

Northern Pacific.
Mr. Villard in representing the Portland end of the Northern Pacific says: "A company known as the Terminal Company will be organized in the formation of which the Northern Pacific will participate, to build a union passenger and freight depot at Portland, and provide other terminal facilities for all the roads centering at that point. Grounds for the union depot have been purchased in North Portland, and immediately adjoining the business portion of the city. The plan contemplates a passenger depot covering eighteen acres fronting on the city park, and adjoining freight depot covering thirty acres with an available length for tracks of 2,200 feet and equal length of excellent river front. The Northern Pacific trains from the east will cross the Willamette on a bridge with double track, and thence center the Union depot. Equally good facilities are provided for the entrance of the Oregon Railway & Navigation Company's trains and those on the east and west side roads of the Oregon & California Company. In fact, the location and plans fully cover all present and future needs in the way of railway terminal facilities and connection at Portland.
On the east side of the river purchases have been made of about 246 acres for the machine shops of the several roads. On the river front of this track will be erected coal bunkers, a warehouse and a wheat elevator. A dry dock is now in course of construction there, and a large wharf for the accommodation of ocean steam and sail vessels of deep draught is being built with which the tracks of the several companies will have connection. A bridge with two draws will be built across the Willamette from Portland to East Portland.
Prohibition.
The following is a true copy of the proposition passed at this session of the Legislature to amend the state constitution on the temperance problem. It passed the senate on the 11th, eighteen for and ten against and two absent. It passed the house on the 12th, fifty-two voting for it and six against and two absent.
This measure now lies over for two years and then will come up before the next legislature, and if a majority of both houses again agree to it, it then will be submitted to a vote of the electors and if ratified by a majority of them then it will become part of the constitution of Oregon.
ARTICLE.
SECTION 1. The manufacture, sale or giving away, or the keeping for sale of any spirituous, vinous, malt, distilled, fermented or intoxicating liquors whatever is forever prohibited in this state, except for medicinal, scientific or mechanical purposes.
SEC. 2. The Legislative Assembly shall provide, by law, in what manner, by whom and at what places such liquors, or any of them shall be manufactured or sold, or kept for sale, for medicinal, scientific or mechanical purposes.
SEC. 3. The Legislative Assembly shall, without delay, pass all necessary laws, with sufficient penalties necessary to enforce this amendment.
