VICTORIOUS AT LAST.—Telegraphic advices from Salem state that property in that city was sold yesterday for the sum of \$30,000 to satisfy the judgment obtained by the United States and B. F. Dowell against W. C. Griswold. The many friends of Mr. Dowell will be glad to hear of his success and the final ending of the case. Pluck and good staying qualities will win and the latter has shown himself possessed of both in the prosecution of this case. Mr. Dowell will get \$15,000 of this judgment.

RELIGIOUS.—Lenten services will be held at the Catholic Church to-morrow, Rev. F. N. Blanchet officiating. Rev. R. C. Oglesby will preach at Phoenix Saturday evening; also Sunday morning and evening. Rev. M. A. Williams will hold services at the Presbyterian church in this place, Sunday morning and evening. Elder M. THE JURY LAW.—The law governing jurors, and which went into effect on 22d of January, has been changed to read as follows: No person is competent to act as a juror who has been convicted of any felony, or a misdemeanor involving moral turpitude. No person shall be summoned as a juror in any circuit court more than once in one year, and it shall be sufficient cause of challenge to any juror called to be sworn in any cause, that he has been summoned and attended said court held within one year prior to the time of such challenge, or that he has been summoned from the bystanders or body of the county and has served as a juror in any cause upon such summons within one year prior to the time of such challenge. The law is one that will work a needed reform in the matter of professional jurors.

THE PREVAILING DISEASE.—Scarlet fever and rotheln or rosola are the names of the two diseases prevailing here at present in an epidemic form. Children having one are not exempt from the other, and as a mild form of scarlet fever resembles rosola parents should consult proper authority and find out if the disease is scarlet fever, and then the necessary precautions can be taken to prevent relapse, as scarlet fever in a mild form is a dangerous disease if a relapse takes place. Rotheln is not a dangerous disease and does not require the same precaution against a relapse that scarlet fever does, but it would be advisable in all cases to consult a physician in the start so that the disease your children are afflicted with can be treated intelligently by the members of the household after the physician's services are no longer required.

The residence of Archibald Lamb in Ashland was burned to the ground on Friday last. All the contents of the building were saved. No insurance.

An old resident of Siskiyou county, Cal., named Ulrich Miller, died of spasms at his home in Scott valley this week. He was 63 years of age.

E. A. Littlefield, publisher of the "Ogden Pilot," and formerly a resident of Klamath county, Cal., has been appointed postmaster at Ogden, Utah.

The shafts of Cupid are fast decimating the ranks of the brotherhood of bachelors, and the hospital of matrimony is making room for several applicants.

Dr. J. W. Robinson was called to Ashland this week to consult with Dr. Parson in the case of Henry Norton. He reports the patient's case quite critical.

Wells Fargo & Co's express line has been re-established between Ashland and Linkville and proves quite a convenience to the residents of Klamath and Lake counties.

Mr. A. E. Schwatka of Yreka passed through town this week on his return homeward from Salem where he has been on a visit to his brother who reports as improving.

"Not worth his salt" probably came from Holland, where an old law condemned criminals to be wholly deprived of salt, as a severe punishment in that moist country.

A certain Jacksonville boy gets an immense scoring in the last issue of the "Sunday Mercury," published at Portland, which proves quite mortifying to his relations here.

Betting on weights still continues, in one instance \$20 a side being wagered this week on the weight of a horse. It is probably unnecessary to state that only one of the betters won.

The commissioner general of the land office requires that naturalization papers shall be produced, or evidence of their destruction shown, to entitle foreign born citizens to a land patent.

Messrs. Corbett & Macleay, of Portland, made the members of Engine Companies Nos. 1 and 3, a present of \$20 a piece for their valor and good work on the morning of the recent fire.

The announcement of George S. Howard for the office of City Marshal will be found in this issue. If elected we have no doubt but that he will fill the position acceptably to all concerned.

The new postal note, of which we have received samples this week are quite a convenience. The paper, stamp and envelope are all furnished for three cents, and the form is neat and handy.

