

range with the Warden to have the trap sprung as soon after 12 o'clock as possible. He also expressed considerable anxiety lest some accident should occur, and insisted that Hicks should see that the scaffold and its appurtenances were all in proper condition.

NEAR THE OTHER WORLD.
After Guitau had disposed of these matters, he read a poem composed by himself, which he calls "Simplicity, or Religious Baby Talk." After reading the poem, he attempted to sing it, but broke down in the effort. Guitau then talked for some time about the future. He remarked that his heart was tender. "I don't think," he said, "that I can go through this ordeal without weeping, not because of any great weakness, for the principle in me is strong; but because I am near the other world. I hold to the idea that God inspired me." Guitau subsequently asked that in his books all complimentary remarks about President Arthur and his administration be eliminated. The he presented Hicks with the books that have been the companions of his lonely hours. He told Hicks that he wanted him to offer the first prayer on the scaffold, saying that he (Guitau) would then read his favorite scriptural passage, the 14th chapter of St. John, and offer a prayer on his own account. Then he intended, he said, to read his poem, "Simplicity." He desired to have the trap arranged that just as he uttered the last word it should be sprung.

RELIC HUNTERS.
Very soon after the execution Hicks and John W. Guitau made a thorough examination of the cells occupied by Guitau. Dr. Hicks took possession of the books and other effects of the deceased. A great many of the people in the jail visited the cell to see the place where Guitau passed his last days. There was a disposition on the part of some of those present to get mementoes of the occasion at any cost. The jail officers took the rope from the gallows and secreted it so soon as the noose was removed from the dead man's neck.

THE BURIAL.
Dr. Hicks said when asked about the burial: "He did not want to say where the body would be interred. The funeral, such as it will be, will take place to-morrow and be as private as possible."

THE GUARD LEAVES.
At a quarter past 3 P. M. the military guard, which has been on duty at the jail ever since the 2nd of July last, marched away. They were loudly cheered as they left.
