BILL FOR THE CHINESE BILL

As Passed by the Senate. BY THE DECISIVE VOTE OF 33 YEAS TO 15 NAYS.

Washington, April 28.—Following is the full text of the Chinese bill as amended and passed by the Senate, and as it will be sent to the President for his signature, there being no doubt that the house will concur in the amendments:

An act to execute certain treaty stipulations relating to Chinese. Whereas, In the opinion of the government of the United States, the coming of Chinese laborers to this country endangers the good order of certain localities within the territory thereof; therefore,

Be it enacted, etc., etc., That from and after the expiration of 90 days next after the passage of this act, the coming of Chinese laborers to the United States, and the same is hereby suspended, and during such suspension it shall not be lawful for any Chinese laborer to come, or having so come, after the expiration of 90 days, to remain within the United States.

Sec. 2. That the master of any vessel who shall knowingly bring within the United States on such vessel, and land or permit to be landed any Chinese laborer from any foreign port or place, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$500 for each and every such Chinese laborer so brought, and may also be imprisoned for a term not exceeding one year.

Sec. 3. That the two foregoing sections shall not apply to Chinese laborers who were in the United States on the 17th of November, 1880, or who shall produce to such master before going on board such vessel, and shall produce to the collector of the port in the United States at which such vessels shall arrive, the evidence hereinafter in this act required, of his being one of the laborers in this section mentioned, nor shall the two foregoing sections apply to the case of any master whose vessel being bound to a port not within the United States shall come within the jurisdiction of the United States by reason of being in distress or in stress of weather, or touching at any port of the United States on its voyage to any foreign port or place; provided that all these laborers brought on such vessels shall depart with the vessel on leaving port.

Sec. 4. That for the purpose of properly identifying Chinese laborers who were in the United States on the 17th of November, 1880, or who shall have come into the same before the expiration of 90 days next after passage of this act, and in order to furnish them with proper evidence of their right to go from and come to the United States of their free will and accord, as provided by the treaty between the United States and China dated November 17, 1880, the collector of customs of the district from which any such Chinese laborers shall depart from the United States, shall in person or by deputy go on board such vessel having on board any such Chinese laborers, and cleared or about to sail from any district for a foreign port, and on such vessel make a list of all such Chinese laborers, which shall be entered in a registry book to be kept for that purpose, in which shall be stated the name, age, occupation, last place of residence, physical marks or peculiarities, and all facts necessary for identification of such of such Chinese laborers, which books shall be safely kept in the custom house, and every such Chinese laborer shall, on departing from the United States be entitled to and shall receive, free of any charge or cost, upon application therefor from the collector or his deputy at the time such entry is taken a certificate signed by the collector or his deputy and attested by his seal of office in such a form as the secretary of the treasury shall prescribe, which certificate shall contain a statement of the name, age, occupation, last place of residence personal description and marks of identification of the Chinese laborer to whom the certificate is issued, corresponding with said list and register in all particulars. In case any Chinese laborer, after having received such certificate,

shall leave such vessel before her departure, he shall deliver his certificate to the master of the vessel, and if such Chinese laborer shall fail to return to such vessel before her departure from port, the certificate shall be delivered by the master to the collector of customs for cancellation. The certificate herein provided for shall entitle the Chinese laborer to whom the same is issued to return to and re-enter the United States on producing and delivering the same to the collector of the district at which such Chinese laborer shall return. The collector of customs, at the time of re-entry into the United States, shall cause the same to be filed in the custom house and duly cancelled.

Sec. 5. That any Chinese laborer mentioned in section 4 of this act being in the United States and desiring to depart from the United States by land shall have the right to demand and receive free of charge or cost a certificate of identification similar to that provided for in section 4 of this act, to be issued to such Chinese laborers as may desire to leave the United States by water, and it is hereby made the duty of the collector of customs of the district next adjoining the foreign country to which said Chinese laborer desires to go, to issue a passport upon application by such Chinese laborer, and to enter the same upon the registry books to be kept by him for the purpose, as provided for in section 4 of this act.

