SPRING IMPORTATION! POLITICAL QUOTATIONS. The editor of the "Democrat" apparently derives no small amount of comfort in quoting from the report of the Secretary of State for 1880. While about it, why not quote some of the information contained on pages 52, 53 and 54 of the same document, where it shows that Mr. Earhart saved the State nearly \$4000 in his audit of the accounts filed by Democratic Sheriffs for the conveyance of convicts and insane. There is also some interesting reading matter on page 5 of the same report, where a comparison is made of the expenses of the State government during four years of Democratic supremacy and two years under Republican management. These, for the two years ending September, 1876, were \$567,351.57. During the next two years they amounted to \$474,241.66. During the first two years of Republican financing the total expenditure for all purposes, including \$33,868 deficiencies paid in excess of appropriations of 1876, amounted to but \$407,802.32. Turn to page 8 and quote the following: "The aggregate amount of State indebtedness, September 1, 78, was \$737,717.34, exclusive of accrued interest on outstanding warrants, etc., and including the Indian war debt of 1877-8. The total amount of State debt September 1, 1880, exclusive of interest, was \$511,376.15, showing a reduction during biennial term just ended of \$226,341.19." If the editor of the "Democrat" can point us to any report of a Democratic State officer in the history of Oregon wherein a reduction is shown in the indebtedness of the State, he will confer a favor upon us and partially redeem the record made by the party during its eight years supremacy, during which time, as shown by the official reports, the State debt was increased from \$115,847.77 in 1870 to \$737,717.38 in 1878 - an increase to the alarming extent of \$621,869.61. These statements are such as will be of deep interest to the tax-payers of Oregon. By the way, will not the "Democrat" inform its readers what political party was in power in the Legislative assembly of 1880, when the State tax was reduced from seven to five and one-half mills on the dollar? Democrats of Oregon, you cannot deny these facts; they are too plain; for figures, though at times perplexing, have never been known to lie. In some future issue we shall take pleasure in presenting our Democratic friends with a few nuts to crack. Meanwhile, let the intelligent voter carefully study the above quotations from the Secretary's report, they being but a few of the many choice political gems therein contained. - [Albany Herald. IRELAND'S PARLIAMENT. - The Assembly of Ireland, writes a correspondent from that far-off land, is composed of thirty-six members, thirty of whom are elected by the people and six appointed by the King of Denmark. The thirty popular members elect six of their number to serve with the six appointed by the crown as an upper house. All bills must pass both houses and be duly approved by the King, who holds the veto power. Sessions are held once in two years, and the members are paid 6 kroner (\$1.65) per diem and traveling expenses. I don't know how they make out on the mileage. There are no end of miles here in any given direction, but it would take an American Congressman half his time to make even cocktail money at these rates. The island is divided into fifteen districts, over each of which is a squirelland, or judge, who collects the taxes. The squirelland goes over his district once a year and informs the people where he will meet them and receive their taxes. London, May 18. - The fear of being arrested in connection with the murder of Lord Frederick Cavendish and Burke is now so general in Ireland that peasantry traveling outside their districts are applying to the police for passports. Many emigrants who are leaving the south of Ireland for America resort to the same course. Salinas, May 19. - The south-bound stage from Soledad was stopped by two masked men at Middle Gulch, a few miles south of Oak Grove last evening. Wilson, the driver, was requested to hand down Wells, Fargo & Co's box. He complied. The contents of the box are not known.
