CIRCUIT COURT.—The adjourned term of Circuit Court—Judge Bean of the second district presiding—closed on Wednesday last after a session of about ten days. W. P. Benn was convicted on the charge of stealing a cow and was sentenced to the penitentiary for the term of one year by Judge Hanna. The trial of Colwell and Dodson for shooting and cutting Chas. Hanna, before Judge Bean, resulted in the acquittal of both of the defendants, the jury in each case finding the accused not guilty as charged. The verdict in these cases does not seem to agree with public opinion in this section, but good juries were secured in each instance and they no doubt did what they considered right according to the evidence submitted.

COW CREEK SCENE.—The Roseburg "Independent" tells about John Abbot, who has been carrying on the saloon business near tunnel No. 3 on the extension of the O. & C. R. R. on Cow creek, and says that on last Tuesday a person named Ruddy who claimed to be entitled to the possession of the premises by virtue of some agreement, entered and persuaded the barkeeper, with a cocked revolver, to vacate. Abbot went to the scene of the difficulty to settle the matter, when he was induced to leave by the same terrible argument. Abbot, who was unarmed, accepted the situation and went to a neighboring camp to prepare himself to defend his property. On his return the whole plant was in ashes, although it is said that the liquors were so badly frozen they would not burn. The matter will be the subject of a judicial investigation, but no arrest has yet been made.

Governor Moody has appointed Wallace Baldwin of Corvallis, a commissioner to superintend the erection of the fish ladder at Oregon City, authorized by the last Legislature.

A special venire for twenty-four jurors was issued for the trial of the Dodson case and no trouble was experienced in selecting twelve of these for the trial of the case.

The defense in the Dodson trial tried to make it appear, that it was Sears that cut Chas. Hanna instead of the man Dodson who was arrested for the crime. The result of the trial would indicate that the jury believed it.

Scarlet fever has claimed two more victims this week, Clara Neuber and Alice Bybee, both over fifteen years of age. Every precaution should be taken to prevent the spread of this disease as it is proving fatal in most instances.

A new general merchandise store will be opened in the new "Times" building in a few days by S. S. Aiken, brother of our fellow townsman, who is expected to arrive from the East today or tomorrow. His family accompanies him.

The "Eintracht" is circulating a subscription paper for the relief of the sufferers by the recent floods in Germany and something near \$70 has been raised up to this time. The object is a worthy one and everybody should subscribe something.

The "Red Front" is a thing of the past, D. W. Crosby having quit the business one day this week. Nick Ficke purchased the remainder of his stock and now offers it for sale at his butcher shop where bargains can be had by calling soon.

The supreme court of this State has decided, in the celebrated Greenwood case, that the act of the Legislature of 1878, providing for Supreme and Circuit Court Judges in the distinct classes, and their appointment by the Governor is constitutional.

A religious discussion between "Pap" Comley and a man named O'Brien, of Grave creek, was decided in favor of the former one day this week. Comley coming out first best. Knives were used O'Brien receiving a serious wound in the groin. No arrest have yet been made.

The Colorado legislature on Saturday elected Thos. M. Bowen of Rio Grande county, to the United States Senate for a term of six years from March 4th, and H. A. W. Taber, of Arapahoe, for the short term. Each was elected by a full party vote. Both are bonanza millionaires.

L. S. P. Marsh, the contractor for the new Court House, accompanied by G. E. Payne, the architect, came down from Ashland this week on business connected with the construction of that building. Mr. Marsh started for Portland last evening to purchase some of the supplies required, and although some parties are annoying him all they can, in one way and another, he says that he will have the building ready for occupancy at the time required. Marsh is a rustler.

Everything is in readiness for active work on the mine of Miller & Kretzer on Jackson creek but, like the rest of the miners, they are waiting for rain. A large sum of money has been expended on these mines in digging ditches and fitting them up with a hydraulic and we hope to see the proprietors make a good clean-up.

A RIGHTER'S DECISION.—In response to a letter from the attorney general asking for suggestions in the matter, Secretary Teller, in a letter dated January 18, expressed the opinion that the enclosure of large tracts of public lands by a barbed-wire fence, or otherwise, by herders or stockmen, should be enjoined as a nuisance, if it becomes detrimental to the public interest, to the extent of preventing settlement, or interrupting the avenues of commerce, or the use of highways, etc. The secretary recommends that proper steps be taken in cases that come to the attention of the department of justice to stop this unlawful monopoly. He thinks that the United States may resort to all the methods of procedure to protect its own interests that would be available to private parties in like circumstances.

Five families, comprising upwards of twenty persons, arrived at Sacramento from Iowa last week, to settle somewhere in Jackson county, Oregon. They are pleased with the climate and say that there will be a large immigration to southern Oregon from that State. Such immigration will be likely to change that Democratic stronghold to Republicanism, and make the Jackson county Bourbons very sick in a political way.—"Journal."