The largest locomotive ever built in this country is on the Southern Pacific Railroad, and bears the unpretentious name of "No. 51." It has eight driving wheels and weighs 156,000 pounds.

Henry Norton is lying in a very critical condition. Following upon the fever came inflammation of the eyes, and the "Tidings" says it is feared that the sight of one of them is totally destroyed.

The Rev. F. X. Blanchet of Jacksonville requests all his Catholic parishioners to meet him at the parlors of Hook's hotel on Monday evening, Feb. 13th, at 7:30, and on Tuesday morning at 8 o'clock.

It was reported last week that Mrs. Rook who was attacked by a vicious dog had died from the effects of it, but it now appears that was untrue, and that instead of being dead, she is improving, and will recover.

J. M. Payne, our present City Marshal, is a candidate for re-election and makes public announcement to that effect among the new advertisements. In the future as in the past he will always strive to do what is right.

The Oregon iron and steel company's furnace at Oswego turned out last week, in several days, 163 tons of pig iron, being an average of 23 tons per day of 24 hours, almost one ton per hour. This is the best work ever done by this furnace.

The new restaurant will be open for business this evening. Mr. Curtis' family arrived from Redding this week and everything will then be in working order. He proposes furnishing fresh oysters in every style—something new in this section.

Some one cut the harness on John Tepper's horses this week while standing hitched to the public hitching rack in town, and Mr. Tepper offers \$5 reward for any information that will lead to the detection and conviction of the guilty party.

There are large deposits of gold and silver bearing quartz embraced in the Moses reservation on the Upper Columbia. Quite a number of claims have been taken upon the Okanagan, which lie there unworked because the country awarded Moses to includes the mines.

The only excitement on California street Sunday afternoon was caused by a brace of attenuated canines, in their efforts to settle their individual rights of a meatless bone. As is generally the case in such squabbles, a third dog stepped in and secured the point of contention.

Since our last issue there have been three more deaths from scarlet fever—Eliza Howard, Minerva Maud Bybee and George K. Cardwell. The disease seems to be abating, however, and those now sick are not believed to be dangerous. We hope that such will be the case.

It is nearly four weeks before the town election takes place and already five candidates have announced themselves for the office of City Marshal. The office must be a good one, and if there are any more of our citizens who want the position we will publish their cards at regular rates. The more the merrier.

S. S. Aiken, brother of Dr. G. H. Aiken of this place, arrived here this week from New Hampshire and proposes locating permanently. He will open a general merchandise store on the corner of C. and Third streets and will be ready for business in about a week from this date. We expect to see him do well.

The fact that a large percent of the white men employed on the railroad extension are from Jackson county, and that several of them are spending the winter here, without terrorizing any of the citizens, would cause a grin when reading those terrible predictions, were they published in any other than the paper "with the largest circulation."

L. R. Webster, of the SENTINEL, who has been clerk and book keeper for Reames Bros. for some time past, resigned his position in the store this week and will now devote his time to reading law with C. W. Kahler. He is already well advanced in this study and hopes soon to be admitted to the bar. We wish him success in his new profession.

The Roseburg "Independent" says: There was recorded in the county clerk office of Douglas county on Wednesday, a power of attorney from Andrew R. Spang, of Dayton, Ohio, to George W. Smith, of New York for the sale of some 95,000 acres of land, known as the Coos Bay wagon road lands, situated in Douglas and Coos counties, the sale to be subject to the payment of a debt of \$216,561.45.

J. W. French, largely interested in cattle dealing in Southern Oregon, was married recently to Miss Ella A. Glenn, of Oakland. Bride is the only daughter of Dr. H. J. Glenn, a great farmer of Colusa and the Democratic nominee for governor in 1879. The marriage ceremony was performed at the elegant mansion in Oakland by Rev. T. H. B. Anderson. Only the family and relatives were present. Mr. and Mrs. French leave for an eastern bridal tour.

The publisher of "The West Shore," accompanied by one of his staff artists, has just returned from a trip across the continent over the Northern Pacific Railroad, and in the February number will furnish his readers with the first of a series of articles and illustrations descriptive of the wonder land through which this road passes. The entire series will embrace all of Montana Territory, the National Park, Yellowstone, Pyramid Park, and scenes on both the headwaters of the Columbia and Missouri rivers.

