TO BE PROTECTED.—Mr. John Denny, who resides near the foot of Washington Butte, Linn county, has received the 29 Mongolian pheasants sent to him by his brother O. N. Denny, consul at Shanghai. He proposes turning them loose on the butte, and the Albany "Register" warns all hunters, should they be in the vicinity of Washington Butte, or anywhere else in the county, not to harm a feather of them, under the penalty of being prosecuted.

TERIBLE SNOW STORM.—On Sunday and Monday last a force of over six hundred men were at work on the C. P. railroad on the "Sierra Nevada" endeavoring to clear the track of snow. The town of Trukee was literally snowed under, many of the smaller buildings being out of sight and the snow reaching to the balconies of the larger buildings on the main street. Railroad men say it is by far the heaviest snow fall that has occurred since the railroad was built. Trains were blocked for several days but travel is again resumed.

LAWS HELD FOR MURDER.—The examination of H. C. Laws, charged with the murder of Frank Calavan, was concluded before Justice Wright at Linkville on Saturday and resulted in the prisoner being held for murder. The evidence is said to be very strong against Laws and, as the feeling in Lake county is very unfavorable to the prisoner it is thought he will ask for a change of venue. It appears that the shooting was done in California but as the death of young Calavan took place in Oregon the statute of this state confers jurisdiction and the crime is punishable here. Sheriff Hanks accompanied with a guard of six men started with the prisoner for Lakeview, Tuesday morning where he will have to remain in jail until the next regular term of court which will not be held till September.

The question of appropriation for the Pacific coast has not yet been reached and will not be for about two weeks. Until then it will be impossible to state how much will go to the various Pacific coast ports of that section. As Page of California, is chairman, and George of Oregon, a member, they will see that Pacific states and territories obtain as large a share of appropriations as it is possible to obtain consistent with the earnest demands of other sections. George is busily engaged in preparation of a speech upon improvement of the rivers and harbors of the northwest Pacific, which he will soon deliver in the house.

The following is from the Portland "Standard" and is, to say the least, an unusual request: "The Indian Katakah, who was sentenced to be hung on the 31st inst., has requested that his time might be shortened in order that the interpreter, Mr. George Kostrom, etinoff, and the Indians here as witnesses might be present at the execution. As they will sail on the 29th or 30th, Judge Deady yesterday ordered that the execution take place on Tuesday, the 28th. It is not often that a condemned man makes such a request, but it is hardly to be wondered at in this case, as should the interpreter and witnesses be gone the poor wretch would have to meet his death surrounded entirely by strangers, not one of whom could understand a word he might say, and with not one friendly or familiar face present."

The following bills were reported on favorably and ordered paid: H. Kubli, special policeman, \$4; J. Nunan, insuring town hall, \$30.50; J. S. Howard, Fire Warden, \$10; Chas. Schultz, special policeman, \$54.75. Times office, printing ordinance, \$9.75.

The report of the Street Commissioner was reported favorably from the Street Committee and adopted.

The following bills were presented and ordered paid: R. S. Dunlap, Sexton's salary, \$30; H. Pape, Treasurer's fees, \$21.31; A. Helms, Marshal and Fire Warden, \$130.

The following bills were referred to the Finance Committee: J. B. McDaniell, labor, \$4; Chas. Schultz, special policeman, \$7; Reames Bros., coal oil etc., \$28.99; J. Nunan, Recorder's fees, \$30.38; J. B. McDaniell Street Commissioner's salary, \$19.29; Grob & Ulrich, feeding prisoners, \$7c.

John Noland was granted license to retail liquor for six months.

The board then adjourned sine die.

NEW BOARD.

The Board of Trustees elect assembled on the 15th at half past 8 o'clock p. m., and were sworn in by Recorder Nunan, to wit: J. S. Howard, T. G. Reames, K. Kubli, E. D. Foudray and P. N. Ficke.

R. S. Dunlap was elected Street Commissioner, receiving three votes, to one for Geo. Brown and one for W. J. Plymale.

The bonds of Chas. Schultz as Marshal, J. Nunan as Recorder, H. Pape as Treasurer and R. S. Dunlap as Street Commissioner, were approved.

The Recorder was ordered to make out the road assessment list from the county Assessor's books and deliver the same to the Street Commissioner.

The Board then adjourned to the 22d.
