

The C. & O. Stage Co. will hereafter run a stage every day on Scott Valley route, which will prove a great convenience, and nothing more than the route is entitled to, considering the large number of people and numerous branch routes to be supplied with mail matter. The stage company concluded to run the extra trip, in consequence of the doubling of mail making too much for easy hauling in laying over Sunday. As the company have shown such a disposition to accommodate the public, the people interested will exert their influence to have the Government pay for a seven days' mail, which would not amount to over \$1,100, and thus secure permanent service every day for the full term of contract. A petition to this effect, signed by a few of the principal business men in Yreka, Scott Valley, Trinity Valley, Shasta and Redding, is to be forwarded to the Postmaster General asking the establishment of seven days mail per week, as in former years, before the raid on Star Route reductions, many of which routes were unjustly reduced.—Yreka Journal.

President Henry Vilard, in a report to the stock holders of the Northern Pacific some time since said: "An interesting feature of our work is the effect of the Chinese Immigration Bill. We have suffered for want of labor. We had only 1,800 men at work when we wanted twice as many, and such was the demand that the price of Chinese labor had gone up forty per cent, within six months. When it was evident that the Chinese bill would pass, the six companies hastened to bring out as many Chinamen as they could. At one time we had only 1,300 men at work, 40 of whom were Americans, and I ordered that all the force which we had at work for the Oregon Railway and Navigation Co. should be transferred to the Northern Pacific. Soon the influx of Chinamen began to be felt, and we now have 4,000 men at work, and the Chief Engineer telegraphs me that he has ordered two thousand more to be put on at once. We are pushing the line as fast as we can, and I assure you, gentlemen, that, no matter what happens, we shall finish it within fifteen months."

A NOVEL STEAM ENGINE.—This important improvement in steam engines appears, even to many experienced engineers, a sort of a mechanical paradox. With but one crank, with two cylinders cast in one piece, and only one valve chest, the entire engine is as simple and few in parts as the simplest of ordinary single cylinder engines. It has no dead centers, but it will start forward from any possible position in which it may be placed. Further, it may be stopped, started and changed from a single to enter a double or compound engine, as may be desired, by the motion of a single lever, and the change to either form may be made while it is moving at any speed, just as easy, it is asserted, as when it is still. The engine can run it with one cylinder as a single engine, or with both cylinders using live steam, and the other running by the expansion as a compound engine, as either way as economically as any engine especially built for that particular way.

The yellow fever is rapidly increasing at Matamoros. Already between 300 and 400 cases are reported, and there are doubtless many more that are not made known. One death has been reported at New Orleans. There seems to be no way of preventing the spread of this terrible disease when once it gets fairly started. It is to be hoped that the horrible scenes of a few years ago are not to be repeated.

President Arthur on the 5th inst nominated Gen. Grant and Wm. M. Trescott late special envoy to Chili and Peru to be a commission to negotiate a commercial treaty with Mexico. An appropriation of \$20,000, to defray the expenses of the commission, was made in the sundry civil bill, and under the authority so conferred the president made that appointment.

The President has appointed General Grant and Wm. H. Trescott as commissioners to negotiate a commercial treaty with Mexico. General Grant stands very high in the estimation of the Government of Mexico, and this commission will no doubt lead to the negotiation of a valuable treaty with our sister republic.

In the case of the City of Portland against W. S. Ladd and W. M. Ladd—the banking firm of Ladd and Tilton—Judge Moreland has decided that the license tax of \$50 a quarter, imposed by the council on banks, is legal and must be paid.

Of the late George P. Marsh, American minister to Rome, it used to be said that he could start at Athens and travel through the heart of Europe to Scandinavia and talk with every man he met in his own language or dialect.