The Roseburg land office has made the largest sales during the months of January that has been made in any one month for the last ten years. There has been taken by cash entry, \$8,683 acres; 25 homestead entries, embracing 3,786 acres; 16 final homestead proofs, embracing 2,353 acres; 25 pre-emption filings and one timber filing. Nearly all of this land is in Coos and Douglas counties. At the rate these lands are being taken it will not be long until the fine timber lands in this and Coos counties will all be claimed by settlers.

"Herald," Seattle: Our architects have their hands full of orders for plans, both for business houses and residences. The outlook has never been better for the beginning of a year. Until plans have been accepted, it will not be in order to make special reference to improvements contemplated. At the present time there is a great deal of building going on in various parts of the city. The carpenters regard the prospects as very encouraging, and if we have a fair share of dry weather this spring, Seattle will see the greatest building boom it has ever known.

A census bulletin has just been received at this office, giving the statistics of manufactures in the United States, obtained during the census of 1880. From this bulletin it is learned that Oregon has 1089 manufacturing establishments, which represent a capital of \$6,312,560. In these manufactures are employed 3376 hands above the age of 15, 97 of whom are females; the number employed under the age of 15 is 97. During the year wages amounting to \$1,657,046 was paid to these employees. The value of the manufactures for the same year was \$30,931,232. The "Oregonian" says these figures are far below the business of the present year.

Another Cure for Diphtheria.

As diphtheria is somewhat prevalent throughout the county at present, we publish for the benefit of the people at large, and the consideration of physicians a receipt that originated with the Russian Government, and which has been used by them with such success in treating this fearful disease, that they have given it to the press for general publication. The receipt was sent to a prominent gentleman of this city, and there can be no doubt as to the genuineness of its source. The receipt is as follows:

"Natr. benzoe, pur. 5.0 solv. in aqu. distil at eq. month. piper, ana 40.0 syr. cort. aur. 10.0."
It is to be used internally every one or two hours according to the directions. For children from one to three years of age, from seven to eight grammes for one hundred grammes of distilled water, with same syrup; for children from three to seven years of age, from ten to fifteen grammes, and for grown people from fifteen to twenty-five grammes for each one hundred grammes. Besides this is used the insufflation on the diphtherial membrane through a glass tube in serious cases every three hours; in light cases three times a day; of the natre benzoe pulver. For grown people a gargle made of the dilution of ten grammes of this pulver for two hundred grammes of water.

AFTER TEAMS.—Mr. Carlyle, agent of the O. & C. R. Co., has been in the valley within the past week looking for teams to work upon the railroad extension. He called at the "Tidings" office last Monday, and informed them that the company is anxious to have a large number of teams immediately, and that if they cannot hire them they may be compelled to buy horses themselves. This, we trust, they will not be obliged to do, for we do not believe today, for it would deprive the people of this valley of a good round sum in wages. If the company buy horses, they will most likely hire Chinamen to drive them, and then when the teams of our valley apply for work along in the summer they will find the places occupied; and the wages paid for teams and teamsters, instead of remaining in our country, will depart with the heathen when the road is completed. The wages paid are \$7 for four horse teams; \$4.75 per day for two horse teams and wagons, and \$4.50 for man and two horses without wagon. Many men take three horses for cart work, and thus get \$6.75 per day for themselves and horses. Grain costs 2 cents, per pound, hay 1 1/2 cts; and board 60 cts. per day.

PORTLAND.—The metropolis of the Pacific Northwest has a population of 28,000. During 1882 her jobbing houses sold merchandise to the value of \$40,000,000. The products of her manufacturing establishments, employing 4,178 hands, are valued at \$7,734,800. Her exports, including those of the Columbia river, ran up to \$15,560,932. Real estate changed hands to the value of \$6,686,731. Six hundred and forty-two buildings were erected in city and suburbs, valued at \$2,977,600. The prospects for 1883 are that nearly all of the above figures will be doubled.
