THE COURT HOUSE ISSUE.—Robt. A. Cook came within 57 votes of receiving the entire vote of Jacksonville precinct while A. Alford done equally well at Ashland on the other side of the Court House issue. P. N. Ficke of Jacksonville, who was a pronounced Court House man, failed to get a single vote in Ashland and received very few votes in several other precincts in the county. The issue was made and a decision has been reached.

C. C. WAGON ROAD.—W. J. Wimer, of Waldo, Oregon, has been paying Crescent City a visit during the present week in the interest of the new wagon road which he proposes to build from Waldo to the coast. The plan proposed is to open subscriptions here, at Smith river, and at different places over the mountain, and to those subscribing to issue stock certificates, the amount subscribed to be paid back in toll, either to the subscribers, or they may transfer the certificates to others. Mr. W. has made a new survey which will avoid the heavy land slides, the proposition being for the present to build nineteen miles of new road and to connect with the old road beyond Altaville. Before, however, any money is paid, the company which Mr. Wimer represents will bind themselves to build a good road, the grade in no place to exceed much, if any, one foot in sixteen and a half. Field notes of the new survey will be left at this office, and more definite plans of the enterprise will be published in the near future. [Record.]

SAD CASE OF SUICIDE.—James K. Brown, who has been employed as a teamster by R. S. Dunlap for the last three months, was missed from his home last Monday after having stated to his employer that this would probably be the last time he would see him. As Brown was subject to spells of the "blues" Mr. Dunlap paid no particular attention to his remarks thinking everything would be right in a short time. Monday passed, however, without anything having been seen of Brown, and suspicions of suicide were immediately entertained by those who knew him. A small party of men were hunting for him on Tuesday, and as no trace could be found, a large number of the citizens of Jacksonville turned out on Wednesday last to find him if possible, when his remains were found in the field back of the residence of J. R. Neil by T. B. Kent and Mr. Cook. There he was found dead with a Smith & Wesson five-shooter lying by his side and all the indications showing that he had placed the muzzle of the pistol in his mouth and discharged it causing instant death. Brown was a native of Illinois, where his parents still reside, and has only lived among us for about two years. He was a quiet, sober and industrious young man, making friends wherever he went. He was a member of the order of Odd Fellows, belonging to Myrtle Lodge No. 470 of Middleton, Illinois, and also a member of Table Rock Encampment No. 10, of Jacksonville. His remains were buried in the Jacksonville cemetery on Thursday last by the fraternity to which he belonged and was largely attended by those and others. A coroner's jury was summoned to inquire into the cause of his death and the following is their verdict: We, the coroner's jury, find that the deceased came to his death at his own hand, while in a fit of insanity.

C. Robinson, for the sum of \$2,622 67; and in favor of the defendant, Jesse Robinson." It appears that a party came into Jackson county to run a mine. E. C. Robinson, with the company as a partner, so as to recover from him, he being reputed rich. Railroad News.

The Roseburg Plaiddealer of the 3d inst. says: The first spike on the advance rails, south of Roseburg, was driven Monday morning by Mr. Harris, and the work of laying ties and rails goes steadily on. With the advance the grades now have it in prospect this work will continue right along until Myrtle Creek or perhaps Riddleburg is reached, at which place a breathing-spell will be taken.

The Redding Independent says it has been rumored for a week past, that the extension of the railroad north is likely to be postponed indefinitely. Various reasons are assigned, such as shortness of crops, scarcity of iron, etc., but principally the difference in the surveys of the Oregon and California companies; as it is alleged the Oregon company require the California to raise their survey on the Siskiyou mountain twelve to thirteen hundred feet so as to enable the Oregon company to make the connection, as the surveys heretofore made for the Or. end are too high for the California surveys. This necessitates a change of engineering which will take months to determine. The Independent adds: "We do not vouch for the rumor; but if it is correct, it is to be regretted, as we deem an early extension of the road to be in the interest of the northern part of California and particularly to our own county and town." Villard and the Central Pacific own the Oregon steamer, and that accounts for the trouble in "engineering." They "engineered" the road until they obtained the steamers, and now they propose to "engineer" the steamers until they choose to build the road.

A Cross-eyed Foreman.

There is a young editor wandering on the face of the earth who formerly published a paper at Storm Lake, Iowa. He left there the day after the issue of the last paper, and is supposed to be crossing the State on foot to get away from an infuriated female populace. HOW TO GROW PEACHES.

