

CHICAGO, August 26.—A reception was tendered to Mrs. John Brown by the Union Veteran Club at Englewood to-night. Mrs. John Brown was the guest of Captain H. A. Parker, President of the club. Mr. and Mrs. Parker introduced their guests to those present. Early in the evening, Mrs. Brown received visitors in a room where she sat, the object of the interest, pity and respects of hundreds. The colored people appeared to be especially interested in the widow of the man who so nobly and faithfully defended their rights. At about 8 o'clock Mrs. Brown was escorted to the platform and took her seat beneath the twining banners of red, white and blue, which formed a pleasing and striking background, together with the time honored musket and a wreath which encircled the words, "Our Dead." The scene was certainly impressive. Captain Parker arose and traced the progress of the anti-slavery movement and old John Brown's part in it, and then told the sad story of his last, great and tragic end. The history, he said, was one which would ever remain green in the hearts of all true Americans. The gathering to do honor to his widow was owing to the heartfelt interest which was taken in the cause. Rev. M. Hardin and Hon. Cyrus Coy made a few remarks.

A particularly touching point was when a number of colored people, headed by a zealous old lady, sang "John Brown's Body," in that weird chant peculiar to the race. A handsome sum of money was quickly donated and presented to her. Mrs. Brown will be the guest of Captain Parker until Monday, when she will be at the service of the committee appointed by citizens, who propose giving a great public demonstration.

WHAT IS AN INGRAIN CARPET?—The twoply ingrain known to the trade as a fabric composed of two webs or plies of cloth made with different colored yarns—say, one ply green, the other red—of equal consistence or texture, united at the edges of selvages each by selvage threads, and ingraind or united at different parts of the cloth, wherever called for by the design or pattern. If the red ply represents the ground color of the design, then the green will be the figure color; and whenever the green figuring ply appears over the red ground ply, that is ingraind. The more general this ingraind or mixing up of the two webs or plies, the better the fabric is ingraind, and the longer it will wear. The three ply ingrain is made and ingraind after the same manner. A two-ply carpet, woven on the same loom and "mounted" in the same manner as a two-ply ingrain, if woven plain, without any design of pattern, would be a seamless rag, or two bags joined together by one side of each.

The railroads of the Pacific States and Territories measured at the beginning of 1882 5,948 miles, with 574 miles of siding. Steel rails were laid on 2,411 miles of this road. The number of locomotive engines was 577, passenger cars 552, mail cars 143, freight cars 11,033. The capital stock of the roads aggregated \$228,804,545; the funded debt, \$183,602,680; other liabilities, \$13,339,912; total capital, \$441,744,133. The cost of the equipment and road is placed at \$396,888,838. The average number of miles worked last year was 5,034. Gross earnings were \$55,612,290; expenses, \$17,902,713; net earnings, \$17,878,069. Interest on bonds amounted to \$8,162,767, and dividends on stocks \$7,787,491.

Almost every wine country used to make brandy; but it is only in portions of the old French departments of the Charente and Charente-Inferieure (the ancient Saintonge and Angoumois) that the brandy known for ages as cognac is produced. The general destruction of the vines and the improvements made within the last ten years in distilling spirits from other material have led to the almost complete abandonment of distillation from French vines. In the years 1872, and 1875 and 1876 an average of 16,000,000 gallons of brandy were produced from wine. Last year only 1,000,000 gallons were made.
