The Helena "Herald" interviewed Mr. E. V. Smally upon the progress of Wilson, of Manzanita, Jackson county, work upon the Northern Pacific, and Oregon. learned the following: There are but few breaks in the grading in the Yellewstone valley, and on this side of the range a great deal of work has been done. Vice President Oakes is determined to get a train through from St. Paul to Puget Sound by July 4, 1883, and I believe he will do it. A branch line is now being surveyed from Billings to Fort Benton. This when built, will open up the Musselshell country, which I believe will prove to be of only which I believe will prove to be of only secondary importance as an agricultural section to the Yellowstone valley, and will at the same time give a quick route of travel to the Maginnis mines, route of travel to the Maginnis mines, the Judith country, and the valleys north and west of Benton. Probably a branch from Helena to Benton will be built soon after the main line is opened. The building of the Northern Pacific for 800 miles through Montana is going to work a revolution in the offairs of the territory, the importance of which can hardly be over-estimated. With your small population you have only been able to scratch the surface of your resources. By the time the next census is taken your population will, I predict, be nearly ten time sawed to order and satisfaction guaranteed.