The Secretary of the Washtenaw county, (Mich.) Pomological Society, a paper on "The Cultivation of Fruit Trees," gives the following in relation to the peach:

The fruit requires two different systems of culture—that is, the bearing trees must be differently treated from those that are too young for bearing. It is the nature of the young peach tree to keep on growing late in the fall. This must not be permitted. It can be prevented by stopping to stir the soil in midsummer. The rest of the season is required to harden up the young wood for winter. To properly control the growth, skill and experience are required. In the month of August cultivating for the young peach tree should stop. Should the ground be very rich and the trees show a determination to keep on growing, the leading branches may be pinched in. After pinching, a new growth will often start; but then we must pinch again. Ripening up thoroughly the new growth of the young tree should be the aim of the peach grower. Where the soil is poor, less care is required in ripening the new wood. The bearing peach tree cannot be cultivated too often. The soil must at all times be kept loose. Cultivation can be kept up until the fruit is ripe. The new growth of wood in a bearing tree ceases to grow early in the season, and there is no danger of stimulating a late growth, for the fruit consumes all the extra sap caused by cultivation. Stirring the soil should be thoroughly kept up, so that any time between the setting of the fruit and its being picked you can run your hand right into the soil and fill it with loose earth. But in order to grow large peaches, and all of a large, uniform size, the tree must have either its bearing branches shortened in or the fruit must be thinned out. Shortening in is probably the least expensive operation of the two. As long as you ship more than one-tenth of second or medium sized peaches you are not master of your own crop. I have grown the Early Crawford so to run from two to three and a half inches in diameter, and after all were picked there were no more than one-twentieth below the size.

STAGE ROBBER CAPTURED.—Since the robbery of the stage, says the Redding Independent, the officers of the county from Sheriff down to Constable, have been on the alert. A detective from San Francisco has been in the field, and would no doubt have made the arrest had he not been anticipated by Willis Elmore, Constable of Anderson, who captured the robber. From the facts in our possession, it appears that upon committing the robbery on Wednesday last at 12 o'clock, he traveled in a southerly direction, bringing up at Wells' ferry, where he crossed in a small boat and went to Anderson, making his camp out of town in the brush. Saturday morning bright and early, he went into Wright's store, and bought a dollar and a half's worth of canned goods and crackers, also pricing a pair of boots. In the afternoon he came back and bought the boots, going outside to try them on. He then returned and gave a \$20 greenback in payment for the boots and left the store, taking his old boots with him. He then circulated about the town playing cards for drinks, but not imbibing anything stronger than soda water. He looked so dirty and greasy, that the boys began to joke him about being the stage robber, and some one finally accused him of robbing the stage. He said: "Oh that's too thin." At any rate, a genuine suspicion was finally aroused, and when he left town Elmore tracked him to his camp. Locating the spot well in his mind, Elmore visited in the absence of the occupant, and among the effects found a fine rifle, the polka dot handkerchief, with the eye hole cut out, the old pair of boots, etc. The robber was then arrested and on his person they found a diary of his whole career, together with a description of Black Bart, with some of Bart's poetic effusions; also the name of the robber, which is Raguelale. Elmore telegraphed for Sheriff Hall, who took the prisoner to Shasta. W. I. Smith recognized the robber as a sheep shear from Yreka; he was evidently a green hand, who was trying to imitate the noted Black Bart. It is thought that the 1go stage would soon have been stopped, had not the arrest taken place when it did. The evidence against him is very strong, and his early conviction certain, unless the case is slowly dragged along for the benefit of our friends at the county seat.

A Pre-emptor May Mortgage His Claim.

On April 24th, Secretary Teller decided, in a case appealed from the commissioner of the general land office, that a pre-emptor may give a mortgage on land covered by his preemption claim in advance of making his final proof, for the purpose of raising money to pay the government price for the land. This reverses the former decisions of the general land office and the interior department on the subject—following the precedent of an early decision, having held that an outstanding mortgage given by a pre-emptor upon lands embraced in his filing, defeats his right of entry, upon the ground that such mortgage is a contract or agreement by which the title to the lands might inure to some other person than himself. The secretary says, in making his decision, that the pre-emptor did not mortgage his land for a speculative purpose, but to raise money to pay the government price for it, that by the means thereof the title might rest in himself and not in another.

News Gleanings.

New York, June 6.—"Herald's" Washington: Among the political rumors circulated here this evening is one that Folger will soon resign, and that he is to be succeeded by Don Cameron, who in his turn is to have for his successor in the senate, his father, ex-Senator Cameron.

The report of the judiciary committee of the house upon the Northern Pacific railroad land grants, takes the ground that under the limitations granting the act, the sole right which remains in the United States at the present time, is the right by its congress to do any and all acts which may be speedy and necessary to insure the speedy completion of the road. After a careful review of the condition of the road and what it has accomplished, the committee reached a conclusion that it would not be advisable to give its land grant to another company, or to sell them and apply the proceeds to the completion of the road, and that early completion of road will be more readily accomplished by a policy of non-interference on the part of the government, and they therefore recommend that no further legislation is necessary or advisable.
