resented, in person, as Jackson county
will.

DECEASED.—R. S. Crystal, Treasur-
er of Polk county, died at Dallas on
Saturday, aged 55 years. Mr. Crystal
was born in Lexington Kentucky, came
to Oregon in 1864, from Des Moines,
Iowa, was a member of the Oregon Leg-
islature in 1872, and was respected
wherever known as a man of probity
and honor. Mr. Crystal was a brother
of G. W. Crystal of this place.

EASTER SERVICES.—Very impressive
services were held in the Catholic
church here on Sunday last by Rev.

crammed with worshippers. The sing-

received the thanks of the Pastor for
their assistance.

NO CHINESE NEED APPLY.—This
seems to be the sentiment in Ashland
and it was so strong on Thursday
night that a Chinese wash house, re-
cently started, was cleaned out and the
business will remain suspended until
further notice. The people of Ash-
land have a perfect right to prefer
white laundresses but no one is com-
pelled to patronize Chinese and the
effectual way to dispose of them would
be to starve them out instead of re-
sorting to violence. If we are in ear-
nest about this matter, the Chinese will
be compelled to reverse Greeley's ad-
vice and go East—where they seem to
be wanted.

HER LAST WORK.—On the advent
of Dr. and Mrs. Aiken's little girl, a
short time since, we remarked that it
represented the fifth generation of liv-
ing people tracing back to the vener-
able Mrs. Myers, of Ashland, now near-
ly ninety years of age. Although
quite feeble the old lady has just com-
pleted an elegant pair of little "boot-
ies" for little "True" and thinks it will
be the last work of fingers that have
been busy for nigh a century. There
is to be a family gathering on the com-
ing anniversary of old Mrs. Myers
ninetieth birthday when representatives
of all five generations are expected to
be present.

AN OLD RESIDENT GONE.—We re-
gret to record the death of Louis
Herling one of the old residents of
this county which took place at his
residence on Poorman's creek last Mon-
day after several weeks of illness. Mr.
Herling was a native of Siegen Prussia
and had been in this county about
twenty one years. He was a man of
sterling, upright character and gen-
erous impulses being almost without an
enemy. He leaves a widow and a son
and daughter to mourn the loss of a
generous and kind protector. The re-
mains were interred in the cemetery
here on Tuesday last by the German
Eintrauch Society and were followed
by a large number of our citizens who
held the deceased in high esteem.

CROP PROSPECTS.—Last Wednesday
we took a ride through a portion of
the valley for the purpose of looking
at the crops and we found them all
well advanced and a larger acreage
sown than ever before. During our
travels we visited a number of the
thrifty farms in the valley but found
none that showed as good crops as
those owned or rented by A. Davison.
Besides his own farm of 600 acres Mr.
Davison has rented the Isaac farm,
the Maco farm and the Jack farm, all
of which he has plowed and sowed with
grain of different kinds—making in all
over 1,100 acres that he has under
cultivation. With average good luck
he expects to get over 30,000 bushels
of grain, mostly wheat, and with the
market afforded by the railroad work
now going on Andy will have more
grain to sell than any other three farm-
ers in the valley. Mr. Davison
shows hope and enterprise in his work
and we hope to see him do well.

It is with surprise that we learn
that a heavy coat of gravel is being
laid on the Hanley hill—a piece of road
long a disgrace to the district. It is a
good deal like a man going all winter
in a linen duster and then putting on
a heavy ulster when Spring comes.

The Douglas county Republican Con-
vention has instructed the delegation
to the State Convention to vote for M.
C. George for congress. It is almost
certain that he will be nominated by
acclamation and there is no man in
Oregon who has a stronger hold on the
voters than he.

C. W. Kahler's fine mare, Nellie
was sent to Fort Jones last Sunday in
care of Dr. J. C. Leonard. She got
away from the Dr. near Major Bar-
ron's but was recaptured, and James
Sutherland will come over and take
her home in a few days. The mare
will be put in training for the Yreka
races.

The following is a statement of the
business of the U. S. land office, at
Roseburg for the month of March: 873
acres sold for cash; 16 homestead en-
tries, 2,324 acres; 10 final homestead
entries, embracing 1,440 acres; 17
preemption filings; 1 timber entry of
160 acres and 1 mineral entry of 20
acres.

Ex-Gov. Curtin, of Pennsylvania,
now representative in congress from
that state, says: "Put 100,000 Chinese
down in Massachusetts, to displace the
enlightened workmen of that great
state, and the violence of Puritan de-
nunciation would dwarf the utterances
of the sand lots and brambles of Cal-
ifornia."

The veto of the Chinese bill is not
creating half the excitement that the
elegant ladies hate—latest spring styles
just received by Howard are creating.
His cabinet of lace remnants is a curi-
osity and enables ladies to secure many
patterns of fine laces at one quarter
the regular price when cut from a
whole piece.

Mr. Nunan, just returned from San
Francisco says the news of the veto was
received with indignation by all classes
there. Prominent merchants told him
they believed the Chinese population
would now equal the white in that city,
and they were coming so fast that steps
would have to be taken soon to stop
them or bloodshed would ensue.

Hon. John Bailey, of Idaho, a son
in law of the late B. B. Griffin of Jack-
son county, passed through here this
week on his way to San Francisco.
Mr. Bailey is one of the heaviest stage
men in Idaho and Eastern Oregon and
is connected with the new contractor,
Salisbury, in the Redding—Roseburg
route on which they will begin service
on the 1st of July next.

Differing very materially in princi-
ple from any other moving machine,
the new Champion mower must be ex-
plained before a correct idea can be
formed how the sickle is vibrated. The
new Champion has only two cog-wheels
thus dispensing with two thirds of the
machinery used in other machines.
It would be well for farmers to ex-
amine this peculiar gearing before pur-
chasing.

