The County Election.

We presume there will be a large amount of bragging done by the Democracy of this county and many mutual congratulations at a substantial victory. Why should they not win? They have a clean majority on the State ticket of over three hundred and a candidate with a half way claim to respectability ought to be ashamed if he could not get almost as large an endorsement by his party.

A Forced Issue.

A large number of the actual local politicians of this county saw fit, unnecessarily, to raise the Court House question at the last election. Men rode day and night warning Democrats and Republicans not to vote for Cook or Ficke as they were in favor of building a Court House at Jacksonville, and they must be defeated. Thus the issue was fairly made and forced on the voters.

It is reported that General Winfield Scott Hancock, of Pennsylvania, the Democratic candidate for President in 1880, is to be nominated for Governor of Pennsylvania by the Democrats. General Hancock was the guest of Jere Black, at York, Pennsylvania, last Saturday and Sunday, and a prominent Republican from Harrisburg, who is now in New York, says that there was a conference at Black's house of many Democratic leaders in the State, and that it is believed that the object of the conference was to nominate Hancock for Governor.

Entire State Ticket Elected.

MAJORITIES RANGING FROM 1,500 TO 3,000.

LEGISLATURE REPUBLICAN ON JOINT BALLOT.

The latest news received from the State election held last Monday shows that the Republicans have elected the entire ticket by majorities ranging from 3,000 down to about 1,500. Congressman George leads the ticket in every county heard from and he is the first Member of Congress ever elected to a second term from the State of Oregon.

In Jackson county the Democrats elect their entire ticket by from 150 to 375 majority. Josephine county elects Thornton, Republican, to the Legislature by 40 majority, and Nickerson and Crockett, candidates for Clerk and County Judge on the People's ticket are also elected by small majorities.

George's majority in Multnomah county is 3,060 Mooly, gets about 1,400, Lord, 1,000 and the entire Republican legislative and county ticket is elected by about 1,000 majority.

In Washington the Republican State ticket has nearly 300 majority. In Clackamas it has 175 to 200. In Linn the Democratic majorities on the State ticket are, Fenton, 190; Smith, 250. Democratic Legislative 175 majority. County ticket 190.

The Republicans elect one Representative, (Sappington), in Washington county. Humphreys is beaten by about 70, and Tucker by about 80 or 40.

In Clackamas county the Republicans lose the Senator and one Representative, and elect three Representatives. Myers, (Dem.) is elected Senator by 90 majority over Apperson.

In Marion county the Republicans have a majority of about 700 on the State ticket and a so elect their entire Legislative and county ticket.

Douglas county elects the entire Republican ticket with the exception of County Judge. The vote on some of the county officers was very close the majorities ranging down as low as twenty.

Latest from Josephine—From R. M. Garrett, mail carrier on the Waldo route, we learn the following election news: Of the candidates elected honors seem to be easy as both parties have elected five of their candidates. The Republicans have a little the best of it, however, as they elect their Representative, Thornton, by 34 majority. They also elect F. M. Nickerson County Clerk by a majority of 34, Garrett Crockett, County Judge by 140 majority, and both of the County Commissioner's elect were nominees of the Independent party.

The Court House question seemed to figure quite conspicuously in the different precincts of the county at the election last Monday. The result would indicate that new buildings are necessary.

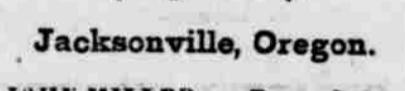

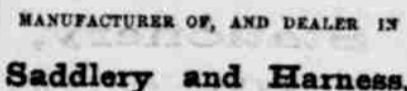