Sec. 6. That in order to the faithful execution of article one and two of the treaty in this act before mentioned every Chinese person other than a laborer who may be entitled by said treaty and this act to come within and who shall be about to come to the United States, shall be identified as so entitled by the Chinese government in each case, such identity to be evidenced by a certificate issued under authority of said government, which certificate shall be in the English language, or if not in the English language, accompanied by a translation to English stating such right to come, and which certificate shall state the name, date, or official rank, if any, the age, height, and all physical peculiarities, former or present occupation or profession and place of residence in China of the person to whom the certificate is issued, and that if such person is entitled conformably to the treaty in this act mentioned to come within the United States, such certificate shall be prima facie evidence of the facts set forth therein and shall be produced to the collector of customs or his deputy of the port in the United States at which the person named therein shall arrive.

Sec. 7. That any person who knowingly and falsely shall alter or substitute any name for the name written in such certificate, or forge such certificate, or knowingly utter any forged or fraudulent certificate, shall be deemed guilty of misdemeanor; and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in a sum not exceeding \$1,000 and be imprisoned in the penitentiary for a term of not more than 5 years.

Sec. 8. That the master of any vessel arriving in the United States from any foreign port or place shall, at the same time he delivers the manifest of the cargo, and if there be no cargo, then at the time of making report of entry of the vessel pursuant to law, in addition to other matter required to be reported and before landing or permitting to land any Chinese passengers, deliver and report to the collector of customs of the district in which such vessel shall have arrived a separate list of all Chinese passengers taken on board his vessel at any foreign port or place and all such passengers on board the vessel at that time. Such list shall show the names of such passengers, and if accredited officers of the Chinese government, travelling on business of that government, or their servants, with a note of such fact and their names and other particulars as shown by their respective certificates, and such lists shall be sworn to by the master in the manner required by law in relation to a manifest of cargo. Any willful refusal or neglect of any such master to comply with the provision of this section shall incur the same penalties and forfeiture as are provided for a refusal or neglect to report and deliver a manifest of the cargo.

Sec. 9. That before Chinese passengers are landed from any such vessel the collector or his deputy shall proceed

to examine such passengers, comparing certificates with the list and with the passengers, and no passenger shall be allowed to land in the United States from such vessel in violation of the law.

Sec. 10. That every vessel whose master shall knowingly violate any provisions of this act shall be deemed forfeited to the United States and shall be liable to seizure and condemnation in any district of the United States into which such vessel may enter, or in which she may be found.

Sec. 11. That any person who shall knowingly bring into or cause to be brought into the United States by land, or who shall knowingly aid or abet the landing in the United States from any vessel of a Chinese person not lawfully entitled to enter the United States, shall be deemed guilty of misdemeanor, and shall on conviction thereof be fined a sum not exceeding \$1000 and imprisonment for a term not exceeding one year.

Sec. 12. That no Chinese person shall be permitted to enter the United States by land without producing to the proper officer of customs the certificate in this act required of Chinese persons seeking to land from a vessel, and any Chinese person found unlawfully within the United States shall be caused to be removed therefrom to the country from which he came, by direction of the President of the United States, at the cost of the United States, after being brought before some justice, judge or some commissioner of a court of the United States and found to be unlawfully entitled to be or remain in the United States.

Sec. 13. That this act shall not apply to diplomats and other officers of the Chinese government, whose credentials shall be taken as equivalent to a certificate in this act mentioned, and shall exempt them and their bodies and their household servants from the provisions of this act as to other Chinese persons.

Sec. 14. That hereafter no state court or court of the United States shall admit Chinese citizenship, and all laws in conflict with this act are hereby repealed.

Sec. 15. That the words "Chinese laborers," wherever used in this act, shall be construed to mean both skilled and unskilled laborers and Chinese employed in mining.

THE VOTE. The vote on the bill was as follows: Yeas—Beck, Butler, Call, Cameron of Wis., Chittcott, Coke, Davis of Ill., Fair, Farley, Garland, George, Grover, Hale, Hampton, Harris, Hill of Colorado, Johnston, Jones, Jones of Nevada, Maxey, Miller of Cal., Miller of N. Y., Morgan, Pendleton, Pugh, Saunders, Slater, Vance, Vanwyck, Vest, Walker and Williams—32.

Nays—Allison, Blair, Conger, Dawes, Edmunds, Frye, Harrison, Hawley, Hoar, Ingalls, Lapham, McMillan, Morrill, Platt and Sherman—15.

Aldrich, Anthony, Ferry, McDill, Sewell, Logan, Windom, Rollins, and Kellogg opposed the bill and were paired with Gorman, Bayard, Saulsbury Jackson, McPherson, Ransom, Davis of W. Va., Jones of Florida and Lamar in the affirmative.
