EDITOR SENTINEL: At the April term of Court at Kerbyville, there was a complaint made to the grand jury against the Sheriff, for charging and receiving eleven dollars per week for keeping a prisoner in jall. The Prosecuting Attorney stated to the grand jury that the Supreme Court decision in the Wasco county case in regard to jailor's fees gave the County Court a discretion, that is they could pay jailor's fees if they thought best (this is not his exact words but his meaning.)

The decision will be found in Vol. 6 Supreme Court decisions opinion of the Court Prim C. J. The question presented on this appeal is whether the Shariff of Wasco county is entitled under the laws of the State to recover a reasonable compensation from the county for the services of the person appointed by him to be keeper of the county jail. We think not. Section 995 of the civil code provides that the Sheriff may appoint a keeper of the county jail to be denominated the jailor, for whose acts as such he is responsible. The authority to appoint given by this section is relied apon by appellant as implied authority to receive compensation for services performed under the appointment; but it will be seen that section 962 also provides that a sheriff may appoint a deputy for whose acts he shall in a like manner be responsible. Now if he is entitled to compensation for the services of his jailor by virtue of his authority over him why may he not by the same reasoning claim compensation for the services of his deputy. > is made as follows: Put half a bushel of quicklime in a barrewand add boiling water until it is covered nearly six inches deep; cover the barrel to keep the steam in, and when the violent ebullition is over, add water enough to bring it to the consistency of cream; allowing four pounds of rice flour to each half bushel of lime; or, the rice flour may be mixed with the water for slaking, mixing the flour carefully in cold water before putting it in the hot water. Stir constantly in the hot water until thoroughly set, and then pour it all over the lime as

To improve the above add two ounds of sulphate of zinc and one pound of salt. To change the color, wash thus prepared is remarkable, and, when once tried, will be used to the
