

NEWS ITEMS.

Portland (Or.), July 7.—General William Meade and Duno Unay, two Umatilla chiefs, leave for Washington to-night, regarding railroad grants through their reservation.

Portland (Or.), July 7.—Rev. Geo. W. Sloan, an Episcopal clergyman at Cheney, W. T., aged 60 years, was taken from here to the insane asylum at Steilacoom, W. T., to-day.

Yreka, July 7.—The body of Fred Raynes, who was drowned in Klamath river two weeks ago, was recovered to-day three miles below the place where he fell in. His remains were brought here this evening.

At the close of the late war two women of Penfield, Ga., began farming with an old blind horse. Now they own a good plantation, well stocked. Our women of to-day should learn a lesson from this, and at the close of the next war procure an old blind horse and begin farming.

As a warning against betting the fate of Major Savory, in England, should be remembered. At the recent Derby he won \$2500 on a horse, and the unexpected luck affected him to such a degree that he had an apoplectic fit and died on the following day. Those who lost are doing well.

The "Standard" says that Mrs. A. K. Babcock, of Walla Walla, whose petition for a divorce from her husband, on the grounds of adultery, was under consideration of the court, probably becoming tired of waiting for a decision, a few days since eloped with one Lem Miner, and started for Rogue river valley. She left six children behind her and is evidently going to take a fresh start in life.

On the night of the 3d inst., the barn of C. G. Durland, 2 1/2 miles from Oakland, Douglas Co., was struck by lightning and burned, together with six horses, two of which were worth \$400 each, wagons, buggy, machinery, farming implement, hay, oats, in all valued at \$5000. Nothing was saved and there was no insurance. Mr. Durland is a well-to-do farmer and will be able to rebuild and restock at once.

A western editor offered a prize of \$50 and a year's subscription, for the best written proposal of marriage from a lady. He picked out a nice proposal from a beautiful and wealthy widow, answered it, accepting the proposal and with the threat of a breach of promise suit actually captured her. Editors may not acquire wealth by writing twenty-three hours a day, but when their genius takes the right shoot they procure the permissims.

The letter from Rev. Cruzan, published in the "Standard" yesterday morning, completely clears Mr. L. Christensen, the former partner of James Welch, from the unjust suspicion of having been concerned in his disappearance. That gentleman and his friends have been much annoyed by the rumors put in circulation, the untruthfulness and injustice of which have only been equalled by the difficulty of proving their falsity. Of course all who knew Mr. Christensen were convinced of his innocence, and now those who had any suspicion of his guilt must be convinced that they have done him a great wrong.

Portland (Or.), July 8.—Captain F. Lankeman of the German ship Fritz paid a \$950 fine to-day for bringing nineteen more Chinese from Hongkong than the law allows.

The British steamer Devonshire arrived to-day from Hongkong with 846 Chinese. Large quantities of silk handkerchiefs and scarfs were found by Custom-house Inspectors secreted in old baskets with false bottoms. The entire cargo of coolies was sent immediately to Cabinet landing to work on the Northern Pacific Railroad.

The Devonshire reports three steamers loading in Hongkong with coolies for San Francisco. She passed the ship Kate Davenport, loaded with Chinese bound for Portland, when she was three days out from Hongkong.

Camp Thomas (A. T.), July 7.—The murderers of Colvig and his scouts were recognized as belonging to the renegade Cibic scouts, who revolted last fall. The bodies of the murdered men were brought into San Carlos and buried last evening. Colvig has a sister at Rock Point, Oregon. Wood and Connel, traders at San Carlos, had a narrow escape. They were returning from Globe, and when near the point at which the renegades were lying in ambush, were ordered by the Indians not to proceed any farther or they would be killed. They retreated without asking any questions; both succeeded in reaching San Carlos during the night in safety. It is thought that there are about fifty White Mountain Indians absent. The correct number will be known to night by the number of rations underdrawn. Everything is quiet at San Carlos and the sub-agency.