In San Francisco, Boycotting anti-
Chinese leagues are being organized, in
which no political discussions are per-
mitted. This is no doubt an organiza-
tion to proscrib all who hire Chinamen
in their business and household, and
to have no dealings with Chinamen or
those who employ them. These leagues
will not doubt comprise men of all po-
litical parties opposed to the employ-
ment of Chinese.

Following are the Republican nomi-
nations for Curry county: Joint Repre-
sentative, Frank A. Stewart, County
Commissioners, John Cresswell, and
J. Blacklock, Sheriff, Wm. Gauntlett,
Clerk, Walter Sutton, Treasurer, W. B.
Gilson, School Supt. Chas. E. Phil-
brook, Assessor, E. H. Mcnervey. We
believe this is the fourth term for Mr.
Sutton who is desirably popular and
hard to beat in Curry.

The Yreka "Journal" has the follow-
ing good thing, Lattrell being a Demo-
crat. It says: Democratic apostates
are no doubt preparing speeches al-
ready for the fall campaign to denounce
Republicans on the Chinese question,
and some of them may possibly be
stumped like Lattrell was once, when
asked by Van Duzer, who cooked his
breakfast on the day referred to, what
he thought of the unwilling answer—a Chi-
nese man.

In Jacksonville we can point to five
prominent Democrats who employ Chi-
nese servants—nasty, opium smoking,
thieving moon eyed heathens to cook
and wash for them and giving them
double the wages white girls are of-
fered. These people, if sincere in
their expression of anger at the veto,
should at once discharge the Chi-
nese men and replace them with girls,
but we will venture a new hat that not a
single one of them will do so.

H. C. Laws was taken from the
Lakewood jail on Saturday the 8th
inst, and placed in the custody of De-
puty Sheriff Powers who was armed
with a requisition for the murderer
from Governor Perkins of California.
Powers immediately started for Altus-
ra with his prisoner and the people
of Lakewood are greatly rejoiced at be-
ing spared the expense of trial; the ex-
penses being already over \$1,000 as
shown by the bills presented to the
Commissioners Court.

A reward of \$2200 is offered for the
apprehension and conviction of any or
all of the parties concerned in the
killing of Deputy Sheriff Lewis at
Linkville. At a public meeting in
Lakewood last week the sum of \$1200
was subscribed for the purpose, and
the County Court of Lake county has
authorized the Sheriff to offer an ad-
ditional \$1000. The total amount of
reward offered will doubtless be much
increased by additional subscriptions
by private parties in the county.—
Tidings.

Col. Ross and J. H. Hoffman neph-

ty, being one of the energetic mer-
chants of Lakewood and in the best of
standing. Of Mr. Ross the "Exami-
ner" (Democratic) says: "L. G. Ross of
Lakewood received the nomination for
county clerk, which will no doubt be
gratifying to many Republicans who
are in the habit of voting the straight
ticket regardless of the candidate upon
it, as they will have an opportunity to
support a fully competent young man,
of excellent character, and who is well
qualified for the position to which he
aspires. It was very kind of the bosses
to allow their voters this privilege." This,

considerable excitement is reported.

Republican County Convention.

The Jackson county Republican Con-
vention met at the Court House Satur-
day April 8th, 1882 and organized by
the election of Hon. J. M. McCall as
temporary chairman and C. W. Savage
as temporary secretary. On motion a
committee of three consisting of N.
Langell, W. H. Atkinson and J. B.
Wrisley were appointed on credentials
and reported the following delegates
entitled to seats in the convention "to
wit." Jacksonville precinct, C. W.
Savage, C. D. Reed, by Geo. Brown
proxy, N. Langell, W. G. Kenney, J.
W. Stanley, David Cronmiller, T. T.
McKenzie and M. Bellinger. Ashland
precinct, J. H. Chitwood, Pat Dunn, G.
F. Billings, M. L. McCall, J. P. Wal-
ker, W. H. Atkinson and A. G. Rock-
fellow. Applegate precinct, S. R.
Taylor. Eden precinct, W. Benson, J.
Van Dyke, E. E. Gore, C. S. Sargeant,
J. Coleman and E. K. Anderson.
Uniontown precinct, F. M. Smith, R.
Cameron by T. Cameron proxy. Foots
Creek precinct, Silas Draper by J. M.
McCall proxy. Willow Springs pre-
cinct, A. Barnburg. Manzanita pre-
cinct, J. B. Wrisley. On motion the
report was received. On motion the
temporary officers were made the per-
manent officers of the convention. On
motion it was ordered that we now
proceed to the nomination of delegates
and the election of the same and that
the six receiving the highest number
of votes be declared elected, whereupon
on Hon. J. M. McCall, Hon. N. Lan-
gell, C. S. Sargeant, Dr. Chitwood, S.
M. Hubbard and Max Muller, were
declared duly elected. On motion the
following resolution presented by Mr.
Bellinger was unanimously adopted:

RESOLVED: That we the Republi-
cans of Jackson county, in convention
assembled do most heartily endorse the
action of our Rep. in Congress Hon.
M. C. George and that our delegates
elected to the Republican State Con-
vention are instructed to use all hon-
orable efforts for his re-nomination.

The following gentlemen were ap-
pointed as Central Committee for the
ensuing two years, M. Bellinger, T.
Cameron, W. H. Atkinson, Max Muller,
Cameron and Silas Draper. On motion it
was ordered that the proceedings of
this convention be handed to the Ore-
gon SENTINEL and Ashland "Tidings"
for publication. On motion the con-
vention adjourned.
