

The Toy Pistol.

The death roll of young Americans who have laid down their lives that the glorious Fourth of July should live, no doubt exceeds the total number of patriots who fell during the entire Revolutionary war. Each succeeding Independence Day swells the list of young martyrs, and the pistol of late years has come to play the most deadly part in the annual patriotic slaughter of the innocents. This last Fourth of July celebration counts up a distressing aggregate of victims. Hardly a day passes that we do not record the death of a number of boys from lock-jaw, induced by toy pistol wounds. Cincinnati had six fatal cases; Boston as many, and in Chicago twelve permits have been issued for the burial of boys who died of wounds received from the glorious toy pistol. This record does not by any means show, or give any approximate idea of the total casualties, nor yet of the whole number of the fatal casualties. The toy pistol is a weapon whose manufacture should be sternly prohibited, and yet the chances are that it will continue to be manufactured and sold as largely as ever next year, and the annual bloody sacrifice of thumbs and fingers exacted.

The Secretary of the Interior decides that the Desert Land Act requires more than the mere conducting of water upon the land to which the title is sought. Irrigation must thoroughly prepare the land for the production of any agricultural crop.

The Secretary of the Interior also holds that the only bar to a person who has already filed an entry to a homestead grant from filing another and different entry is section 2,261 of the Revised Statutes.

A third decision of the Secretary of the Interior is that when parties have settled upon land and made an entry, if the entry is afterwards cancelled by the department for non-compliance with the law, the purchase money must be refunded to the settler, if it appears that it was his honest opinion that his residence was legal within the law.

Took The Vows.—On Wednesday morning, at St. Mary's convent in this city, says the "Standard," Sister Mary Matthew, formerly Miss Conner, of St. Paul, Marion county, and Sister Mary Flavi, formerly Miss Alicia Dunn, of Salem, took upon themselves perpetual vows of sisterhood. Miss Mary Dugan, of Jacksonville, took the temporary vows and will be known in religion as Sister Mary Lucretia. The chapel of the institution was handsomely decorated for the occasion and was filled with former pupils and their friends, among whom were the parents of the three sisters mentioned above. The ceremonies were conducted by Rev. Father Glorieux, assisted by Father Metayer. A very impressive sermon was preached by Father Glorieux.

To prevent the tire of a wagon wheel from coming loose and requiring to be refitted, a method highly recommended is to fill the felloes with linseed oil before the tire is put on. The timber thus treated is not liable to injury by water, and lasts much longer. The process followed is to hang the wheel in oil the felloe being immersed for one hour. The oil, which is contained in a cast-iron heater of suitable length, is brought to a boiling heat—a higher degree must be avoided, or the wood will be burned. The timber should be dry, as in a green state it will not take oil. The tire of a wheel thus treated, will it is said, wear out before becoming loose.

Method of cleaning and whitening smoked walls consists, in the first place, of rubbing all the black, loose dirt off them, by means of a broom, and then washing them down with a strong soda lye, which is to be afterwards removed by means of water to which a little hydrochloric acid has been added. When the walls are dry, a thin coating of lime, with the addition of a solution of alum, is to be applied. After this has become perfectly dry, the walls are to be calcined, or coated with solution of glue and chalk.

Hon. J. B. Underwood of Eugene, who has been confined to his bed for some weeks past, died at 6:20 on Thursday evening. He leaves a family and large circle of friends to mourn his loss. Mr. Underwood was well known throughout the State, having been engaged in practicing law and in merchandising for many years at Eugene, and afterwards special postal agent for two years. Lately he has been well, Fargo & Co.'s agent at Eugene. His disease was quick consumption.

The "Yreka Journal" says that the Central Pacific Railroad Company have purchased the Sacramento river wagon road. This road runs along the supposed line of the extension of the C. & O. R. R. and the purchase is made for the purpose of clearing the right of way up the Sacramento river canyon, and indicates that work will soon be commenced in earnest.
