GUITHAU.

Scenes at his Execution.

Charles J. Guiteau was hung in the jail yard in Washington on the 30th of June for the murder of President Garfield. We copy the following des-

cription of the last scenes from the telegraphic reports: Guiteau showed great nervousness and appeared greatly startled when he heard the rattle of the muskets of the guard on the stone floor of the rotunda. From that moment Guitean appeared to be thoroughly overcome with emo-

tion. He wept freely and seemed to

MORE CALM AND COMPOSED. After the death-warrant was read by the Warden the prisoner became more composed and turning away began to brush his clothing. At 12:25 a loud steam whistle was blown at the workhouse, which is near the jail. The whistle usually blows at 12 o'clock and by it Guiteau was in the habit of gaugng the time. The delay to day was by special arrangement, so its startling summons might not come before the officers were ready. About two minappointed inland hotel on this coast. Our utes later the iron gates at the end of the corridor were opened and Warden Crocker made his appearance. A monent later the familiar figure of Guiteau was seen; his face was pallid and the muscles about the mouth moved nervously. Other than this there were

no signs of faltering.

The procession moved quickly to the caffold, and Guitenu ascended the omewhat steep steps with as much steadiness as could be expected from a man whose arms were tightly pinioned. At the last step he faltered for a moment, but was assisted by officers who waiked upon either side. Upon reaching the platform, Guiteau was placed immediately over the drop, facing to the front of the scaffold. Guiteau, when he came out into the rotunda, looked calm and collected. but very pale. His arms were pinioned behind him and he held his head erect. He gazed upon the crowd without flinching. He wore a black suit, and instead of a collar had a handkerchief thrown loosely about his neck. Those who expected "sickening" or listressing scenes were disappointed. Guitagu walked firmly through the rotunda and court. He stumbled on one of the steps leading up to the scaffold, but recovered himself immediately. When he began to read his voice was loud and clear. He gave the words now and then a sort of inflection. Captain Coleman stood upon his right, Robert Strong on his left and Woodward directly behind him. Jones took a position on the north side near the upright of the beams. Warden Crocker stood at the southeast corner of the scaffold. There was a slight delay while the spectators were pushing and jostling through the door leeding from the rotunda to the corridor, at the lower end of which the gallows were placed. Guiteau, mean-

up at the beam over his head and

The attendants then pinioned his egs and carefully adjusted the noose about his neck. Mr. Strong placed the black cap over his head, and as he lid so, Guiteau called out in loud tones, 'Glory! Glory! Glory!" Instantly the trap was sprung. The body fell and A SURE CURE FOUND turned partly round, but there was not the slightest perceptible motion of the limbs. When the drop fell a yell was sent up by some persons inside the jail. This was re-echoed outside by the thousands or more people, who hurrahed lustily. For at least forty seconds after the drop fell the body hung motionless, then there was a slight motion of the shoulders and legs due to muscular contraction. Three minutes after the drop fell the body was lowered to be examined by the physicians. He rose a few minutes after 5, and breakfasted heartily at 6:30. When the servant served his breakfast Guiteau told him to bring dinner at 11 o'clock promptly. Dr. Hicks, who remained at the jail all night, was called into the prisoner's cell as soon as he rose, and he'd a consultation on religious subjects with him.
