SENATOR MITCHELL.

From all parts of the State come indications of the increasing strength of ex-Senator Mitchell. He is known to be in every way worthy and capable and will, on account of his experience, if for no other reason, be the most desirable Senator that can be elected. If a man is honest, capable and experienced he would certainly seem to fill the measure of all reasonable requirements. Senator Mitchell is all these; and if elected he will be an honor to the State and a credit to the Senate.

The Democratic "Times" has discovered that Republican papers are hinting that democratic votes are desired by Mr. Mitchell. It seems to see the angel of discord hanging around waiting to fan up a fuss as soon as Mr. Mitchell shall receive the caucus nomination. When all this has happened, the "Times" imagines Mr. Mitchell can't wait, in the somewhat undignified character of an animated lightning rod, for the appearance of Democratic lightning to strike him. But it won't. No, Mr. Mitchell, that display of Democratic fire works is never to be made in your interest. The "Times" says it won't and that settles it. You may well as consider that lightning as bottled, and the cork safely deposited in the pocket of the "Times" editor.

The "Times" has also unearthed the fact that there is going to be a Republican "Imbroglia" when Mr. Mitchell is nominated. Now Mr. "Times," that is too utterly utter. Too absolutely awfully awful. After he had caught an "Imbroglia" for our own special amusement and kept it carefully caged until required for use, to have you discover it, open the cage and let it out is positively aggravating.

But seriously now, if there is any Democrat who imagines that Senator Mitchell is bidding for Democratic votes to secure an election to the Senate, or that he would accept the office otherwise than as the choice of the Republicans, his imagination is seriously at fault. Senator Mitchell is a Republican. Not a rabid Republican in any sense of the word, but a thorough going, liberal minded, progressive Republican, who would scorn to ask an office at the hands of a political opponent. A hope has however been expressed on the part of some Democrats as well as Republicans that, as there was no possibility of electing a Democrat to the Senate, the Democratic members would show their interest in the welfare and prosperity of our State by supporting Senator Mitchell. This will, in all probability, be done by many Democrats in the Legislature, whose conception of the interests of our State is not blinded by political bias or confined to the one single watch-word of Democratic supremacy.

EGYPT.

At last the Egyptian complication seems to have reached a climax. For months past, strenuous efforts have been made by the Powers interested, to effect an amicable arrangement of differences but all to no purpose. England's artillery is now thundering at the gates of Alexandria and in a few weeks at most a land force of between 20,000 and 40,000 troops will be ready to assist the fleet which is now engaged. It is difficult to surmise what will be the outcome of this action on the part of England. If she is permitted to proceed unmolested, she will, of course, in a short time reduce Egypt to the position of a British dependency. This would insure the correction of many of the abuses under which that unfortunate country has labored for many years. It would put an end at once and forever to slavery and the slave trade and the land of the Pharaohs would become likewise the land of the free. If, however, as appears not unlikely, England should be opposed by Germany and Russia and be assisted by France, a general European war would be inaugurated that would involve matters of much greater importance than the mere possession of Egypt.

The first six months of this year has been marked by unusual activity in railroad building. Five thousand miles have been built against a little over two thousand miles for the same period last year. There are now over 107,000 miles of railroad in the United States. Almost enough to go four and a half times around the earth. And yet the railroads are inadequate to the great and increasing demand of the commerce of the country, especially in the Southern and the Western States. In the Pacific States and Territories there are only 2121 miles.

THE "TIMES" AND MR. GEORGE.

"Convince a man against his will, He's of the same opinion still." The "Times" is still vexing its soul in an effort, as it says, to find out what Mr. George has accomplished as a member of Congress. Sometime ago the "Times" aired its ignorance of current events by a similar course of conduct. At the expense of being considered antiquated we then re-published a few of the most prominent facts of Mr. George's congressional career—facts which had appeared in the press of the country and were perfectly well known throughout the State. We labored diligently and faithfully with our brother, not alone, we confess, in the interests of truth, but also because a just pride in the intelligence of our community impelled us, to silence, if possible, such a display of ignorance even in a Democratic editor. But we failed. Week after week, we reproduced the well known record of our brilliant and able Representative, and week after week the "Times" stood stolidly up, protested it could see nothing, and asked for more. It was then just before the election when Democrats and Democratic editors, especially in this county, turn a deaf ear to all but the cliques commands, and knowing this, we were not surprised. But now the election is over. A majority of over three thousand of the voters of this State have announced that they could and did see, and appreciate, and approve what has been done by Mr. George. Still the "Times" stares vacantly about, and still obtusely inquires "What has George done?" There are but two explanations of this absurd conduct on the part of our cotemporary. Either he is deluding himself against his own convictions, as a boy whistles to keep off ghosts, or he lacks capacity to comprehend a fact of history when it is fairly presented. In either case, we must abandon further efforts at his enlightenment, but if the foreman of the "Times" office could be induced to pi the next item of this kind, he would earn the thanks of the community as well as render a real service to his employer.

