GAME LAW.

First: That the persons who violate the game law are generally lazy, worthless, irresponsible vagabonds who consider the game of the forest as the property of him who can take it, who look upon any game law as a measure of oppression, and who justify themselves in committing perjury to avoid punishment for its violation.

Second: That no person in particular is especially injured by the violation of the law, and consequently, no one has the incentive of personal interest to prompt a vigorous prosecution of the offender.
