

THE PENITENTIARY.
A reporter of the Salem "Statesman" visited this institution at Salem one day last week and describes what he seen as follows:
The reporter found, in looking over the register, several interesting items. In the first place there are 183 convicts in the penitentiary. Of the number, Baker county has sent 3, Clatsop 11, Coos 2, Columbia 5, Clackamas 5, Douglas 9, Grant 3, Jackson 3, Josephine 1, Linn 6, Lane 5, Lake 3, Multnomah 73, Marion 19, Polk 5, Umatilla 10, Union 4, U. S. District Court 7, Wasco 7, Washington 1 and Yamhill 4. There is one confined under conviction of murder in the first degree, 14 murder in the second degree, 7 for manslaughter, 2 for assault with dangerous weapon, 6 for rape and attempted, 11 for robbery, burglary 12, larceny and burglary 3, larceny 105, arson 1, forgery 5, counterfeiting 2, incest 1, violating section 2, 139 R. S., obtaining money under false pretenses 1, opening and taking letter from postoffice 1—and this makes up the total of 183. Fourteen are sentenced for life, 1 for 2 years, 2 for 20 years, 4 for 15 years, 1 for 12, 8 for 10, 2 for 9, 3 for 8, 7 for 7, 11 for 6, 39 for 5, 6 for 4, 21 for 3, 37 for 2, 1 for 18 months and 23 for 1 year.
It was the reporter's intention to speak with Carrie Bradley; but she was in the yard devoted entirely to female prisoners, and it would not have been possible to have disturbed her even under the circumstances—according to Lord Chesterfield's idea. She was neatly dressed in black, and wore nothing to denote that she was a convict. Her garments were befitting one who would appear well on a Sunday afternoon. A small rat-and-tan terrier and a pretty little girl kept her company. Her time appeared to be divided between caressing the dog and the child. There was nothing in the way of melancholy about her countenance. She seemed as though her table was well supplied, and that she enjoyed every meal. Evidently Brown's ghost is not haunting her. In this haunting business we have always believed a guilty conscience framed the ghost, and we must also believe that if Carrie did murder Brown intentionally she is the most deceptive of all criminals.
The Irish World gives the following estimate of Jay Gould's income: Jay Gould has according to the latest showing, \$34,000,000 in stocks, which yield him \$3,000,000 annually. This gives him \$275,000 a month, \$9,000 a day, \$375 an hour or \$6 a minute. While the miserably paid laborer is swallowing his hurried dinner, Gould's income has increased \$375. There is surely something in this fact to set men thinking. A system of society which encourages this—which keeps men in personal poverty as a necessity to the further enrichment of his already wealthy fellow man can hardly be expected to be other than what it is—the parent of every species of crime and immorality. Dividends, profits, rack-renting, land-stealing and the whole train of villainies that go to make up our system of labor and exchange, have their root in the principle of usury which enables Jay Gould to squeeze \$375 an hour out of labor.