RAILROAD NEWS.

J. H. Hyzer, who is now employed as boss of a China crew on the railroad, sends us the following from Roseburg under date of the 11th, inst: I rode 14 miles out from Roseburg towards Myrtle creek on the construction train this morning and I predict that passenger trains will not run to that point for two months. There is not any of the extension either leveled up or ballasted, and you can therefore judge that the ride was very rough. I went out after a case of picks for my crew, which I took charge of to-day, to the number of 53. The further extension of the track will be delayed some time as they have exhausted the supply of straps and bolts necessary to connect the rails, and which have to be machine made. The whole line from Grave creek down presents a very animated appearance, there being now about 4,000 men employed besides many teams, and with the exception of two or three of our crews, who remain to level and ballast, a general move is being made to the front of all varieties of force and material.

Two men were seriously burned by a premature and careless explosion of powder two days ago near Myrtle creek; caused by spouting out an unexploded blast and throwing the powder loosely among the rocks.

People of Roseburg are busily engaged reaping the benefits of a cause which is slowly slipping through their grasp, but which they have enjoyed for years, and bitterly they regret and feel the anticipations of its effects, and it will be truly sad to contemplate the experience.

There is yet room for more men, in almost any of the several capacities.

The Gist of the Egyptian Question.

England's immediate interest in the struggle between the khedive and Arabi Bey is not confined to the question of the future administration of the Egyptian finances under the decree which gave England and France full control of that department. England has acquired controlling proprietary rights in the Suez canal which is now the indispensable route to her Indian dependencies, and though she has no rights of sovereignty over the isthmus she is justified in taking the initiative for the protection of so important an international highway. The threat of Arabi to send two regiments to drain the canal or obstruct navigation leaves England no recourse but to provide for the immediate and effective repression of any such attempt.—"Philadelphia Times"

A Special to the Oregonian announces that the sub-committee on Territories has reported favorably upon the admission of Washington. It may not come before the Senate until next session, but this is at least one important step of our neighbor toward a seat among the sisterhood of States.

ONE REPRESENTATIVE LESS.—A dispatch from Salem, dated July 10th, says that Lee and Graham, two convicts confined in the Oregon penitentiary, made a break for liberty this afternoon, which resulted in the death of the latter. They concealed themselves near the gate leading to the outside brickyard, and when the gate was opened to admit a team, slipped out. They were observed by C. A. Barlow, the guard, who ordered them to halt. No attention being paid to the demand, Barlow shot at Graham, the ball entering the upper part of the back and coming out of the center of the breast, killing him instantly. Graham was the man sent to the penitentiary for a term of two years for larceny from this county a short time since and is the same man that jumped from the train while in charge of Deputy Sheriff Seybert on his way to prison.

The "Tidings" has information that Hulbert's surveying party have found a good route from the Siskiyou pass over to the head of Emigrant creek. They will cross the Linkville stage road at, or very near Tyler's, and then keep on the north side of the valley. How the route will be this side of there is still a question. There will be much rough work encountered, no doubt, not much as much as down Bear creek, Mr. Hulbert thinks. The hills are bare of timber, most of the way on the northeast side of Emigrant creek, and the surveyors can make much faster progress than through the forests on Bear creek.

RESIGNED.—The resignation of William Hoffman U. S. commissioner at Jacksonville was received at the U. S. district court yesterday. Mr. Hoffman was one of the oldest commissioners in the State and considered one of the most efficient. He is one of the early pioneers, and resigns his office on account of his advanced age, he being over 80 years old.—"Oregonian."

STABBING ATTEMPT.—O. C. D. of the Metropolitan hotel, Roseburg, was stabbed by a man named Leonard, of Ten Mile, on Thursday morning. Perkins was the aggressor, and pushed the man who did the stabbing to the wall. Leonard really was a cripple, and no one complains against him, consequently, he has not been arrested. Perkins, it is thought, will recover.
