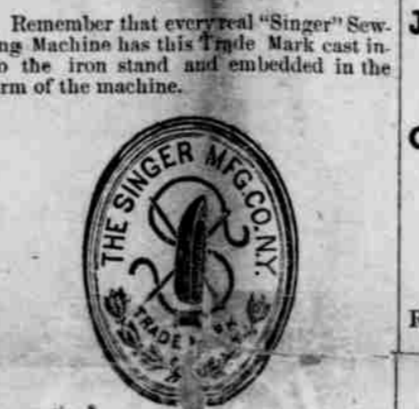

RAILROAD NEWS. MYRTLE CREEK, Sept. 15, 1882. This village which has been the terminus of the O. & C. R. R. for some four weeks will on or about the 20th of the present month be only a way station, as the terminal station will be moved to Riddleburg on the above date. Forty carpenters are now at work putting up a large water tank just south of the new depot at this point. The dimensions are as follows: Foundation 32x32 five feet deep, of solid stone. Capacity of tank 54 thousand gallons; weight of tank when full 250 tons. Tank will be of red-wood staves and iron hoops run every 10 inches. The water is to be run in hundred feet in two inch pipes and will force itself one hundred feet above the tank if necessary. Depot is completed and is 24x30, of Swiss style of architecture, and presents a very fine appearance, situated between the high hills. Carpenters now at work on depot will move to Riddles to-day and Myrtle creek will drop into its past gloomy appearance and already a great change has taken place in its streets, which do not present so lively an appearance as some weeks ago. Marks Wollenberg & Co's. new building in fast nearing completion. It is a well built structure, every way adapted for the use it is intended for—in storing grain and freight. J. B. McClean the foreman of bridge work is sadly in need of carpenters. This class of mechanics are very scarce. All the Portland papers contain advertisements for men but yet only a few has arrived. Wages range from \$2.75 to \$3.50 per day. The car used by Mr. J. H. Small, agent, will also move to Riddleburg on the 20th. This car will keep to the front until the track meets the C. P. R. R. from the other end. It is fitted up very comfortably and contains all the furniture of a first-class mercantile country house. One end is partitioned off for use of those jolly conductors Bellingar and Stroud. As soon as Riddle is reached the time of passenger trains will be considerably shortened. Will probably reach there about 7:30 p. m. instead of 8:30. Mr. J. B. Harris, the indefatigable worker and superintendent of construction is very much pleased with the way work is progressing on tunnels. He expects to reach Abraham's mill this winter. The large warehouse at Riddle of Abraham & Co. will be used by the company for storage of freight. Mr. Small will have a good force at work and quick dispatch will be given freight. The road to Canyonville is being put in good shape for hauling. The W. U. Telegraph Co. will commence the construction of the new R. R. line from Roseburg at once to follow the track along south at Parrish's and will be in direct communication with head offices in Portland. More anon

The simplest afghan that I know of is nitted in double white zephyr, and with very coarse wooden needles. Cast on as many stitches as your judgment prompts, and knit a perfect plain piece twice the length of the width. Double this, and tack together with bows of any colored satin ribbon that may suit your fancy. This is very effective and very, very warm.

Another pretty afghan for a cradle requires about eighteen ounces of wool, six of each color, deep red, black and white. Columbia Germantown wool is the best to use for this afghan. Use ivory or wooden needles about the size of a small lead pencil. Cast on 31 stitches, and knit plain as you would a garter, except that you make one stitch at the beginning of each needle by putting the thread over the needle first, and after knitting fifteen stitches narrow once, knit 31 times across with each color, using first the red, then white, then black, till each color has been repeated three times in one strip; with the last color omit making a stitch, and simply narrow in the middle. Knit six stripes. Join them by crotchetting them together with old gold zephyr, putting the same colors against each other. Finish the points with tassels or balls of the same color as points.

First Class Road Horses.

Very fast roadsters are the most valuable in the market of any class of horses produced being in demand at high prices for gentlemen's driving. The extravagant prices paid for these fliers by wealthy gentlemen who have a pride in owning fine-styled drivers that will take the lead on the road, is something almost incredible. Any breeder who raises first or second class trotters can find a market for them at high figures. Those able to trot a mile in 2:25 or better will sell for from \$5,000 to 10,000, both the first and second class, with good style, finding a ready market at these high figures, and bringing considerably more for private driving than they are worth for public racing. It is often not the temptation to win large sums in purses that induces owners to engage their stock in trotting circuits, for it is only the fastest steeds that win any considerable amount over expenses in trotting circuits, but breeders that enter their stock in these trotting events to give them market value. There is an extensive demand for first-class roadsters, that will continue to increase as the country grows in wealth and population.—"National Live Stock Journal."

A new and desirable papier mache process for covering floors is described as follows: The floor is thoroughly cleaned. The holes and cracks are then filled with paper putty, made by soaking newspapers in a paste made of wheat flour, water and ground alum, as follows: To one pound of flour add three quarts of water and a tablespoonful of ground alum, and mix thoroughly. The floor is then coated with the paste, and then a thickness of manila or hardware paper is put on. If two layers are desired, a second cover of manila paper is put on. This is allowed to dry thoroughly. The manila paper is then covered with paste, and a layer of wall paper any style or design desired is put on. After allowing this to thoroughly dry it is covered with two or more coats of sizing, made by dissolving one half pound of glue in two quarts of hot water. After allowing this to dry, the surface is given one coat of "hard oil-finish varnish," which comes and is bought already prepared. This allowed to dry thoroughly, when the floor is ready for use. The process is represented to be durable and cheap, and besides taking the place of matting, carpet, oil-cloths or other like covering, makes the floor air tight, and can be washed or scrubbed.
