he burst a blood vessel, but as he was known to have a considerable sum of money just before his death, and as the money could not be found afterwards, some people are of the opinion that he was foully dealt with. The body, which had been interred in a shallow grave, was disinterred by his brother, Mr. H. L. Ish, and buried in a deeper grave."

FATAL SHOOTING IN LAKE COUNTY.—Intelligence has just been received of a fatal shooting affray, that took place near the State line, about ten miles east of Langell valley, Lake county, Feb. 13th. It appears that two boys named Calavan, aged, respectively, 20 and 16 years, were hunting stock near the house of a man named Law, and passing along a trail beaten in the snow, Law commenced abusing the boys and ordered them out of it. The eldest replied that there was sufficient room to pass, when Law drew a Winchester rifle and fired; the eldest had drawing a revolver and firing at Law—the shots being almost simultaneous. Young Calavan fired six shots, and Law five. About the time Calavan's pistol was emptied his horse was shot from under him and he made for the brush calling to his younger brother to fly for his life, the latter, also, being on horseback. Law then turned his fire on the youngest boy, shooting him and inflicting a mortal wound. The poor little fellow stuck to his horse and reached home, a distance of over two miles, and had strength enough to build a fire when the elder brother returned and found him badly shot. The elder at once struck for Langell valley and returning to the scene with eight of the settlers, the boy's dying statement was taken and in a few hours he had breathed his last. A rude sledge was made, on which the corpse was placed, and hauled by two horsemen by means of a "lariat," round the horns of the saddles, to Langell valley, where it was buried. At last accounts a party of eight men were in search of the murderer but there is yet no information of his arrest. The parents of the two boys conceived in this county, a short distance south of Ashland. If the above statement is true, those who find Law might imitate the Seattle-folks and leave him in the woods.

ALMOST A ROBBERY.—A few days since an old man named Griffith started over the divide between Siskiyou creek and Sam's valley on foot taking his shot gun with him. Reaching the summit of the ridge he heard a sound of rest and in a few minutes heard something approaching. Thinking it might be a wild animal he brought his gun to a present and in a minute a Chinaman's head popped up over the ridge. Both were startled but the heathen was scared and, pulling out a gold watch, he presented it to the old man with the assurance that he had no money. You "catchem watch all lites him bolly good, no got money" said the poor devil, who thought he had met a robber. The old man took the watch, examined it and handed it back to the now delighted Celestial who "skinned" out ejaculating "welly good man no lobem" It was some time before the old man realized how near he had been to the commission of highway robbery.

Daley be appointed a committee to designate the route for said road, commencing at old Camp Stuart, near H. Amy's residence, and ending at the eastern boundary line of Jackson county, and to petition the county court to grant a survey for said road from the terminus of the county road to said eastern boundary line.
