Oregonian-Pocahontas. Tribe of I. O. R. M., elected the following officers at their last meeting: Sachem, E. D. Roudray; Senior Sagamore, D. H. Feathers; Junior Sagamore, J. T. Holcomb; Chief of Records, C. W. Savage; Keeper of Wampum, Henry Pape.

Thor. B. Cook, living at Gall's creek bridge, died on Sunday at 4 P. M. of aneurism of the abdominal aorta. Mr. Cook was a native of Missouri about 34 years of age and a brother of our present County Commissioner. He leaves a wife and four small children.

Track laying has commenced at Roseburg and it is now said to be the intention to run an excursion train to Myrtle creek on the Fourth of July. As it is only eighteen miles between the two points it seems quite probable that the track will be laid to that point at that date.

We did our neighbor an injustice last week by inferentially charging him with changing the wording of the manuscript in the Merritt card. The mistake was made by the writer and as the SENTINEL always tries to be fair and will not do an intentional wrong, we make this explanation.

Henry Judge has decided on a reduction of prices on harness and saddle goods and gives the following as his prices: two horse harness complete from \$20 per set and upwards; two horse lines from \$2.50 per set; good Mexican saddles, from \$8; riding bridle, \$1; head halters, 75 cents; clutches, 50 cents; stirrups, 50 cents. The nomination of A. C. Stanley on the Democratic ticket as representative is a good illustration of the false idea that it is a political office. Mr. Stanley has been one of the Legislature and his most ardent admirers do not claim that he said a single word or did anything that would indicate that he was a member from Jackson county except to sign the pay roll and draw his pay.

In the Senate, on Wednesday, Senator Slater, of Oregon, reported from the Committee on Indian Affairs the original bill appropriating \$1,400 for the relief of Mrs. A. Boddy, of Lake county, Oregon, widow of a victim of the Modoc Indian massacre. The report heretofore published that Mrs. Boddy had been awarded \$5,500 was clipped from the Lakeview paper and was premature.

Justice Huffer is a candidate for reelection in this precinct and should be elected. The office is one of too much importance to the people to be given as a reward for political service and certainly Mr. Huffer's experience is worth something to the voters of this precinct. He has filled the place for the past four years with credit to himself and with great fairness and a grave mistake will be made if he is not again elected.

The people of Ashland seem to be unduly excited over a court house. Until the "Tidings" was received we did not know the question was before the people. According to it Mr. Alford is in favor of a \$40,000 court house as soon as the railroad is built. If this is the case it is man willing to be so extravagant with the public funds ought to be beaten as when the necessity arises half that sum ought to be more than enough to put up a magnificent building. Mr. A. is entirely too liberal with the people's money.

Mr. George has introduced into the House a bill for the relief of Mrs. Kate Hutton, wife of R. B. Hutton of Lake county, as follows: That the Secretary of the Treasury be, and is hereby authorized and directed, out of any money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, to pay to Mrs. Kate Hutton of Lake county, late widow of Nicholas Schirra, the sum of four thousand two hundred and ninety-seven dollars, in full settlement of her claim for depredations committed by the Modoc Indians in November, eighteen hundred and seventy-two.

A PROSPECTING TRIP TO ALASKA.—The S. F. "Bulletin" says Edward Schieffelin, a well known Arizona prospector and frontiersman, has organized a party of five experienced men, himself included, to make a thorough prospecting tour of the valley of the Yukon river in Alaska. The party have ample means. A small light draft steamer has been built for river navigation, and will be taken on the deck of a schooner chartered for that purpose. The expedition will leave in a few days. Schieffelin believes that Alaska is within a mineral belt which extends through South America, Mexico, the United States and British Columbia as far north as prospectors have explored, and leaving Alaska unexplored, is disclosed again in Siberia. The party expect to be absent three years.

FIXED \$9,000.—Yesterday Capt. W. S. Thomson, of the British steamship Bothwell Castle, was fined by Judge Deady in the U. S. circuit court \$1000 for having violated section 4266 of the revised statutes in omitting to deliver to the collector of customs at Astoria a true list of his passengers; and \$8,000 for having violated section 253 by carrying 160 passengers more than American measurement laws permitted—\$50 for each person unlawfully carried. A stay of execution for sixty days was granted to permit an appeal to the President for pardon.—(Oregonian, May 24th.)

WISTING.—Mrs. C. C. Beckman, accompanied by her daughter Carrie left on Thursday's north bound stage on a visit to friends in Eugene City and Portland. They expect to be absent about a month.

NOT GUILTY.—D. M. Gilmore of Josephine county had his preliminary examination before Judge Floyd at Keshyville last week on the charge of killing Walter Akers and was discharged, the evidence not being sufficient to bind him over. Public feeling generally seems to be in favor of Gilmore.

BLACK BART AT HIS TRICKS AGAIN.—Stage robbery, it seems, can be reduced to a system the same as any other business, and stage drivers, although their first two or three experiences are somewhat trying, in time get to "kind of like it." Yesterday as Horace Williams with two passengers inside the stage, and a young girl on the seat beside him, was coming to Redding he was ordered to halt on top of the Bass Hill, on the identical spot he was robbed last October. Horace was looking down at the wheel horse, when he heard the girl exclaim, Oh! and glanced up just as the robber with a rifle aimed at him, and standing in front of the leaders, cried "Halt!" followed by the usual demand, "throw out that box." Horace replied that it was fastened, to which he received the answer, "No 'tain't throw it out." The driver complied, and three mail sacks on demand. The robber then quickly withdrew behind a large tree and ordered the stage to drive.

Horace thinks the robber is the same fellow that did the deed before, as his voice sounded the same. He was dressed in a blue jumper and overalls, with the legs of the latter in his boots; had on a wide brimmed white hat, dirty boots, and looked like a shepherd. For a mask he had a cotton pocket handkerchief, and a white handkerchief with eyes cut out. One curious passenger stuck his head out the door, but drew it in again at "request."
